Brenda Brown has created the wonderful assemblage that graces our cover. Another spring themed work for you to admire, and have a go at creating yourselves. Just gorgeous!


We are welcoming Kath Stewart to the Craft Stamper family this issue.



Step into Spring with PaperArtsy

Use sets of smaller coordinating stamps and stencils to create more cohesive projects. By Kath Stewart

am so excited about the latest release of stamps and stencils released by PaperArtsy from the designer Lin Brown. I have always loved stamp sets that don't have one particular focal image but rather lots of smaller images. The collections of smaller designs are ideal for creating layered backgrounds without the bulk on a variety of mixed media projects.

PaperArtsy stamps are made from high quality red rubber, give super crisp stamped images and work particularly well when used alongside PaperArtsy's fast drying Fresco Finish Chalk paints.

Canvas can be a tricky surface to work on because of its texture but I thought this would work well with the distressed look of the stamps so I only applied a light colourwash of chalk paints to retain the texture.

I decided to push the boat out by trying different stamping techniques such as stamping with paint. I also decided to think outside the box and use the retro circle stamp to create spring inspired lollipop style flowers.

Step-by-step... Stencil and Stamp Layering



















- 1 Tap a baby wipe into Antarctica, Lake Wanaka and Granny Smith and wipe across the canvas.
- 2 Stencil the large flower from PSO 44 randomly on the canvas using Granny Smith Chalk Paint and Cut 'n Dry foam.
- 4 Stamp the retro circle and lines stamps with VersaFine Onyx Black ink.5 Apply Tango using fingers.
- **5** Apply Tango Chalk Paint to dots stamp using fingers. Use the Letraset pen to create a faux dotty shadow round the
- **6** Fill in spaces with more icons and words inked with VersaFine Onyx Black.

3 Ink the bubble rectangle and line of

squares images from ELB 34 with

VersaMark ink and heat emboss with Super Fine White embossing powder.

- 7 Paint card with Granny Smith, Haystack and Tango. Stamp retro circle and skeleton leaf with Onyx Black ink, heat emboss with clear embossing powder and cut out.
- 8 Stencil 'Dreams' from PSO 43 onto card stock using chalk paint. Cut out, colour the edges with Tango to create word tiles.
- **9** Stamp sentiment with Onyx Black onto card and use a punch to create the flower centre. Fix the leaves and circles in place to create the flowers.

To finish the project: Decorate the flower circles with a double twine bow and buttons and fix the word tiles in place.



Multi-Layered Embossing

Layer your embossing to achieve beautifully detailed effects. By Anna-Karin Evaldsson

ultiple layers of clear embossing can create a surface resembling vintage glass and give a sense of depth. You can stop adding clear powder after two layers, and then the first layer of melted powder will stand out slightly from the second. But if you want more of a faux glass effect, continue adding layers of powder. When heat embossing, you have to be very careful not to burn yourself. Do not touch the melted powder at all until it has cooled down completely.

Dye inks can be hard to use for heat embossing, but Distress Ink is formulated to stay wet longer, which makes it great for heat embossing. Don't wait too long before applying the powder to the stamped impression, as it won't stick well if the ink has started to dry.

The technique works best on smooth, relatively heavy paper. I used Distress Mixed Media Heavystock, but a paper like manila cardstock would also work well. Experiment with what you have at hand. If your paper warps a bit, you can place it under a book. Fine cracks might appear, which only adds to the look.

Step-by-step... Layered Embossing



















- 1 Stamp tag with Rosette background stamp and Twisted Citron Distress Ink.
- 2 Quickly cover tag with clear embossing powder, remove excess and heat emboss.
- 4 Again, cover tag with clear powder and heat emboss. You could stop here.

7 Stamp with a Newsprint stamp and

and emboss.

Mermaid Lagoon ink. Apply clear powder

- **5** Apply embossing ink, cover with clear powder, heat emboss and repeat three to
- 8 Ink globe with Hickory Smoke and Black Soot and apply clear powder as before. Add more layers of powder.
- 3 Ink tag with Mermaid Lagoon and Hickory Smoke Distress Ink, darkening towards
- 6 Die cut a Mini Globe from Mixed Media Heavystock Cardstock, or another smooth cardstock.
- 9 Glue globe to book paper. As you can see, the layered embossing works well on

To finish the project: Use a piece of cardstock (20.5 cm x 16 cm or 8" x 6.4") as a base for the wall hanging and tear off the top layer. Ink with Ground Espresso. Make holes and set eyelets with a Crop-a-Dile tool. Die cut a Postage Stamp Frame from Kraft-Core cardstock and sand the edges. Layer a piece of patterned paper, small piece of old book paper and the Postage Stamp Frame behind the tag. Adhere tissue tape to the bottom of the tag and tie strings at the top. Die cut words from black cardstock. Glue everything down with Matte Medium. Rub Antique Linen paint into idea-ology embellishments and add to the wall hanging.

In the Details...



Combining the smooth glass-like finish of the embossing powder with textural accents such as twine adds interest to the finished piece.

Give Me an Inch

Create a stunning journal to show off your Inchie Art! By Roc Nicholas

o make this journal I used thin cardboard for the covers and paper coasters for the pages. For the front cover, I stamped the angel on a piece of white scrap paper, roughed up the edges with a distressing tool and added brown chalk ink to the edge to give it an aged appearance. To adorn the angel, I made her a crown out of shrink plastic.

To create the flowers, I used tiny flower punches to create the paper petals and then layered them up and secured in place with small brads. To complete the piece, I used several tiny tags, added distressed white cording and then adhered everything in place.



