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

This month's free gift

Three beautiful butterfly dies

Create beautiful cards, gift boxes and more with your three butterfly dies and downloadable papers. Simonne Clay has six ideas to inspire

his month, star cardmaker and designer Simonne Clay has created a set of three gorgeous butterfly dies exclusively for Cardmaking & Papercraft readers, and she's also come up with six brilliant ideas for using them to make cards and more for all occasions.

In addition to the three different butterfly dies, Simonne has also used seven coordinating designer papers, illustrated by Lynda M. Metcalf (www.lyndammetcalf.com), and featuring fresh wildflowers, sweet strawberries, classic roses and colourful butterflies. You can download and print these stunning, springtime designs free from our website - you'll find them under 'cardmaking papers' at www.cardmakingandpapercraft.com.

To use your butterfly dies, sandwich them with your chosen paper or card between the plates of your die-cutting machine, and pass through the machine to cut. There are pinholes at the back of each die to make the cut designs easier to remove.

Get creative with your detailed die-cuts to dress up gift bags, photo frames, notebooks and more, or even to make jewellery or pretty magnets! You could also use the cut designs as stencils by inking over them with a sponge dauber. Have fun experimenting, and happy crafting!









Try these designs

Thinking of you

- 1 Layer a 135mm square of white card onto a 140mm square of blue card. Attach to a 146mm square pink base card.
- 2 Die-cut two large and three medium-sized butterflies from blue card. Attach them to the reverse of the top edge of a 132x90mm piece of floral patterned paper to create a border. Attach the panel to the base, as shown.
- 3 Wrap a 140x19mm piece of blue card with white ribbon, and attach along the top of the patterned paper panel.
- 4 Stamp a sentiment (the 'Thinking of you' stamp comes from the free stamp set included with issue 165 of Cardmaking & Papercraft) in black ink in the top right corner of the base, as shown. To finish, add a white ribbon bow and three pink pearls, as shown.



Turn the page for more ideas using your gift



- 1 Attach a 30x129mm piece of spotty patterned paper along the left edge of a 129mm square of rose patterned paper. Cover the join with white ricrac. Layer the panel onto a 133mm square of white card, and attach to a 139mm square pink base.
- 2 Die-cut three large butterflies from pink patterned paper. Add glue to the bodies only, and attach along the ribbon, as shown. Lift the wings for dimension.
- 3 Stamp a sentiment (the 'Thank you' stamp comes from the free stamp set included with issue 165 of Cardmaking & Papercraft) in black ink onto a white die-cut label. Attach as shown, using sticky fixers. Add a white pearl to each corner, to finish.



Just a note

- 1 Die-cut a border from the bottom edge of a 132x56mm piece of strawberry patterned paper. Attach along top edge of a 132x78mm piece of spotty patterned paper. Layer panel onto a 135x81mm piece of white card; attach to a 139x85mm pink base.
- 2 Layer a 65mm diameter white circle onto a larger pink decorative circle die-cut. Die-cut the largest butterfly from pink card and pink patterned paper. Attach the pink card butterfly to the centre of the white circle. Add glue to the body only of the patterned paper butterfly and attach on top. Lift the wings for dimension. Attach the circle to the top of the base using sticky fixers, as shown.
- 3 Add a strip of white ricrac along the bottom of the base, as shown. Stamp a sentiment (the 'Just a note' stamp comes from the free stamp set included with issue 165 of Cardmaking & Papercraft) in black ink onto a 55x19mm piece of white card. Attach over the ricrac as shown, using sticky fixers. Add pearls to the corners and butterfly, to finish.

Get Well Soon

Getwell soon

- 1 Position an 89mm diameter circle die so that it slightly overlaps the top fold of a ready-made base card, and die-cut a circular base.
- 2 Die-cut two 83mm diameter circles from patterned papers. Trim away the top and bottom from one of the circles to create a central border, and attach this piece to the centre of the second circle. Wrap with white ribbon.
- 3 Layer circle panel onto an 89mm diameter white circle. Layer this onto a pink decorative die-cut circle. Attach to base card, and add white pearls around the edge of the decorative circle.
- **4** Die-cut the largest butterfly from pink and white card. Glue the bodies together, and attach to base. Add pearls to the body, and lift wings for dimension.
- 5 Stamp a sentiment in black onto a white die-cut label. Trim, and attach to the base below the central border, as shown.

Best wishes

- 1 Round corners of a 130mm square of pink patterned paper. Use large and medium-sized butterfly dies to cut out apertures, as shown. Layer onto a 133mm white square with rounded corners; add to a 140mm square blue base.
- 2 Attach white ricrac along the bottom of the base as shown. Stamp a sentiment (the 'Best wishes' stamp comes from the free stamp set included with issue 165) in black onto a 63x16mm white pennant. Attach to base.
- 3 Die-cut three large blue butterflies, two medium blue butterflies, three medium white butterflies and two small white butterflies. Add blue butterflies into the corresponding apertures, adding glue to the bodies only. Add medium white butterflies to the centres of the large blue butterflies. Attach small butterflies and pearls, to finish.





Birthday box

- 1 Use template on page 88 to cut out the box from a 152x279mm piece of pink card. Score along fold lines, fold and assemble.
- 2 Layer seven 93x17mm pieces of patterned paper onto seven 97x21mm pieces of white card. Attach to the sides of base and lid.
- 3 Layer a 93mm square of strawberry patterned paper onto a 97mm square of white card. Add to top of lid.
- 4 Stamp 'Happy Birthday' (stamp comes from the free stamp set included with issue 165 of *Cardmaking & Papercraft*) sentiment in black in the centre of an 83mm diameter white circle. Layer onto an 89mm diameter pink circle. Attach to lid, using sticky fixers.
- 5 Die-cut four large butterflies from patterned paper and four medium butterflies from pink card. Attach around the sentiment, as shown, ensuring you only apply glue to the bodies. Lift the wings for dimension. Add pearls to the centre of the large butterflies, to finish.

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Sweet sentiments

Create a bouquet of floral cards for your stash with Carolyne Knott's lovely masked card ideas







Time: 45 minutes per card

Expert: Carolyne Knott

Carolyne has been cardmaking for over 15 years and she is now an expert on everything from stamping to die-cutting. She loves testing new ideas and experimenting with new products. This issue she's been experimenting with masked sentiments to create beautifully stamped cards. Turn the page to get started!

How to make this card and tag

Make beautifully stamped cards with sentiments that pop using docrafts' Folk Floral stamps

hile masks are commonly used in stamping to protect one stamped image while overstamping with another image, the same technique can also be used to protect a blank space on a card.

This can be done by either cutting an aperture into a mask and stamping within the open space, or by placing a shaped mask onto a card and stamping over and around it to create a frame, border or all-over design for the front of your card.

For these cards I used a combination of masks in both simple geometric shapes and more detailed designs, combined with a set of small floral and foliage stamps that enabled me to create bright multi-coloured designs. The great thing about this technique is that it could be suitable for many different tastes and interests.

Cut a 70mm square from a sticky note, and place in the centre of a 130mm square of white card. Using Magenta ink, stamp a daisy three times around the mask, overlapping the edges of the sticky note.



Repeat the process by stamping different varieties of large flowers to make a border as shown, using Garden Patina and Sky Blue inks, overlapping the sticky note mask.



Finish the design by stamping tiny daisies as shown, using Buttercup ink. Carefully remove the sticky note mask.



5 Stamp a sentiment into the aperture in black ink. Layer panel onto white card, and attach to a 148mm square base card.

Carolyne's top tip 66 To get an even and natural-looking design, stamp one colour at a time 99



Fill out the design by stamping small sprays and foliage in Leaf Green and Fern Green inks, and stamping small flowers in Sky Blue ink, as shown.