In the Details...



I cut various patterned paper pieces to fit the covers and inside pages. I cut the plastic sleeves into individual sections that I could sew onto the paper to form the square pockets for the inchies. I used a zig zag stitch and roughly sewed the plastic into six sections. Once the plastic was sewn onto the cardstock, I used my Exacto knife to carefully cut little slits at the very top of the squared off sections so I would be able to slide my inches into the individual pouches.



It was then time to glue all those finished sewn pages onto the paper coasters. I finished decorating all the inside edges with ephemera and digital images and used brown ink to give the edges of the pages a distressed look.

I used my Bind It All to punch the holes and secured the journal together with binding wire. This journal was fun to make and could be made any size for any art you might want to use it for!

s the darker evenings are starting to give way and we are heading towards what will hopefully be a glorious summer, I start to think about barbeques in the sun, fun with the family and all the beautiful colour that will spring to life in the garden over the next few months.

The promise of all this lovely colour inspired me to create this project; the stunning colours of nature against old brick and stone always conjures up a romantic English garden feel for me and whilst my flowers are definitely not subtle, I just adore the way they look against the neutral brick background created on the canvas.

Creating a masterboard background certainly sped up the process of creating this project as it allowed me to produce a variety of different coloured flowers without having to spend hours colouring them all individually. What's better is you never know quite what you will get!

I'm completely in love with this project and I feel that the vibrant colours of the paint evoke a real sense of anticipation and happiness for the coming months. Bring on the



Step-by-step... Mixed Media Canvas Using a Floral Masterboard













- 1 Work on the back of the canvas. Using modelling paste and a palette knife, create a random brick pattern and spread excess paste in remaining areas.
- 4 Using black Archival ink and a mix of stamps, stamp randomly all over the painted card, filling up the pages.
- 2 Apply a thin coat of Titan buff over the whole piece, then, with your finger, lightly rub Quinacridone paint over the surface to pick up the texture of the paste.
- **5** Splatter the designs with watered down gold paint, then, cut out all stamped images using scissors or a craft knife.
- 3 Onto smooth white card, finger paint colour patches until covered. Repeat with different colours onto a second piece of card.
- 6 Arrange flowers around the canvas and adhere with 3D double sided foam tape (alter height of flowers by adding more foam tape).

To finish the project: Add chipboard letters and a stamped quote to the canvas. I added watersoluble pencil around the edge of my quote, and around the flower designs. Once activated with water, this gives the designs shadow and depth, and allows them to stand out from the canvas. For a finishing touch, I wanted to add some rusted 'nuts'. I used the Andy Skinner set of chipboard pieces from Tando Creative for the nuts and created a simple rust effect by rubbing over them with the Quinacridone Gold paint as well as a touch of Umber and dried this immediately with a heat gun so it would bubble the paint slightly.



his fab project was made using the Bee Crafty Inspired by Banksy XL Hope stamp and the Inkables Opportunity A4 template. I love using paints and inks with stamps and templates on all sorts of projects, so I couldn't resist having a play with this clipboard!

Like a lot of my projects, this evolved as I was making it, I first chose the clipboard and stamps and it grew from there. What's fantastic about this project is that the techniques could be transferred to all sorts of different projects such as altered art, MDF, art journalling and of course you could even adapt and resize the design for card projects.

To prepare the clipboard, I sprayed it with a white primer and left to dry overnight. I tend to prime in batches of assorted things, such as tags, clipboards and upcycling projects. This means I don't have to wait when I'm ready to craft and I can simply choose which substrate to work on and get started!

Step-by-step... Altered Clipboard: Inspired by Banksy



















- 1 On your primed clipboard, blend paints together to create a hazy background.
- 2 Paint through the 'opportunity' word from the A4 Inkable template onto the side of the board.
- 3 Use the Style Wire Border set and textures set to build the background design.

- 4 Stamp textures randomly using Distress Ink. Use Black Memento ink for the 'Style Wire Borders'.
- 5 Use Hope XL with Memento ink and stamp directly onto the onto the clipboard.
- 6 Using a Fineliner pen, draw around the 'opportunity' letters to give definition.

- 7 Use the D'inkable Feathery template with the same colour as used for the 'opportunity'.
- 8 Using a white Sharpie, add dots and highlights to different areas and colour in the detail of the girl.
- **9** Paint around the outside edges with a coordinating colour using a blending tool.

To finish the project: Paint the clip section of the clipboard and any findings to complete the design and keep the project cohesive.

TIME SAVING IDEA...

If you are priming MDF, do several bits at a time so they are ready as soon as inspiration hits.





Subscription Gift Project



▲ Flutterby Poppy Frame By IndigoBlu Designer, Kay Molyneux

Coarse textured paste was applied through the Damaged Damask stencil onto tissue paper. The tissue paper was then trimmed and glued to the frame, painted with IndigoBlu paints and highlighted with Luscious powder.

The poppies were stamped onto painted thin card, fussy cut out, crumpled, shaped and layered. Black microbeads were added to their centres. The Flutterby stamp was stamped three times onto IndigoBlu Perfect Stamping card with FlitterGlu and Mega-flake applied, then fussy cut out. They were then sponged with Distress Inks and shaped.

One of the designs from the Arts and Crafts paper pads made a wonderful photo mount, the inner frame was painted with the same paint as the frame. Images from Tasty Textures were stamped onto the photo mount and glass cover with FlitterGlu and Mega-flakes applied after. The frame was assembled, a vintage image added and the butterflies and poppies secured with dimensional glue with a few added leaves.