6 Cut a 130x65mm tag shape and mask a 75x30mm area. Stamp flowers and foliage in coloured inks. Remove mask and stamp sentiment. Layer on two pieces of white card, punch a hole and add a string to finish.

Now try these

More than a mum

- 1 Trim or die-cut 'MUM' from the adhesive-backed area of a sticky note, and stick to a 135mm square of white card.
- 2 Use Garden Patina, Cornflower and Sky Blue inks to stamp over the masked area. This will create a solid design. Extend the stamped design off each side of the panel, gradually stamping lighter towards the edges.
- 3 Remove the mask and use a small spray of foliage and dots around the edges of the design in Fern Green and Leaf Green inks.

Flower borders

- 1 Add a 135x35mm mask across the middle of a 135mm square of card, using the adhesive part of two sticky notes trimmed to fit.
- 2 Stamp large flowers in Violet and Buttercup inks, overlapping the masked strip.
- 3 Add smaller flowers in Magenta Hue ink and foliage in Fern Green, then finish using the small dots stamp.

4 Remove the mask, and stamp a sentiment onto the white strip, using black ink. Layer panel onto a 135mm square of white card, and attach to a 148mm square white base card.



Two more designs to try

Hearts and flowers

- 1 Cut a heart shape from the centre of a piece of paper and attach to a 120mm square of white card with low-tack tape.
- 2 Use Magenta Hue and Sky Blue ink to stamp large flowers into the heart aperture.
- 3 Add small flowers and foliage into the spaces between the larger flowers using Leaf Green, Violet, Magenta Hue and Sky Blue ink pads.
- 4 Remove the mask and stamp a sentiment below the stamped heart. Layer onto white card and attach to a 148mm square base.



Mask an aperture for pretty designs

Flowers for Mum

- 1 Cut a 75mm diameter circle from a sticky note and attach to the centre of a 120mm square of white card.
- 2 Stamp large flowers using Garden Patina, Buttercup, Cornflower and Sky Blue inks, stamping both over the edge of the mask and off the edge of the card.
- 3 Add small flowers in the same hues, and foliage in Leaf Green, to fill in the spaces between the flowers to create an all-over design.
- 4 Remove the mask and stamp a sentiment into the white circle. Layer onto a 135mm square of white card and add to a 148mm square white base card.

Carolyne's hints & tips

Carolyne shares her top tips to help you make your best cards



- * To get a solid image when using clear acrylic stamps (on which regular dye-based inks may bubble), try using permanent or Archival ink pads instead.
- * Try using your dies as masks for letters and shapes.
- * To make sure you can see the shapes when using more detailed masks, such as letters, stamp over with a solid stamp design.
- * When stamping shapes like squares, make sure the corner areas include some strong shapes to make sure the shape is clearly defined.
- * To get an even and naturallooking design, stamp one colour at a time, spacing the shapes roughly the same distance apart. You don't need to be exact.

Explosion cards

You'll be bursting with excitement

over Clare Buswell's fab special explosion cards

number 2 xplosion cards can look really impressive. Adding a threedimensional element to your cards always adds interest and the pop-up surprises inside of these cards are sure to wow! The folded inserts for these explosion cards are based on a series of clever folds that are origami-inspired. It's best to start with the easy version first and once you've mastered that, give the slightly more complex folding a try. The more complex fold is based on the Turkish Map fold, which was a traditional way to fold maps. I've used this fold on two of the cards I made, but they look totally different by simply turning the orientation of the card.

Once you've made the basic structure of these cards, there are lots of possibilities in decorating your cards, as there are so many surfaces to work with. Because of the way these cards 'explode' open, they make perfect birthday cards or are great for any kind of celebration or surprise!

Keeping the outside of these cards fairly simple will increase the impact of the fun surprise inside! I hope you give these fun cards a try!





Easy fold card



Measure and cut a 180mm square of blue patterned paper. Fold the square in half, open up and fold in half again in the opposite direction. Open out and flip over to the reverse side.




Fold the square diagonally to make a triangle. Make sure the corners are aligned, then use a bone folder to achieve crisp folds. Open up again back to the square.


Complex fold cards



Measure and cut a 210mm square of patterned paper. Fold the square diagonally, open up and fold again in the opposite direction. Open out and flip over to the other side.



Pold the square in half horizontally, making sure that the corners meet. Use a bone folder along the crease to create a nice, crisp line. Open up square again.



Open out the shape slightly and tuck the points in at each corner as shown. Fold flat and use the bone folder to crease the lines. This is the competed explosion insert ready for decoration once attached to the base.



For a horizontal opening card, apply double-sided tape to one side of the insert. Align the point to the centrefold of the base and attach. Apply double-sided tape to the top of insert and close the base.



With the square open, push the two sides inwards to form a smaller square or a diamond as shown. This is the completed exploding element insert, ready to be decorated once attached to the base.



4 Layer patterned paper inside a 140mm square yellow base. Add double-sided tape to bottom of insert, align point to centrefold and attach. Add double-sided tape to top of insert and close base to fix in position. Decorate!



Gently push in the sides in to form a triangle, as shown. The long side should measure 210mm in length and the smaller sides should measure 147mm in length. Use a bone folder to crease the lines.



With the long edge at the top, fold the corners of the triangle inwards so the tips meet in the centre of the long straight edge. Flip over and repeat, folding on the other side of the triangle, using a bone folder.



Once dry, open out and cut 'house' shaped white card to fit into the insert areas on either side as shown. Add pieces of patterned paper to remaining insert areas and decorate as desired.



8 For the portrait opening, add a 'house' shaped piece of white card to the bottom panel and patterned paper to other areas. Add sentiments, then decorate the cards with stickers, twine and sequins to finish.

Clare's top hints & tips

Follow these handy hints from Clare to help you create your explosion cards



- * Make sure the paper you use for the insert isn't too thick, or the card will be very bulky when closed.
- ★ Practise the folding techniques several times using a spare piece of paper before using your good patterned papers.
- * Ensure your corners are perfectly aligned before folding, and use a bone folder for nice, crisp lines.
- * When attaching the insert to your card base, it's really important to adhere one side first, add double-sided tape to the other side and close the card shut with the insert in position. This will make sure it's aligned properly.
- ★ Experiment with the inserts to see what other designs would work well with them. The easy fold is the perfect shape for a graduation cap and would make a great congratulatory card. The more complex fold turned on its side would make a fab kid's card, as it looks just like a monster's mouth!







Cupcake box

Present your yummy Mother's Day treats in pretty paper style with this fantastic little cupcake box you can use again and again!

- 1 Cut out, score and fold the cupcake box base template on page 87 using red card. Glue the inside panels to assemble. Trim four 60mm squares of So Sweet paper, layer onto pink card and attach to the box.
- 2 Cut the box lid template on page 87 from red card. Die-cut
- a circle from the centre and attach acetate to the reverse. Add four scalloped strips of pink card to each side of the lid and a circle border around the aperture. Score, fold and glue the panels to assemble.
- 3 Add fussy cut cupcakes, pearls, die-cut flowers & glitter.



Mother's Day card

Show your mum just how much you care with a beautiful card - nothing says 'love' like a handmade gesture

- 1 Layer a 140mm square of Happy Heart Day paper onto red card and attach to a 150mm square white base. Attach a 125mm square of Adore You paper layered onto red card.
- 2 Wrap a green ribbon around a 140x40mm piece of Happy Heart Day paper and secure on the reverse. Laver onto a 145x50mm piece of red card with a scalloped border and attach to the base.
- 3 Attach a white doily to a 100mm circle of red card and add centrally to the base using sticky fixers. Stamp a sentiment onto a 63mm circle of white card and layer onto a red scalloped circle. Attach to the base with sticky fixers.
- 4 Add a floral chipboard shape and punched butterfly. Attach pearls, to finish.