"Ink sets that contain tonal shades are perfect for this technique as they combine different shades of inks that are perfect for building up layers. Play around with different ink pads and colour tones to create your own bespoke set! Dye ink pads work best for this."





Stamping in Styl

Use a layered stamping technique and Hunkydory stamps to create detailed surface pattern for effective card designs. By Kitty Frampton



This process is created by stamping up layers of a stamp using different tones of ink to create a 3D effect without having to colour it. It is best to give yourself plenty of work space to do this technique so you can stamp out lots of designs at the same time. I use several ink blocks so each stamp has it's own, this speeds up the process and means you don't end up with inky hands. Here, I have used dye inks which dry almost instantly so you don't have to wait in between stamping each layer.

Step-by-step... Floral Layered Stamping













- 1 Cut card to measure 10cm x 14cm. Stamp flower outline with Coral Berry ink onto card.
- using Ruby Red ink on top of the Coral Berry outline.

2 Stamp the next layer of the flower

Frosty Pink ink onto each of the flowers.

Stamp the background layer using

- 4 Stamp the middle leaf layer onto the card using Forest Glade ink.
- 5 Stamp the smallest leaf layer on top of each leaf using Evergreen ink.
- 6 Stamp the largest background leaf layer on top of the leaves using the Frayed Leaf Ink.

To finish the project: After creating the background I mounted the panel onto black card and glued directly onto a card blank. I cut a strip of black striped paper, mounted it onto black card and glued across the card. I then stamped the letters in black ink to spell the hello. I mounted this onto black card and attached it to the card with foam pads.

Sweet Spring

Combine the tissue paper technique with threedimensional adornments to craft a dazzling diorama! By Brenda Brown

hree-dimensional projects can create quite an impact in a display and I often use my handmade creations for those special times of the year when we add decorations to the house. This vintage spring-inspired assemblage piece includes birds, eggs and green moss for the promise of what the spring will bring to us in the northern hemisphere over the next few months.

The box I have used here can be found in craft shops and is sold as a tea light holder; I used the metal container to hold the little bird's nest.

Craft shops are full of embellishments for seasonal projects. I collect item as I see them and have a drawer full of little things like the birds and eggs to use this time of the year, as well as shells and such for the summer, pumpkins and toadstools for autumn and red berries and cones for winter.

I hope you have fun playing with the mixed media technique I have used on these panels, I'm sure it would work well on a canvas, board and even for card making. I just love how the crackles still show through the tissue paper after is has been stuck on!





Step-by-step... Stamped Box Panels













- 1 Cut card to cover all sides of the box and paint with Raw Umber acrylic paint to seal the surface.
- 4 Cut crackled card into four panels to fit sides of the box. Tear tissue for each side. Apply Decou-Page sealer, lay tissue on top, spritz with water and gently rub down.
- 2 When the card is dry, apply a layer of white Crackle Paint with a soft brush and leave it to dry naturally.
- **5** When dry, sand edges of cards to get rid of tissue paper overhang and blend Ground Espresso Distress Ink over it. Apply another coat of Decou-Page to seal.
- 3 Take a piece of tissue paper and randomly stamp images using a permanent black ink.
- 6 Gently heat dry and paint over with a wash of Titan Buff paint. Add colour with Distress Markers and bring back fine details with black and white pens.

To finish the project: Paint the box with Raw Umber paint, adhere the panels onto the four sides of the box and collect some spring elements to add to the top.



The use of bird imagery on the box itself, along with the two delicate bird embellishments help to tie the theme together and give a wonderfully cohesive look.

Upcycle a plastic washing liquid cup into a great piece of home décor. By Kim Dellow

hat do you do with the old plastic cups that come with your clothes washing liquid when you get a new bottle? Chuck them in the recycling? Well, now you could turn them into some home

décor! My Creative Upcycling project is precisely that, an old washing liquid cup turned into a pearlescent star holder decoration.

These washing liquid cups are easy to use in mixed media projects. All the ones that I have used so far take acrylic paint and gel mediums well. They don't peel and don't seem to need any pre-treating with sandpaper or gesso, although you can always try that if you have difficulty with yours.

Make sure that they are clean and dry and have no dried soap caked on the outside as this will stop the adhesion of paints and gels. Some of them even have their own unique texture, which you could use to add more interest to the final project.



Step-by-step... Decorating a Washing Liquid Cup

- 1 Cover the washing-liquid cup with tissue paper using layers of gel medium and leave to dry completely.
- 3 Colour the gesso surface with the gouache paint, letting the colours blend into each other over the cup.
- 2 Add a layer of gesso over the whole surface and let it dry completely.
- 4 Let the cup dry completely then stamp the surface with some small stars.

To finish the project: Stamp the sentiment on Khadi paper and the stars on painted Khadi paper then cut them out. Pierce holes in the top of the cup and thread with wire bent into paper holders, add gel medium in the inside over the holes. Place the stars and sentiment in the wire holders.




Magical Path By Trish Latimer

I measured the height of the wooden panel I wanted to use as a base for this project, then resized the digital image so it would sit perfectly on top. Once printed off, I covered the printout with a couple of layers of clear gesso before colouring. I then added some extra black lines and white doodles to the house before gluing it to my painty background on the panel. As a final touch, I added an extra layer to the flower detail on the house. It's easily done, just print off another copy of the image and colour!