Pretty gift bag

This darling purse is fab for any mum – it can be used as a gift bag, mini storage solution or simply a pretty decoration

- 1 Trim the template on page 86 from Sweethearts paper. Score and fold, pushing the sides in to create a bag shape.
- 2 Attach two 150mm pieces of ribbon to the top insides of the bag, looping and securing with double-sided tape. Attach two 60x20mm pieces of Sweethearts paper over the ribbon ends.
- 3 Layer a 20x50mm piece of

- Sweethearts paper onto red card. Add inside the bag, over the top edge, and attach to the front of the bag with a hook and loop fastener.
- 4 Die-cut green leaves and four flowers from Dreamy paper. Trim four circles from red paper, cut into spirals, then roll with a quilling tool. secure and add to each flower. Shape and attach to the front of the bag as shown.

- 3 Die-cut 14 leaf branches from green card. Attach the ends of the stems only in a circle onto the vellum square. Add paper flowers to the wreath. Die-cut the 'Best Mum' sentiment from pink and yellow card. Inlay the yellow letters in the pink banner, colour with Wink of Stella and attach with sticky fixers. Finish with pink gems.

- 1 Ink edges of a 140mm square of striped paper and a 110mm square of heart paper with pink ink, and a 115x60mm piece of blue spotty paper with aqua ink. Attach as shown to a 148mm square aqua base card.
- 2 Die-cut the circular 'Mum' three times from pink card and once from agua. Layer and glue the three pink words together. Pop out the hearts from the aqua die-cut but leave the 'Mum' in, add tape behind the die-cut, inlay pink hearts and attach the letters.
- 3 Layer the sentiment onto a scalloped circle die-cut from heart paper and a stitched-edge circle die-cut from white card: add to base. Add a silver thread bow. Layer together six small die-cut hearts to make three; attach. Add tiny die-cut hearts and gems. Highlight die-cuts with Wink of Stella, to finish.

Highlight hearts and letters with Wink of Stella. Ink edges in pink, layer onto a pink die-cut circle, and add to base as shown, using sticky fixers.
- 3 Trim the stems off the paper flowers and attach as shown. Finish with gems.

- 2 Cut out the circular dress section from one of the toppers from the paper pad. Ink the edges of this and the frame. Attach the frame to the base with sticky fixers, and add the dress section back inside the aperture.
- 3 Stamp sentiment into a frame topper, layer onto black card, and attach to base.
- 4 Trim a butterfly, shape wings and attach as shown. Finish with pearl trim.

- **★** Take time to look over the whole instruction sheet and papers to familiarise yourself with the patterns before you start putting it together.
- * Remove all the pips from the découpage pieces for a more professional looking finish.
- * There are découpage pieces to add behind the windows if you like it is best to glue these in place before gluing the house together. I haven't used these pieces because I liked the idea of placing a battery tea light inside to glow through the open windows.
- * Add detail with glitter glue, gems, pearls or other embellishments.
- **★** Why not make the house as a gift box? You can even create a matching card using the dies and toppers.

How to make a house



Use the large outline die to cut out the basic house shape from the cottage-style patterned paper. Fold along the die-cut score lines and open out again.



Die-cut a small arched window 15mm from the top fold on the front panel. Repeat on the back and right sides. Add another, 25mm from the bottom on the right side.




Fold all tabs along the scored lines, then glue the house together. Glue the roof tiles (1) from the découpage sheet in place, atop the house.



4 Attach the shutters (2, 3) on either side of all four windows using sticky fixers. Support from the inside of the house and press gently to stick in place.



Add the door frame toppers (5, 6, 7) around the front door, with sticky fixers. Attach shrubs (8) on either side using sticky fixers, and add gems.



6 Die-cut two dormers from matching cream card and add windows using the small window die. Add roof tiles and glue in place on the front roof.

Happy birthday

1 Layer a 130mm square of Kraft card onto a 135mm square of green card, and add to a 148mm square white base. Attach a doily to the centre. 2 Cut a 140x50mm pennant from green patterned paper and layer onto green card. Wrap the pennant twice with twine as shown, and attach to the centre of the base with sticky fixers. 3 Layer a 60mm circle of Kraft card onto a larger green scalloped circle. Attach to the pennant using sticky fixers. 4 Trim the sentiment and add using sticky fixers. Finish with gems.



2 It's your birthday!

1 Layer a 135mm square of white card onto a 140mm square of pink card. Attach to a 145mm square white base card. Trim a 110x115mm piece of floral paper diagonally from the bottom left corner upwards as shown. Layer onto a piece of pink card and attach to base. 2 Punch four small flowers from purple patterned paper and two large flowers from pink card. Shape the petals, layer and attach as shown. Punch two leaves from green card and add to either side of the flowers. 3 Layer the sentiment onto pink card with sticky fixers. Attach to base and finish with gems.

1 Attach a 130x65mm piece of purple floral paper and a 130x65mm piece of green floral paper to a 135mm square of purple card. Layer onto a 140mm square of green card. 2 Layer a 140x20mm strip of green floral paper onto purple card. Use a border punch on a 140x10mm piece of green card and attach to the reverse of the strip, leaving the scallops showing. Attach to panel to cover the join, and wrap with twine. Add panel to a 148mm square white base card. 3 Layer a 70x110mm piece of white card onto purple card, then onto green card, using sticky fixers. Add to base with sticky fixers. 4 Die-cut two flowers from green card. Add one directly to the white panel and the other above it with sticky fixers. Die-cut two flowers from purple card, trim blooms, shape and attach. Add sentiment and gems as shown.

1 Layer a 130mm square of rose patterned paper onto a 135mm square of Kraft card. Layer onto a 130x105mm piece of white card with scalloped edges along the top and bottom. Attach to base with sticky fixers. 3 Cut a base for a 110mm-wide envelope out of vellum. Punch hearts from red card and glue them inside the envelope before closing it up. Add the envelope to the base, putting adhesive in areas where it will not show through. 4 To finish, add more hearts and attach a sentiment with sticky fixers.

How to make the card and tag



ncrusted jewel or 'Frantage' is a fabulous technique that adds a ■ touch of glamour to your card designs! The range of products from Stampendous include mica flakes, crushed glass glitter, fine glitter and colour fragments which work well alone or mixed to create various textural effects. Easily applied to a thin layer of glue, these products really do turn even a plain piece of card into your very own encrusted jewel.

Be sure to use scrap paper under your card when you apply the different elements so that any excess can be tipped back into the pots or kept as a mix for another time. Use your imagination with the encrusted jewel technique to enhance your card designs. For example, you can create frames or panels as shown in these card designs or you could apply glue randomly for a more informal, yet just as pretty, finished effect. Alternatively, apply the different elements using embossing powder, to brads or buttons to make unique encrusted embellishments to decorate your cards and papercrafts. Enjoy!

Cut a 120mm square of Kraft card with a 90mm aperture. Spread PVA glue in a thin layer over the frame. Sprinkle pink mica flakes, gold glass glitter and finish with fine gold glitter. Tap off the excess and leave to dry.





4 Stamp and heat emboss a butterfly using clear powder. Colour with ProMarkers. Reheat the butterfly and sprinkle with gold glitter. Apply heat from below before tapping off the excess. Repeat for two more and trim.



5 Stamp and heat emboss a greeting in grev ink and clear powder onto 75x30mm of ivory card. Laver onto pink card, and add to base card with sticky fixers to create a stopper. Add butterflies with sticky fixers.