Home Is Where the Heart Is Assemblage By Trish Latimer

When I create a painty background that I like, I always scan it and save the image. That way, I'll always have bespoke background papers ready to print off when I need them! This is especially useful when using digital images, as I can print them off directly over the top of the background, and then just cut out and use!

Here, I painted an Altoid tin white, and added a small candlestick at the bottom, and an old chess piece to the top as decoration. The houses were glued in position, then I added a red UTEE heart as a final touch.






"This digital apple stamp has a clean design. It asks for clean and simple cards, which is just what I like to make! I created two 15 x 15 cm (6" x 6") cards in my favourite colour combination. While making cards I often wait to add text until I know which occasion I will use the cards for."



▲ Alphabet Mix By Anneke De Clerck

I'm always trying to use up things from my stash while making cards. The blue background on this card was made with scraps of old alphabet stickers in the most ugly colours. I glued the stickers down randomly on a square panel. To hide the awful colours I applied two coats of gesso and a coat of light blue paint on top. To highlight the texture, I dry brushed the background with white paint. I just love how this has turned out!

The white background was cut out of a white and cream coloured gelli plate print. I printed the apple image on cardstock and coloured the print with paint. After cutting out the different elements I glued them in place on the alphabet background. I finished the card off with a row of tiny buttons and some washi tape.





in place firmly with one hand. Carefully tear the tissue paper off along the outer edge of the

▲ Circles By Anneke De Clerck

On this card I played with circles. I applied white and light blue paint on the background using a plastic card and made scratches into the wet paint with a pencil. To create the light blue circles I sponged paint through the Dina Wakley Media Bullseye stencil.

I printed the apple image at a reduced size on cardstock and coloured the print with red, pink and blue paint and cut out the different elements. I then glued the apple on a die cut circle and added a tissue paper circle underneath. I finished the card off with washi tape, cord and felt ornaments.

Mirror Magic

Use the new acrylic shapes by That's Crafty! to craft stunning mirrored designs! By Helen Chilton

've gone all That's Crafty! this month! As well as using some of their new stamps, I'm going to showcase some of their newest acrylic surfaces, the Splat Upright and • the Rectangle Wall Hanging. If you haven't tried working on this acrylic before then you should have a go. You can draw on it, emboss it, stamp it, stencil it and paint it, all the while creating extra layers both front and back.

The Upright slots into its own stand which provides an easy way to display it and the acrylic rectangles come with the holes already made. That's Crafty! has cleverly designed it so that the holes in each rectangle match up vertically for ease of hanging.

I'm also using a very exciting new product from Pentart available from That's Crafty!, the Mirror Mist for plastic. You simply spray it onto one side of the plastic (in this case the acrylic surfaces), fan it dry and then flip it over to reveal a mirrored surface. You can then paint, stamp, stencil or whatever you fancy over the top.

I was so fascinated by this that I had to have a bit of an experiment and look at different ways of applying the mist and decorating the mirrored surface.

Step-by-step... Shabby Chic Mirror Splat













- 1 Remove backing paper from both sides of the Splat and spray the Mirror Mist on the back. Start in centre with full coverage then spray more lightly for speckled effect at edges.

3 Stamp the tiny leaves from Treena stamp set around the edges on the back. Spray with the varnish.


- 4 Paint tiny leaves with Limelight, then, when dry, flip over and stamp and paint leaves on the front edges.
- 5 Stencil butterflies with Iron Paste and sprinkle with the Quartz Mineral Powder while wet.

2 Take spray tube out and flick to get blobs

around edges. Scratch the centre lightly

6 Paint the back of the mirror in a mixture of the blues and greens. This will show through on the front.

To finish the project: Stamp the text in the middle in black and then overstamp in Blue Oyster paint. Decorate the stand using the same techniques as for main mirror.


Step-by-step... Rectangle Wall Hanging













- 1 Place stencil face down on largest rectangle, tape and spray with Mirror Mist. Remember you're working on the back so text needs to be in reverse.
- 4 Spray Mirror Mist onto kitchen towel and dab onto back of medium rectangle to create mottled effect. Stamp text as before. Edge back with green paint.
- 2 Scratch around edges of letters when dry with a cocktail stick to define text and create a grungy effect.
- 5 Spray back of smallest rectangle with Mirror Mist and dry. Repeat. Place stencil over top and scratch out pattern with bamboo skewer.
- 3 Splatter some Mirror Mist as before and also dab with a sponge. Add stamping and paint as before.
- 6 Vary how you etch into the stencil. When finished it will look like this. Varnish and then paint over back in blues and green.

To finish the project: Hang the pieces together with ribbon or chain.

We highlight some of the amazing people working in arts and crafts who are trying to make a real difference in this crazy world! Meet the amazing Amy Jakob.



To raise money for mental health charity, Mind, Amy holds local 'Crafternoons', afternoons filled with fun and crafting. Amy worked as a full time teacher for three years, but when she began to experience painful episodes of depression and anxiety she decided to stop teaching. Amy now works on a self-employed basis where she uses her teaching skills for three days a week to tutor children who have been 'kicked out of the system'. Amy started this in September and has been concentrating on her craft business for the rest of the week.





"It took a while to get used to not having such a busy life but it meant I could relax and spend time doing things I enjoyed. I started making bits and bobs for other people and then I decided to use this skill to raise money for something I wanted to advocate.

When I opened up my shop it was mainly because I wanted to talk about mental health in a positive way. Often when you hear about mental health it is all doom and gloom but I want to promote that if people are open about their mental health it can open up other opportunities."

Crafternoon is a way of helping other people be crafty and raise awareness of mental health, and to also help Mind support the one in four with mental health problems. Free Crafternoon fundraising packs, full of tips and ideas, are available at www.mind.org.uk/crafternoon





"My depression started when I went to university - I did a year abroad in Paris, which sounds amazing and it was, however it was very isolated. It is not actually a social experience – it was very lonely and even when I came home, and was now surrounded by my friends and family all speaking my first language I still felt alone and isolated."





Amy opened up her own Etsy shop, (www.etsy.com/uk/people/amyalicedonoghue) and started a blog, called Hope the Black Dog, (www.hopetheblackdog.com) that documents her crafty life and the difficulties of dealing with mental health issues on a daily basis.

She also began hosting Crafternoon's in her local area to bring her friends and family together, raise awareness of mental health issues and give all involved a taste of therapeutic crafting.

"The idea of a Crafternoon sounded really fun – something I enjoyed doing and Mind had provided me with so much helpful information – when I was looking at leaving teaching I used Mind's online legal advice a lot to help me feel confident to leave the security of teaching."

Ready, Set, Stamp!



■ Without the Rain... By Riikka Kovasin

April showers bring May flowers but they also bring rainbows! Like the saying in the card goes – there can't be rainbows without some rain. The theme and the words 'shimmery pools' made me think of sun reflecting on the surface of a pool, so I created a card with a pool of shimmer and a rainbow which is causing it!

First I stamped the raindrops with embossing ink on my cardstock and embossed them with white powder. On top, I added different shades of blue with watercolours. Next I stamped the rainbow onto a piece of white cardstock and embossed with white powder as well. The rainbow was coloured with watercolours and then mounted onto my card with Foam Dots.

For the finishing touches I added Soft Gel on top of the pool of colour and the clouds and sprinkled some glitter on top. Lastly, I made the sentiment using a Dymo Junior label maker and a turquoise tape.

April Showers

This month's gallery was inspired by our theme of April Showers, celebrating the beauty of water!

► Blue Melody By Bożena Bodynek

Here I have made a simple project with an effective, splashy watercolour background using various stamps and only a few embellishments. I love making quick and intuitive projects like this.

I have layered different elements of watercolour backgrounds together to achieve an interesting, splattered effect. To achieve these effective watercolour backgrounds I use watercolours on cellophane or spare stamp packaging. First, I apply the colours to the cellophane with a brush and spritz with water. Next, I push the cellophane around on the surface of the card to create different shapes and effects. A step-by-step tutorial can be found on my blog. To finish my design, I added stamping and some embellishments such as glitter, flowers, sequins and crystals.



STAMPS: Vintage Imagine; Prima Finnabair – Don't Forget to Fly; Taylored Expressions – Grid Paper. INKS: Memento - Tuxedo Black. OTHER: Wild Orchid Crafts - Paper flowers; watercolour paints; glitter; decorative papers; canvas.





April Shower By Marian Zimmerman

First I stamped the girl on a piece of white card, then I masked her. The masks for the circles were made using punches, and were coloured in with Memento and Distress Ink. I stamped the raindrops whilst the masks were still in place.

After removing the masks I stamped the raindrops all over the card and sponged the card with blue Distress Ink, and a little bit of black on the edges. The girl was then coloured in with Distress Inks and a waterbrush and the umbrella was coloured using markers. The text was printed from the computer and glued to pieces of card. To finish, I added some white dots and accents with the Sharpie pen and adhered to a matching card.

Materials

STAMPS: Viva Las VegaStamps - Girl with Umbrella; Crealies -Raindrops. INKS: Memento – Summer Sky; Teal Seal; VersaFine - Black; Distress - Evergreen Bough; Festive Berries; Spun Sugar; Tumbled Glass. OTHER: Twinmarkers - Canaria Yellow/ Indian Blue; Sharpie pen - White.





Breathe By Marion Wybranietz

First, I stamped the fish image and masked it. After applying Distress Inks in different shades of blue and green, I added yet more stamping, including bubbles, grass, the sentiment and cross stitch for texture. It's a simple but effective card design that focuses on the main stamp image and sentiment.

Materials

STAMPS: Viva Las Vegastamps - Steampunk Fish; Tuft of Grass; Cross Stitch; Cherry Pie Art Stamps -Decorative Correspondence; Stampin' Up - Labeler Alphabet. INKS: Ranger - Distress; Archival.


It's All About Love By Scrapper Myra

The theme for this gallery was so inspirational and the colour palette is simple and beautifully tonal. I thought of cool rain, colour dripping and clean look projects. I decided to make a card about 'fresh love', using this great image of the couple with the umbrella under the rain. Firstly, I stamped the image on white cardstock and coloured with Gelatos for a subtle look, in order to keep as closest as possible to the colour combination provided for the theme. Then, I used sprays to literally drip the colours as rain. Once dry, I stamped the sentiment on the base card and placed the image on top. I finished with tiny sequins to provide movement and dimension to the coloured rain.

Materials

STAMPS: Unity Stamp Co. - Magic of Beginnings; It's All About Love. INKS: Memento - Tuxedo Black; Ranger -Cobalt; Prima Color Bloom Spray Mist - Deep Teal; Soft Teal; Cobalt. OTHER: Faber Castell Gelatos - Metallic Blueberry; Melon; Chocolate; Peach; Butterscotch; tacky glue; sequins; white cardstock.





Every Cloud By Sue Wherry

Use watered down Distress Inks and a paint brush to dribble paint down some watercolour paper. When dry, use a mixture of the inks to stamp the raindrops over the dribbles. Edge with ink. Layer this onto silver card and adhere to a card blank.