Score across the middle of the front of a 150mm square tent fold base card to create an easel. Attach a 150mm square Kraft card to the bottom of the front flap. Attach a 135mm square of pink card and the lilac image. Add the frame with sticky fixers.



6 Stamp a lilac blossom onto a 65x85mm ivory card. Colour and laver onto pink and Kraft card. Add glitter to the flowers. Attach a 30x70mm panel of jewelled card and a butterfly. Punch a hole and add ribbon.

Now try these

Birthday **butterflies**

- 1 Cut a 60x115mm piece of Kraft card. Spread PVA glue over the card to cover it with a thin layer. Sprinkle blue mica flakes, then silver glass glitter and finish with fine silver glitter. Tap off the excess and leave to dry.
- 2 Stamp and heat emboss a butterfly using clear powder. Colour with ProMarkers. Reheat butterfly and sprinkle with fine silver glitter. Apply heat from below before tapping off the excess. Repeat for a second butterfly and cut out carefully.
- **3** Layer an 85x125mm piece of ivory card onto a 92x135mm piece of pale blue card and attach onto a 105x150mm Kraft base card. Add the encrusted jewel panel in the middle of the base.
- 4 Stamp a greeting onto a 75x25mm piece of ivory card in blue ink, and

attach centrally with sticky fixers. Use sticky fixers to shape the butterfly wings and attach as shown.

Flower friends

- 1 Cut a 70mm square of Kraft card and spread PVA glue over it in a thin layer. Sprinkle shaved ice over the card, then rose colour fragments, and finish with gold glitter. Tap off the excess and leave to dry.
- 2 Stamp a flower in magenta ink and heat emboss using clear powder. Colour with ProMarkers. Reheat and sprinkle with fine gold glitter. Apply heat from below before tapping off the excess. Stamp two sets of large leaves in olive green ink and emboss with clear powder. Add glitter. Cut out all three pieces.
- 3 Layer an 85x125mm piece of ivory card onto a 95x135mm piece of pale pink card. Attach to a 105x150mm Kraft base. Add the encrusted jewel panel towards the top using sticky fixers.



4 Stamp a sentiment in olive green ink under the encrusted panel. Attach the flower with sticky fixers and use glue to attach the leaves as shown.



Two more to try

Create a beautiful embellished background

Bird life

- 1 Cut a 90x120mm piece of Kraft card. Spread PVA glue over the card to cover it with a thin layer. Sprinkle Silver Lux Mix over the card. Tap off the excess and leave to dry.
- 2 Stamp and heat emboss the bird using clear powder. Colour with ProMarkers. Reheat and sprinkle with fine gold glitter. Apply heat from below before tapping off the excess. Repeat with the branch and two sets of small leaves. Trim carefully.
- 3 Layer a 100x130mm piece of ivory card onto pale pink card. Attach to a 120x150mm Kraft base. Add the encrusted jewel panel in the middle using sticky fixers.
- 4 Stamp a sentiment using grey ink onto a 50x35mm piece of ivory card, and attach in



the bottom left corner with sticky fixers. Attach the branch and bird with sticky fixers as shown. Add the leaves in place.

Make borders or frames Hummingbird card with jewelled elements

1 Stamp the flowers in olive green ink onto

- a 130mm square of ivory card and colour with ProMarkers. Add dots of glue and apply glitter to the flower centres.
- 2 Cut a 120mm square of Kraft card with a 90mm aperture. Spread PVA glue over the frame to cover it with a thin layer. Sprinkle blue mica flakes, then silver glass glitter and finish with fine silver glitter. Tap off the excess and leave to dry.
- 3 Stamp and heat emboss a hummingbird using clear powder. Colour with ProMarkers. Reheat and sprinkle with fine silver glitter. Apply heat from below before tapping off the excess. Repeat with a second bird and trim carefully.

Dorothy's hints & tips

Dorothy has some handy pointers to help you get the most of your



encrusted jewel cards

- ★ Use ordinary PVA glue for the encrusted jewel technique so that the glue doesn't dry before you add all the elements.
- * As mica is difficult to trim, go around gently pushing any pieces in before the glue dries, so that they are flush with the edge of the card.
- **★** Sandwich the encrusted jewel card between layers of paper and place a heavy board on top so that it
- ★ Use tweezers to hold the card and work quickly when you reheat the stamped embossing so that the glitter adheres to the molten powder.
- **★** Always heat the embossing from below (under the card) if there is loose glitter on the image.
- **★** Work your way from the largest to smallest pieces when adding the jewels. Start with mica and work down so it all adheres well.
- * The Frantage range from Stampendous has so many fun mica and colour fragments, glitters and jewels. Find the right products for your card or mix several together to make your own.

ith subtle hints that spring has sprung, you'll love these new little boy stamps from Lili of the Valley. From a Sunday stroll to time in the garden, this cute character is ready for summer and all that the warm weather has to offer.



The gardener

Rotate the sketch 90 degrees and move the sentiment. Attach a 100x145mm piece of patterned paper to a 105x150mm white base card. Add 90x130mm and 105x30mm pieces of coordinating papers. Stamp the image onto a 75x120mm piece of white card, colour and trim to make the tag shape. Layer onto coloured paper, leaving a thin border around the edge, and attach to the base using sticky fixers. Add a printed or stamped sentiment to the top, and finish with sequins and a length of ribbon.




Under the bonnet

Follow the sketch exactly. Attach a 145x100mm piece of patterned paper to a 150x105mm white base card. Add 130x90mm and 30x105mm pieces of coordinating papers as shown. Stamp the image onto a 120x75mm piece of white card and colour. Trim to make a tag shape and layer onto coloured paper, leaving a thin border around the edge. Attach to the base using sticky fixers. Add a printed or stamped sentiment to the side, and finish with sequins and a length of ribbon.



What's a sketch?

If you haven't heard of this before, a sketch is a term used to describe a basic card layout. It's there to provide you with an idea of how to build up your card. From this you can introduce your own ideas by following the layout, but using your own choice of papers and embellishments.



Sunday stroll

Move the elements of the sketch to give a different look. Attach a 145x100mm piece of patterned paper to a 150x105mm white base card. Add 130x90mm and 30x105mm pieces of coordinating papers. Stamp the image onto a 120x75mm piece of white card and colour. Trim to make a tag shape and layer onto coloured paper, leaving a thin border around the edge. Attach to the base using sticky fixers. Add a printed or stamped sentiment to the side, and finish with sequins and a length of ribbon.





1 Attach a 110x92mm piece of floral patterned paper along the bottom of a 110x140mm piece of black card. 2 Wrap with white ribbon to cover the join, and secure on the reverse. 3 Stamp a sentiment in VersaMark ink onto the black card above the ribbon, and heat emboss in white. 4 Attach the panel to a 105x140mm base card and use a corner rounder punch to round the bottom corners. To finish, add a white ribbon bow as shown.





1 Cover the front of a 140x110mm base card with black card. 2 Die-cut a scalloped border from the bottom edge of a 140x110mm piece of white card.

Wrap the bottom of the panel twice with black twine. Attach the panel along the top of the base.

1 Cut out the gift bag base from black card using the template on page 89 and fold along the score lines. 2 Cover the front and back panels with patterned paper, wrapping over the top as shown. Add 10mm strips of black card to the top edges and the centres of the bag sides as shown. 3 Trim two 20mm squares of black card and cut them diagonally to create four triangles, and add to the bottom corners of the bag sides. 4 Trim two 10x140mm pieces of black card for the handles. Attach to the top of the sides using white brads. 5 To finish, heat emboss a sentiment in white onto a black card

tag, and attach using black twine.