Either print a computer generated sentiment or handwrite a greeting onto white card. Cut a cloud shape around words and edge with ink. Stick onto silver card and cut around clouds leaving a border of silver. Use foam tape to stick each cloud onto the background as shown. Finish with a sprinkle of blue stones under each cloud.

Materials

STAMPS: IndigoBlu - Rain Droplets. INKS: Distress - Peacock Feathers; Tumbled Glass; Salty Ocean; Mermaid Lagoon. OTHER: White card blank; thin white card; silver card; watercolour paper; blue stones.

Brave Heart Egg By Cat Kerr

I adhered the crocheted fabric to the egg using Decou-Page and let it dry. I then covered it in gesso and painted it and the top of the egg with the Multi Surface paint. When dry, I added Gold Metallic Lustre to both. Next I used a Sharpie and added white dots to the egg.

I added a piece of Apoxie Sculpt to connect the egg and the top piece and then applied rhinestone stickers to the Apoxie. I stamped the image onto white card stock with watermark ink and heat embossed it twice. I cut the whole image out and just the heart from the second image. I glued the stamped band onto the egg and added Foam Dots to the second heart and placed it over the first stamped heart. Lastly, I glued on more rhinestones above and below the stamped band.

STAMPS: Cat Kerr – Brave Heart. INKS: Watermark ink pad. OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts – Imperial Egg Relic; crocheted fabric scrap; DecoArt – Decou- Page; gesso – white; DecoArt Americana Multi Surface Paint – Coastal Waters; DecoArt Metallic Lustre – Gold; embossing powder – gold; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts – Apoxie Sculpt; rhinestone stickers; Foam Dots; Sharpie pen – White.



I love creating shrines and shadow boxes and I have had this one for quite some time, waiting to be transformed. When looking at Cat Kerr's stamps, inspiration struck. I have always loved forest-inspired, earthy themed projects and the magic they always seem to convey. Couple that love of magic with my other love for totems and you have 'The Guardians'. The strong buck represents strength and wisdom while the playful fairy embodies all that is youthful, playful, and innocent. The nested egg symbolises the constant rebirth of the spirit. Together, these two guardians protect and nourish the heart of the forest.

Materials

STAMPS: Cat Kerr – She Flies with Her Own Wings; Strength. INKS: StazOn - Jet Black; Timber. Dreams of Courage By Debby Anderson

I like to use blank vintage paper to stamp on as it gives an 'old world' and timeworn look and feel to my pieces. If I don't have any vintage paper, I create my own by coffee staining copy paper and leaving to dry in the sun. I also prefer to stamp in brown StazOn ink instead of black. I was inspired to use Cat Kerr's 'I Believe' stamp while designing 'Dreams of Courage'. The past year was a challenging one for myself and my family... we needed courage, strength and to believe that the future would get better. Like Joan of Arc we wore our armour to get through the tough times.

Materials

STAMPS: Cat Kerr - I Believe. INKS: StazOn - Timber Brown; Walnut. OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts -Imperial Egg; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts Bohemian Jewels - Ruby; Aquamarine; Fleur de Lis Paper, vintage book; vintage seam binding; vintage beaded sari silk trims; velvet trim; brass embossed stampings; vintage rhinestone embellishments; Beacon - Fabri-tac, Golden - Matte Medium; Joan of Arc medal.

Nature Girl By Lynne Moncrieff

Inspired by the Imperial Egg and Cat Kerr's stamp, my vision was of an ornament, depicting a 'Nature Girl'. The sentiment encouraged me to add wings to the egg. Using Tuxedo Black ink with the wing designs, I stamped onto paperclay to craft my wings. A wooden back is provided with the egg, allowing me, with Gel Medium, to sandwich the wings between the back of the egg and the wooden backing. The face and sentiment were stamped onto tissue paper before being adhered to the egg with PaperArtsy Crackle Glaze. To complete the piece, I added a collection of some of the items she might have gathered on her nature walk - a twig, flower and fragments carried on the wind.

Materials

STAMPS: Cat Kerr - She Flies with Her Own Wings. INKS: Ranger Archival ink pad - Potting Soil; Memento ink pad - Tuxedo Black. OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts Archival Cast Resin - Imperial Egg; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts - Velveteen Flowers; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts Dresden Trim Wrought Iron - Silver; paperclay; PaperArtsy Fresco Finish Chalk Acrylic paint - Antarctic; Chalk; Caramel; Lake Wanaka; Toffee; PaperArtsy - Crackle Glaze; Golden - Gesso; Regular Matte Gel Medium; YarnYarn – Sari ribbon.

▶ The Power of Me By Milagros Rivera

I wanted to create a talisman pendant to empower myself in days when I need a boost. Cat Kerr's stamps are so inspirational that at least one of them is bound to give you wings! I've also stamped the quote on the back to have it near my heart, it's the reason it became a jewellery piece! Use the Apoxie Sculpt medium to connect the two pieces of your Imperial Egg. I like to stamp on tissue and apply with gel medium, as it allows me to add stamping to three dimensional objects. This means any object can become 'stampable'! It's then easy to colour your images with watercolours after.

Materials

STAMPS: Cat Kerr - I Believe in the Power of Me. INKS: Ranger Archival – Jet Black. OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts – Imperial Egg; Bohemian Jewels; Ken Oliver Color Burst watercolour paint - Turquoise; Fuchsia; Chartreuse; Gamboge; Apoxie Sculpt; Ranger embossing powder - Princess Gold; Ice Resin; bronze chain; gel medium.