4 Suit jacket card

1 Attach a 120x165mm piece of white card to a 120x148mm base, so that it overhangs the top of the base. Fold a 125x20mm strip of white card into a collar and attach centrally to the top of the base. Trim away excess white card on either side of the collar. 2 Attach a 15x148mm strip of white card with stitched borders to the base, under the collar, as shown. 3 Fold the top corners back of two 70x148mm pieces of patterned paper to create the suit collars as shown. Add to base, attaching the collars with sticky fixers. 4 Attach a 35x10mm strip to the top of a 35x40mm piece of patterned paper to create a pocket. Trim the bottom corners and add two triangles of black card to the reverse. Attach pocket to base using sticky fixers. 5 Add a die-cut a bow and buttons, to finish.



Thank you tag

1 Trim two 90x130mm pennant tags, one from white card and another from patterned paper. Attach the patterned paper tag to the reverse of the white tag at an angle, as shown. 2 Add a 90x10mm strip of black card along the bottom of a 90x100mm piece of patterned paper. Attach along the top of the white tag. Stamp a sentiment in black ink onto the white base below the patterned paper. 3 Stamp 'thank you' three times in white ink onto black card. Cut out and attach using sticky fixers. 4 Punch a hole in the top of the tag and add black ribbon.



Gift box

1 Create a 62mm cubed white base box with an open top. 2 Trim two 189x63mm pieces of patterned paper. Score and fold at 63mm and 126mm. Glue the end squares of one piece to the end squares of the second pieces to form a 63mm square band. Slide over the base of the box. 3 Trim a 300x15mm strip of black card. Fold it around the box, as shown, and secure the ends together. 4 Die-cut or punch several flowers from black card, layer together and add gem in the centre. Attach to the black band, as shown.

Notepad

1 Attach a 75x117mm piece of white card along the bottom edge of a 75x127mm notepad and round the corners. 2 Add a narrow strip of silver glitter paper along the bottom edge of a 75x8mm piece of black card. Attach along the bottom of a 75x93mm piece of patterned paper. Add to the notepad, as shown. 3 Use the SugarPea Designs: Notebook Journal Card die set to cut out the word 'notes', brackets, arrow, ampersand, pencil and pen from black card and silver glitter paper. Assemble the pen and pencil as shown. 4 Arrange and attach the die-cuts to the notepad and colour the top with black pen to match.

9 Happy birthday

1 Trim four 108x23mm strips of chevron patterned paper. Attach them across a 108x139mm piece of white card, as shown. Die-cut a 78mm circle from the panel and attach to a 108x139mm base card using sticky fixers. 2 Die-cut a 78mm circle from the centre of an 83mm circle of black card to create a frame, and attach the frame around the aperture, as shown. 3 Die-cut 'happy' and 'birthday' from black card. Attach inside the circular aperture. Add black die-cut flowers and punched leaves around the aperture. To finish, add gems to the centres of the flowers.



Perpetual calendar

1 Score and fold a 279x206mm piece of black card at 93mm and 186mm. Turn it 90 degrees and fold the top flap down so that the bottom edge meets the second score line. 2 Punch holes 15mm from the top fold, at 25mm and 70mm from the left edge. Repeat from the right. 3 Attach 200x90mm patterned paper to

base. Add a layered sentiment centrally with sticky fixers for a stopper. 4 Trim twenty-six 40x84mm pieces of white card, punch a hole 11mm from the top and add a

paper strip to the bottom. Stamp four "0s" and "1s", three "2s" and "3s" and two each of 4–9. 5 Thread numbers onto jump rings and through base. (First stack: 0-3, second: 0-9, third: 0-1, fourth: 0-9). To finish, attach a 10mm strip of paper centrally to separate days from months.



ake a wish

1 Trim a 65x120 pennant from black card. Stamp sentiments and stars in VersaMark ink and heat emboss in white. 2 Attach the embossed panel to the top edge of an 85x130mm piece of patterned paper as shown. 3 Punch a hole in the top of the tag and add black and white striped ribbon.

ovely to be with you again, sharing more of my makes and finds. This industry sure does keep producing incredible products, doesn't it? I still get such a thrill when I use products and discover the possibilities. However, sometimes, inks, pens and paints can be unpredictable, and things can go wrong. It's okay if it does though, as you can start again, or you may find you've produced something wonderful. With that also comes a



little bit of sadness as you'll likely never be able to create that precise piece again! Obviously this is no reason to stop playing and learning. It just means when you do create something wonderful, you need to savour the moment and the unexpected result.

This month I had my first play with Tim Holtz Distress Crayons, and I'm hooked! They are very creamy and will glide onto your cardstock. I love the texture they produce, which is completely different from inks and paints. They'll blend, but you do need to put down quite a bit of crayon to get them to blend with your finger. They'll also react with water, but only if you use a brush, sponge, your finger, etc. This is a cool concept and means they are good when creating layers. I wanted to share some of my finds with you.

- 1 First, stamp a male face onto the right side of a 115x120mm piece of white Coated Clarity Card.
- 2 Build up the background with the Distress Crayons, scribbling a little at a time and working it into the card with your finger. You'll find that you can almost rub the colour away if you apply too much pressure. Keep laying down colour until you are happy with the effect. The crayons will act a lot differently on the coated card than they will on normal card.
- 3 Using a circle stencil, colour a few of the circles with your crayons, and work them into the card to get a very subtle image.
- 4 Use your crayons to colour the face. I used my crayons more specifically, to add detail and interest to my image. I didn't work the colour in as much as when I was creating my background, so the colours are more prominent.
- 5 Stamp the letter background to the left to complete the background. I stamped using first and second generation ink.

6 Stamp a sentiment stamp on the left-hand side. Colour a 148mm square Kraft base card as you wish and attach your stamped panel along with layers of black and Kraft card.

- 1 For a different finish, use the crayons on a 95x115mm piece of white card. I worked my background first, scribbling the colour, then blending with a paintbrush. I didn't work the ink in completely, as I love texture. Work over the top to intensify the colour and create new tones.
- 2 I then stamped directly onto the coloured panel and found the crayons don't resist ink!

- **3** Use the background stamp on a 148mm square Kraft base and go around the edges with the crayons – they're perfect for edging.
- 4 I stamped the bird and glasses onto white card, then drew a branch for my bird. Colour the stamped images, adding a little colour at a time, then spread it with a damp paintbrush. If you need to be more detailed, scribble onto watercolour card, add water and use a paintbrush. Cut out the dry images.
- 5 Apply a little white Gesso paint to the bird image and some extra colour to the circles. I blended with my finger.
- 6 Add the bird and branch to the panel and layer the panel onto black and purple card. Attach the sentiment and glasses in place.

Leonie's hints & tips

Follow Leonie's expert advice and ideas for making these coloured cards and a hanging



- * Experiment on different surfaces, as the crayons will react differently.
- * You can lighten your shades by bringing in the White Picket Fence Distress Crayon.
- **★** You can make a palette to work on and pick your colours up from using watercolour card, or even just scribbling onto a heat-resistant craft mat. Add a little water with a paintbrush and pick the colour up.
- **★** The crayons work interestingly with inks. The inks will react with a spritz of water, while the crayons remain as they are until physically blended.
 - * Try dampening your card, then adding the cravons, for an interesting effect.

Prepare to be amazed

This time, I wanted to see what the crayons would be like on MDF, and they were perfect!

1 First, I worked my background, simply laying down colours by scribbling, then blending. I used my finger for subtle blends, but a

2 Use the clock and circle stamp to build up the background, stamping directly onto the coloured

- 3 I wanted to see if the crayons would react with the crackle glaze, so added a layer on top, which worked perfectly.
- 4 Now, stamp the images and sentiment onto white card and colour them in. I coloured my small embellishments, too. Attach them as shown, using sticky fixers (obviously wait until the glaze is dry first).
- 5 Thread the jute so the panel can be hung, and finish with a touch of gold gilding wax.