Moving Day By Monica Downing

This mamma bird, with her long eyelashes, and beautiful tiara, is watching over the dream fairy as she so carefully moves her egg to the fairy forest to hatch.

The Ice Resin Iced Enamels work fantastically well on the Relics and Artifacts craft blanks, as well as the archival tray and wooden flourishes. They add both colour and dimension. The stamped image has also been coloured using the Ice Resin Iced Enamels. To finish, fussy cut flowers from scrapbook paper add colour and dimension to the background and add to the magical feel of this piece.

INK: StazOn - Black, OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts - Imperial Egg; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts Archival Wooden Tray II - Large; Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts – Bohemian Jewels; Ice Resin Iced Enamels - Turquoise; Raspberry; Chartreuse; Ten Seconds Studio Verday paint - Rust; wood flourish; acrylic paint lime green; vintage tart tin; vintage bobbins; glass drawer pulls; scrapbooking paper; bird.



Find Your Tribe By Sherry Matthews

'Find Your Tribe' was made in honour of the artistic journey. Most creative people travel through different mediums and styles, picking up artsy friends along the way... friends who encourage and inspire you. That's your tribe.

The Imperial Egg was wrapped in a layer of Apoxie Sculpt and designed to resemble a compass, using brown paint, Inka Gold and a game spinner. The 'compass' was placed in an archival case lined with map paper, stained with watered down brown acrylic paint and trimmed with punched ledger paper and Dresden trim. ICE Resin, tinted Hacienda blue, was used on the Imperial Egg topper. A banner was created by stamping 'FIND YOUR TRIBE' into Apoxie Sculpt, which was then painted brown and highlighted with Inka Gold.

OTHER: Sandra Evertson Relics and Artifacts — Imperial Eggs; Archival Case wooden tray I; Tim Holtz — Game Spinner; Apoxie Sculpt; Dresden Trim — gold medallions; ICE Resin; ICE Resin tints — Hacienda; Inka Gold; DecoArt — One Step Crackle; gel medium; map paper; ledger paper; small watch gear; Martha Stewart — paper punch.





Faberge Inspired Egg By Heather Thompson

I wanted my egg to resemble the elegance and beauty of a Faberge egg. I wanted to create an intricate weave of crystals and silver and to make a piece of art that is wearable and gorgeous. I chose the Poppy Jasper to incorporate tones of silver, grey and black, and to pull the reds out from the focal heart. To complete the feature heart, I used Cat Kerr's Brave Heart stamp.

Materials

STAMPS: Cat Kerr – Brave Heart; Stampin' Up – Timeless Textures. INKS: DecoArt Media – Carbon Black; Transparent Red Iron Oxide; Paynes Grey; Metallic Silver; Quinacridone Gold; Matte Medium; Tinting Base; Gesso – White. OTHER: Relics and Artifacts – Imperial Egg; Relics and Artifacts Dresden Trim – Silver Tiny Triangles; Apoxie Sculpt; Swarovski Crystals – Indian Red; Jet Black; Black Diamond; Sterling Silver beads and findings; Poppy Jasper stones.





The box itself was themed 'Long Lost Memories' and represented the need for preserving memories as they are all precious. I've used texture paste and a stencil matching my chosen chipboard to give the piece a uniform and finished look.



Love Forever By Craft Box Designer, Anna Hersom

This is a really simple piece that would make a great card topper. It took only a few minutes to create, with the background created on white cardstock using a stamp and pieces of ephemera placed in different areas of the tag. The composition was then tied together by a linen ribbon and a few mulberry flowers.

Home Sweet Home By Craft Box Designer, Claire Chapman

Use the brick stencil and texture paste to create a brick effect around the frame on the back of the canvas. When dry, colour the brick pattern with Distress Inks.

Cut white stamping card to fit aperture and create the background loosely using Distress Inks. Stencil the sunburst with Ultra Thick Slap It On mixed with yellow reinker and add a swirl in the middle for the sun. Bottle some sunshine using a little of the coloured Slap It on and a spritz of water. I made a tiny funnel from acetate to make filling the bottle easier. Lay the bottle on its side to dry. Stamp the house and garden elements onto patterned paper using black ink, cut out and paper piece the scene onto the background.

Last but not least, take lots of pretty embellishments and glue them into place with a hot glue gun.

Life's an Adventure By Craft Box Designer, Tracy Hill

Lots of layers were used to create this detailed, travel themed card. Holiday snaps and an Airmail envelope were tucked into the wonderfully evocative piece, along with lace for added texture, and a whimsical wooden bicycle. Distressed edges, twine and that dash of glitter all add to the charm!



The canvas was first covered in gesso and then covered in tissue paper from the November Craft Box. Two side panels were added using black lace and scalloped panels were cut from beige lace. I have also added a sentiment cabochon from Craft Box.

The frame and wooden words are from SnipArt. The fabric picture was a gift from a friend. To finish this piece, I added some Prima flowers and little gems from the August Craft Box.

Key to My Heart

By Craft Box Designer, Linda Grover

I wanted to produce a project that said "I love you Mum" using products from Craft Box for inspiration. I went with a fresh pastel theme that would hopefully appeal to mums of all ages. The colours in the papers gave me my colour scheme.