Cardmaking in China

Chinese cardmaker Jasmine Ji tells us how a teenage trend became her lifelong hobby, and recommends her favourite paper shop in Shanghai

y name is Jasmine Ji, and I'm from Shanghai, China. I've been making cards since 1999, when I was just a teenager.

Around that time, I found that a lot of people were sending cards to each other for holidays, such as Christmas and New Year. It was a fashionable thing to do at that time. Almost at the same time, my mum started to give me pocket money. You could buy cards all around at the local shops and markets, but they weren't cheap, and if you had 30 or 35 people in your class, that added up! I really wanted to save my pocket money to buy other things, so I decided to start making cards by

myself. I made my first cards just to save money, but my mum really loved the cards I was making, and it became a hobby that I've enjoyed ever since.

I mostly make cards for family members' and friends' birthdays, as well as other big events like weddings or Christmas - my husband is American, and this year, I even made cards for Thanksgiving. I also make cards for traditional Chinese celebrations - Chinese New Year for sure, and a couple of times in the past, I've also made cards for the Moon Festival that takes place every year in early autumn.

One of my most recent projects was

a set of 'Welcome little one' cards to announce the birth of my son, Julian, in 2016. He was born in the Year of the Monkey, so I made quite a few monkey motifs to stick on my cards.

Instead of drawing or stamping, I like to stick things on my cards like toppers or other small embellishments to make them three-dimensional. I like to try to stick lots of different kinds of things on cards, from plants to cartoon characters!

At the beginning, I would look at the types of cards on sale in the shops and markets to get inspiration, but later on I started to just use my imagination. Nowadays, I only make cards for

people close to me, so my inspiration really comes from the person I am giving it to. I also search online and use Pinterest to find new ideas.

Although sending cards was popular when I was at school, Chinese people generally don't give each other cards for birthdays or holidays. Cards are given more to say 'thank you' than for anything else, and I do receive many cards for Teacher's Day, as I'm a teacher.

Cardmaking is not a popular hobby here, either, but I know there are some others doing it. I don't know of any



Chinese cardmaking magazines, but there are websites and blogs that I follow. Apu's Box (apuapu.blogbus. com) is a blog of a Chinese cardmaker who has written two books about stamping. I also follow the Weibo – that's China's version of Twitter account of Quality Handmade, a Chinese online shop (liangpinshouzuo.taobao.com) that sells lots of imported cardmaking products, including papers, stamps, embossing folders, inks and more.

China is the country that invented paper, so there are many different types of paper available here! There's a great paper shop on Fuzhou Road – traditionally, the centre of publishing activity in Shanghai - called Ishikawa Patterned Papers, which sells lots of pretty papers, including papers from Japan. I went there a lot in high school and in university.

While lovely papers are widely available in China, since cardmaking isn't a very popular hobby here, I have to use my own ingenuity for everything else! I also do a lot of shopping for cardmaking materials when I'm travelling abroad. I especially love Jo-Ann's in the US, which sells everything related to cardmaking in a very systematic way. During the Christmas holiday, I visited Japan and found a lovely little paper shop in Kyoto. Finding cardmaking shops and markets has become my new hobby during travelling!

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Origami flower

Double-sided papers, especially those decorated with small patterns, work best to create this simple origami flower design. Start by choosing three different papers that complement each other. Die-cut two hexagons from each paper, then fold two sides into the centre of each hexagon to create petals. Arrange as shown in the centre of your base card to create a flower, and attach a button in the centre.





Nuts about you

Hexagons are also ideal for creating industrialthemed cards for men! Die-cut small hexagons from pearlescent paper or silver mirri card, then punch a hole out of the middles to make nuts. You could also cut the hexagons from grey card and use gilding wax for the metallic effect. Scatter them across the base, embellish with suede cord, and add a sentiment for the perfect male card.

Patchwork quilt

To create this pretty patchwork quilt effect, you will need five papers with small patterns on them. Small florals work especially well. Die-cut six hexagons in each pattern, then starting in the centre, glue them evenly across a plain background. Keep other embellishments to a minimum to let the pattern be the main focus.

66 Who knew that a cute little shape could be so versatile? There are numerous possibilities that can be created with hexagons, as its unusual shape lends itself well to lots of crafty possibilities. Having a set of hexagon dies makes your crafting even easier and ensures that all your hexagons are neat and even before

you add them to your makes. You can create all sorts of patterns and designs with this clever shape and you can even use them for origami. Get die-cutting with card and paper in your stash, and have fun experimenting. Here are six ideas ideal for both male and female recipients to get you started. 99

Ha-bee birthday

Using a hexagon embossing folder is perfect for creating a hive background for a bee-themed card. Starting in the centre and working outwards, lightly ink the embossed pattern with brown ink to enhance it. Add stamped or fussy cut bees on top and a witty sentiment to create a cute birthday card.






Shaker card

Die-cut a hexagon through white card and glue acetate to the back of the aperture. Run foam tape around the aperture and sprinkle sequins on top of the acetate. Stamp a sentiment onto plain card then attach to the foam tape to create a cute shaker element. Add hexagons die-cut from pretty papers around the shaker.

6 Football star

A mixture of black and white hexagons makes the perfect football! Die-cut a circle from Kraft card to create the base of the football, then glue a hexagon die-cut from black card in the centre. Add white hexagons around it, then pieces of black in the gaps, and trim along the edges of the circle. Add torn green card as shown for the grass.

What colour is VersaMark ink?

Donna Appleyard, Hereford

Dorothy says: VersaMark ink is a clear ink that is generally used for heat embossing as it has a

sticky texture perfect for adhering the embossing powder. VersaMark ink can also be used without embossing to create a subtle watermark effect. Absorbent card without a finish, such as Canson mi-teints. is ideal, and darker colours show the VersaMark better. If you are using both techniques on one card, you will need to stamp and emboss first, then do the watermarking. I used Wild Rose Studio's Antique Roses set to stamp and emboss the rose and frame design onto plain grey card. I then stamped the small flower around the image to create a soft background, before colouring as shown.

I stamped the image again in grey onto ivory card and added a greeting in deep pink.



I'd like to impress my mum this year by making a Mother's Day card that is not just a standard square shape, but I've never tried anything like this before. Where do I start?

Sally Cooke, Cambridge

Lynette says: You are in luck! Hunkydory does a fabulous range of shaped cards that are already made up for you and come with envelopes, so all you need to do is decorate them! This card is made with one of our centre stepper cards, and I think your mum will be chuffed to bits with this extra-special card. To make it, fold a centre stepper card blank on all the score lines to form the base.

You should have one main mountain fold in the centre and three smaller mountain folds at each side. Cover the centre section with a 148x110mm piece of silver mirri card. Then trim a piece of foiled patterned card from the 'A Special Day To Celebrate' topper set slightly smaller than this to layer on top. Repeat to cover the bottom and the four smaller stepper sections. Add the topper to the front with sticky fixers. Then trim some butterflies, and attach with sticky fixers to embellish the card. Finish with a Mother's Day sentiment from the Pearly Sentiments pad.

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
Make sure you use specific quilling paper, as this is the correct weight and thickness to create the best shapes. This is easily found at most craft shops.

Beginners should start with a slotted quilling tool, as this is easier to use than a needle tool. More advanced quillers might prefer a needle tool, as it means you don't get the slight crease at the end of your quilled shape that you do with a slotted tool.

Always quill with clean hands so you don't leave dirty marks on the delicate paper.

Start by learning and mastering the basic shapes like circular coils. teardrops and s-scrolls before you move on to more intricate designs.

Attach guilled shapes to a base card using tacky glue. Make sure vou use the glue sparingly so you don't ruin your shape with messy excess adhesive. Try applying the glue with a cocktail stick for maximum control.



I am planning a baby shower for my daughter and would like to make some small favours for the guests (there will be about 15). Any suggestions?

Katie says: Congratulations on the upcoming arrival! Sizzix has a huge range of dies to make gift boxes, but I think the Sizzix Thinlits Die Set – Everyday Occasions would be perfect for a baby shower. This die set is very simple to put together, and you will be able to make 15 in no time – plus, it comes with a bow for embellishing! It can be cut from plain card or patterned paper and made to match any theme. I have made up the box in pink and grey and added a coordinating bow. I've embellished with a brad, but a button would work well, too.

Do you have any recommendations for stash to make a birthday card for a wine-lover?

Francis Taylor, Southampton

Lynette says: We have just the thing at Hunkydory! One of our new stamp sets would be perfect. 'It's Wine O'Clock' is a fabulous winethemed stamp set featuring all a wine lover could want! This card is made using a triple-layer stamping technique. Cut squares of ivory stamping card to 175mm, 123mm and 75mm, and place these on top of one another. Then, using several different colours of VersaFine ink and a Brilliance ink pad for the corkscrew, stamp the different images randomly over the panels, as if it was just one piece of card. Ink the edges of each stamped panel with Tea Dye Distress Ink, then layer them onto Kraft card. Attach the largest panel to a 178mm square base, and add the other two panels on top, using sticky fixers. Stamp two wine glasses onto a



separate piece of ivory card, using purple ink, and stamp the wine bottle in green. Colour with marker pens, cut out, and attach to the base with sticky fixers (use sticky fixers under the body of the glasses and the bases, not the stems!). Stamp and die-cut the sentiment, ink and distress the edges, and attach with sticky fixers, to finish.

Making many boxes is easy with dies





We love this Spring Duckie stamp from Lili of the Valley. I've seen designers just emboss part of the pattern on an embossing folder but don't understand how they do it. Can you help?

Mary-Jane Griffiths, Banbury

Katie says: There are a couple of different ways you can do this one way is to only place half of the card into the folder so that only a section will emboss, which is what I have done here, using the Sizzix Textured Impressions Embossing Folder - Ovals. I then used a strip of card and twine to cover where the embossed design meets the plain card. Another method would be to die-cut a shape from chipboard and place this into the embossing folder with the card. You will find the card only embosses where the chipboard shape is.





Recently I bought docrafts' All Aboard twine and self-adhesive reels, but mainly because of the colours of the twine. After opening the wrapping I saw 20

> self-adhesive reels, but I have no idea how I can use them!

Alice Romule, Riga

Tracey says: These self-adhesive reels are generally used to secure a hand-made envelope, using the twine to wrap from one reel to the other to keep it shut as in the top photo. However, they can also lend themselves to other creative features on your cards and other projects. For example, they could be coloured to look like wheels on a vehicle, and the twine could be attached to the side of the vehicle as the 'go faster' stripe. On the card I have made here, the reels have been used as the portholes on a ship, and the twine has been used to connect the sails to the rest of the ship.

I don't enjoy stamping, but there are some lovely stamps around, including the Japanese lady from issue 164. Can I use stamps for foiling on cards, and if so how?

Janet Clark, Dover

Dorothy says: The geisha stamp you mention is so pretty, I decided to let you see how it looks when foiled so that you can have a go yourself! I used a starter kit from Indigo Blu (£19.99), which has everything you need, including the Flitterglu, foil flakes and special foams for stamping and removing the excess foil. You apply a little wet glue to the phat foam, and then dab this onto the stamp. Stamp the image (the glue will stay tacky for a while), then tip some foil flakes on top, dab down, and rub off the excess with the Scoochy foam. I stamped and foiled onto patterned paper and cut out different areas to 'dress' the lady. Just to give you another metallic technique, I've also embossed the flower frame that came with the stamp onto white card, then used my finger to smear Wax Gilt over the raised areas. It doesn't matter that the gilding wax gets onto the rest of the panel, as it looks beautiful.

- **★** Foam pads! If you work with intricate dies, build up two or three layers. Another idea is to put them in a white frame. Nicole Haupka
- * Sometimes I lightly ink around the edges, or cut the shape a few times and build up layers to add more depth, or just simple paper-piecing adds extra detail.

- * I use a dauber around and sometimes on the item. A shim of the die behind the main one also gives it dimension. Camilla Sheridan

1 Die-cut the shadow box from ivory card and trim off the three smaller squares. Attach it to a 115mm square of lilac card, using sticky fixers, and then a 124mm square of white card. Attach panel to a 130mm square lilac base card. 2 Add an 86x23mm and a 23x56mm rectangle of purple textured card to the frame using sticky fixers. Die-cut 'Friend' from grey card and attach. 3 Die-cut two bottles from the Retail Therapy collection in lilac and purple. Add die-cut grey tops and Glossy Accents to both bottles. Die-cut the rose and leaves from the In the Garden collection, add grey die-cut petal detail and Glossy Accents over the top. 4 Attach elements as shown and a large die-cut peony and paper rose in coordinating colours. Add pearls to finish.



hanks a latte

1 Die-cut the shadow box from brown card and attach it onto a 107x135mm piece of blue card, using sticky fixers. Attach panel to a 120x150mm piece of teal card. Layer this onto white card, then attach to a 132x162mm white base card. Add a 23x86mm and a 56x23mm rectangle of blue patterned paper to the shadow box, using sticky fixers. 2 Die-cut two mugs, a tea cup and tea pot from teal card using the Thanks A Latte collection. Die-cut a mug and donut from brown card. Colour the tea cup and donut and add Glossy Accents. 3 Die-cut three cupcakes in brown and white, adding the white tops as the icing. Add sprinkles with a gold glitter pen and cover with Glossy Accents. 4 Attach the die-cut elements to the base card using sticky fixers. To finish, attach buttons and pearls as shown.





Ladybird

1 Die-cut the shadow box from ivory card. Use only the three small squares, discarding the rest. On a 117x40mm piece of ivory paper, attach three 23mm squares of grey card, then attach the shadow box on top, using sticky fixers. 2 Attach panel to a 130mm square piece of red card, and layer onto a 138mm square of grey card. Add to a 145mm square white base card. 3 Die-cut three ladybirds from red card using the In the Garden collection. Use the die as a stencil to add detail with a black fineline pen, and attach in the shadow box using sticky fixers. 4 To finish, die-cut and add the 'Just for you' sentiment centrally.

Thank you

onto a 148x118mm piece of ivory card, using sticky fixers, then add to a 155x125mm green base card. 2 Die-cut four butterflies, three roses and a sentiment from mauve card using the In the Garden collection. Attach to the base, folding the butterflies' wings up for dimension. 3 Cut two stemmed flowers in green and attach to base as shown. Colour the leaves using a green fineline pen. 



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Upcycle with... frames

Hexagons frame

1 Remove the backing board and glass from the frame. Lightly sand the surface and clean with a dry cloth. Paint with a coat of white acrylic paint and leave to dry. Repeat with a second coat if required. 2 Apply a thin layer of découpage glue over the surface and sides of the frame. Take a sheet of hexagon découpage paper (all découpage papers used here are by First Edition, and available at Hobbycraft) and stick over the front and sides of the frame, smoothing out any air bubbles. Leave to dry, then carefully cut out the aperture with a sharp craft knife. Apply a thin layer of glue all over the surface to seal, and leave to dry. 3 Die-cut different sized hexagons and sentiments from patterned papers. Glue to the frame as shown. Cut and tie a small ribbon bow and glue to frame. To finish, embellish with pastel coloured gems.

Never use a boring frame again – be inspired by Suzie Attaway's fabulous ideas to display your photos!

Flamingos and butterflies

1 Remove the backing board and glass from the frame. Lightly sand the surface and clean with a dry cloth. Paint with a coat of white acrylic paint and leave to dry. Repeat with a second coat if required. 2 Paint a thin layer of découpage glue over the surface and sides of the frame. Take a sheet of tropical découpage paper and stick over the front and sides of the frame, smoothing out any air bubbles. Leave to dry, then carefully cut out the aperture with a sharp craft knife. Apply a thin layer of glue all over the surface to seal, and leave to dry. 3 Die-cut eight butterflies from different patterned papers. Attach together four pairs and slightly bend their wings. Add pearls to the middles of each, then glue them to each corner of the frame. Finish by adding coordinating ribbon along the inside edges of the frame with glue.

Woodland frame

1 Remove the backing board and glass from the frame. Lightly sand the surface and clean with a dry cloth. Paint with a coat of white acrylic paint and leave to dry. Repeat with a second coat if required. 2 Paint a thin layer of découpage glue over the surface and sides of the frame. Stick woodland découpage paper over the front and sides of the frame, smoothing out any air bubbles. Leave to dry, then carefully cut out the aperture. Apply a thin



layer of glue all over the surface to seal, and leave to dry.

3 Cut four 40x150mm pieces of spotty paper. Score each at 10mm intervals and fold in an accordion style to form a fan shape. Attach them together form a circle. Glue lengths of ribbons to the back of the rosette. Cut out two paper hearts from woodgrain paper and add one to the middle of the rosette. Glue the rosette to the top left corner and the second heart to the bottom right. To finish, decorate the hearts and frame with coordinating buttons.



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

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Glossary

From die-cutting to découpage – if you're new to the cardmaking world you might be wondering what it all means...

Accordion folding A mountain and valley style folding technique that creates a concertina-style fold.

Aperture An aperture is a shaped hole cut from the front of a base card.

Bone folder A tool used to make a neat, sharp crease in paper or card.

Découpage There are two very different découpage techniques. The first is the art of creating a 3D image from paper layers. The smaller parts of a repeated image are cut out and layered on top of the original image with sticky fixers. The second is when pieces of découpage paper are used to cover an object, usually using watered-down PVA glue or Mod Podge.

Die-cutting A die-cutting machine cuts out shapes from paper or card. The machine sandwiches metal dies (templates) over your chosen card, which is then fed through a roller by turning a handle on the machine.

Distressing A technique where card or paper is distressed with a tool to create a rough-edged, aged finish.

Embossing This technique adds a raised image, pattern or greeting. It is often done by hand using a stencil or board with an embossing tool.

Embossing folder This plastic folder has a raised design on one side and an indented design on the other. Place card inside the folder and run through a die-cutting machine using the correct plates to emboss.

Embossing paste This is a thick paste that can be applied to cards to create a raised, embossed image, usually used with a stencil.

Faux stitching This involves using a fineline pen or coloured gel pen to imitate stitches by drawing lines.

Glossy Accents This is a clear, three-dimensional gloss made by Ranger. Use it to accent and protect distinct areas of your projects.

Heat embossing This technique creates a shiny, raised effect on a stamped image. Stamp using a slow-drying ink such as VersaMark, sprinkle over with embossing powder and tap off the excess before gently heating with a heat tool.

Kraft card This is light brown, usually recycled, card that is used for layering with backing papers.

Masking This involves covering an area of card before stamping or colouring so that the colour or image underneath is unaffected

ProMarkers A brand of alcoholbased, blendable marker pens.

Punches These are used to punch out shapes to decorate cards. There is a huge variety available, including border punches and nesting punches.

Shrink plastic Use this to make embellishments: stamp onto it then heat to shrink the image. It comes in a range of colours, as well as patterns.

Sticky fixers These are tiny, sticky foam pads used to give a 3D effect when attaching panels to a base card, or between layers of découpage.

Suspension card A card with an aperture from which a shape is hung.

Vellum A translucent or semitranslucent parchment paper.

VersaMark ink A thick, clear ink that dries slowly, which is used in stamping and heat embossing.

Washi tape This is a kind of decorative masking tape with the properties of rice paper.

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The last word with... Charlotte Harding

How do you satisfy cardmakers on four different continents? Stampin' Up!'s European Product Specialist has the answers

oes Stampin' Up! have one single catalogue for the whole world? Yes, it does, for the markets we operate in so far: the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Netherlands, Austria, United States, Canada, New Zealand and Australia. Japan has its own little abridged catalogue.

When did the company start localising its products? Right from the beginning, from 2007. We started out with a handful of translated sets, then we had to make adjustments really quickly. We were soon made aware that French-Canadian is not the same as French-French, and Germans didn't like literal translations of American phrases. We opened the Dutch market purely in English, but now that market is growing at a super-fast rate, so we've started injecting a few Dutch translated sets, too. We have our own translation and communications department, to ensure we get great and fully localised translations – and the translation brainstorms are so much fun!

How long have you been involved in this aspect of product development? I have worked for Stampin' Up! Europe almost from the word 'go', starting in early 2008. I started as Europe's Trainer and Event Coordinator, mainly training the use of products to our demonstrators, but as my passion and enthusiasm for our products never waned, it was a natural progression to join our Products Department to become Europe's voice as our

Product Specialist. I'm involved in pretty much The Beautiful You stamp set comes in

everything on the developing side, from lots of market research and brainstorming new ideas, to approving translation selections for upcoming catalogues, right up to the much harder bits like forecasting, and everything in between. I still train and present our products at larger events, and - exaggerating a little - for the rest of the year, I get to test, play with and give loud opinions all day about our great papercrafting products. I simply love my job. Coolest ever.

Can you give us some examples of the kinds of things that might get adjusted for the European market? There are dozens! For the Brits and Australians we have to typically start with spellings: 'mom' vs. 'mum' or minimising

the use of words like 'favourite' with or without a 'u'. We have to make compromises and occasionally approve words like 'Awesome!'. The US in turn has had to compromise on major holiday representations such as Thanksgiving or 4th of July – and the use of their word 'holiday'. For 'happy birthday', the French say 'joyeux anniversaire', but it's 'bonne fête' in Canada. Halloween is a huge crafting opportunity in the USA, but it is still not a major event on mainland Europe, so we only invest in translation on only one, maybe two, of these collections and just leave the rest in English. The Germans and Austrians celebrate Christmas on the 24th and not the 25th, so we need to consider dates and numbers too, and add characters such as Nikolaus in Germany and Sinterklaas in the Netherlands.

> Have there been any adjustments of products or cultural differences that have really surprised you? How to spell 'auntie' (or 'aunty')! The French don't, on the whole, send cards for Christmas, but they do for



New Year's. There aren't any 'woodland animals', such as badgers, squirrels and foxes, in the South Pacific, and they want beach scenes for Christmas. We have to think global, with the US being the biggest market - how many kangaroos and koalas can we inject into our catalogue that will sell globally? Valentine's is huge in the US amongst children, giving cards and little gifts to schoolmates and teachers, yet in Europe it is celebrated mainly amongst adults, with just cards, flowers and chocolates. Language-wise, word plays are always challenging: as images cannot be changed, translators have to become really creative to make sentiments such as 'you're purrrfect', accompanied by a picture of a kitten, work in French, Dutch or German.

Where do you look to spot new trends? There are colour trends, fashion, and interior design. We do find, in the crafting world, that usually, trends arrive in the US first and Europe a bit later. Sometimes a certain colour that is popular in fashion or interior design takes a little longer to make its way into crafting. We look anywhere and

everywhere for colour inspiration and what would work well in papercrafting.

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
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