I painted the book box with the chalk paint then added previously coloured texture paste through a Craft Box stencil and left to dry. I then stamped randomly all over the box. I developed a layered effect on the front using the papers, SnipArt and resin frame. I then embellished with flowers, beads etc from the Craft Box. For the inside cover I used watercolour over the Prima Paintable Rose and layered with other Prima paper. The Paintables are excellent if you have trouble colouring in and shading. I sprayed the heart in Salt Water Taffy and fixed the key charm and heart to a ribbon hung inside the box.

◀ Vintage Journal By Tracy Easson

Imagine my glee on opening the stamps; my imagination went into overdrive! I ran around grabbing scraps of fabric, lace, metal embellishments, an old book and some coffee. The stamps spoke to me and told me they wanted to be made into a lovely old vintage art journal, so I couldn't resist! What better way to create a lovely aged look than by using a coffee mix to dip the scraps of fabric in. I hope you have as much fun as I did playing around with all your scraps to create beautiful layers before focusing on a part of the stamp and making it pop. Now to fill it with art, photographs and memories!

Materials

STAMPS: The Artistic Stamper - Family Values A5. INKS: Ranger Archival - Jet Black OTHER: Second hand book; muslin; scraps of fabric; lace trim; coffee; Finnabair – Metal Grunge Butterflies; Mini Stars; Tim Holtz Idea-Ology – Mini Pocket Watch; DecoArt Media - Liquid Glass; thread; pins.

"All for the love of old books and scraps of fabric!"

Upcycled Fabric Ribbon By Tracy Easson

Creating your own fabric ribbon from scraps couldn't be easier. First, age the fabric with coffee mixed with water and leave to dry or if you're impatient like me, use your heat tool. Ink up your stamps and stamp away to your heart's content before wrapping it around a wooden spool. To make it more special, especially if you are giving it as a gift, you could add a little embellishment; I did this using a pocket watch and a scrap of stamped fabric.





Family Values By Tracy Evans

Cut a piece of white card to the same size as your card blank. Press Vintage Photo Distress Ink onto a non-stick craft sheet, spritz with water and mop up ink with the card. Apply Ground Espresso Distress Ink onto the stencil, spritz with water and place onto card. Remove and dry with heat tool. Randomly stamp the number stamp in Ground Espresso Distress Ink onto the background. Add corrugated card and cotton thread to background. Cut two pieces of white card 3" x 3.5" and colour as before with Vintage Photo Distress Ink. Use a corner rounder on the corners. Distress edges with scissors and colour with Ground Espresso Distress Ink. Press two cards onto inked Family Values stamp to make alignment easier. Adhere to the card front, adding two small banners behind. Stamp 'family' and 'comfort' with Black Archival ink onto white card, cut out and add to card. Cut out a heart, colour with Candied Apple Distress Ink and adhere. Colour edges of the decorated panel with Ground Espresso

Distress Ink and adhere to

the front of the card.

DESIGNER TIP...

If you are only stamping part of an image from a large stamp then press the card onto the stamp; alignment is so much easier this way.



Materials

STAMPS: Artistic Stamper – Family Values. INKS: Distress – Ground Espresso; Walnut Stain; Candied Apple; Archival – Black. OTHER: String; cotton thread; corrugated card; white card; Tim Holtz Sizzix Die – Heartfelt; Ink Blending Tool; Corner Rounder Punch; Tim Holtz Layering Stencil – Chevrons; Tiny Attacher; Tim Holtz Kraft Core Metallic Cardstock; Spellbinders Nestabilities Standard Circles – Large.



Family Values Variation By Tracy Evans

Create an A4 card. Cut a piece of white card to fit the card front. Distress the edges of the card with scissors. Colour the background of the card with Vintage Photo Distress Ink. Add twine across the centre and secure in place with a Tiny Attacher. Cut a piece of white card to the size of the focal image, ink the stamp with Black Archival Ink and stamp onto the card. Distress the edges and apply Ground Espresso ink. Matt the focal image onto a piece of metallic card and then onto a piece of corrugated card and adhere to the card front. Die cut a circle from white card, ink part of the image with Black Archival ink and press the circle onto the stamp. Adhere the circle onto the focal image to give a spotlight effect. Die cut two small hearts from white card, colour with Vintage Photo Distress Ink and adhere. Stamp 'love' onto white card, cut out and adhere.



Family Values Frame By Jennie Boxall

I decided to use the Family Values stamp as a starting point and give it a vintage style photo frame. I used a Seth Apter technique of layering lots of PaperArtsy Fresco Finish Chalky paints. The first layer is three dark colours. Add them randomly, and not all over the frame. When dry, add red and blue shades, followed by white and yellow shades. I added more colour by using paint on the mini polka dots background stamp to add texture, and even more texture by brushing paint on a watercolour sheet and just pressing lightly onto the frame. Use an ink pad in red to edge the frame randomly. Finish the frame by adding DecoArt Crème Wax and polishing lightly to bring up a sheen and help to protect it. The photograph was stamped in Sepia Archival ink.

Materials

STAMPS: The Artistic Stamper – Family Values; Mini Polka Dots Background. INKS: Archival - Sepia; Red. OTHER: PaperArtsy Fresco Finish Paint; DecoArt Crème Wax; Ikea frame.




Triptych By Jennie Boxall

Here I made a triptych using three ATC canvases and the same technique as I used in my Family Values Frame project. For this project, I instead used bright colours and added texture to the canvas boards with wet paint on a watercolour sheet. I stamped the words and numbers from the Family Values stamp onto painted craft paper with an Archival ink pad and added Distress Crayons to the edges to accent. I joined the three canvas boards with sticky back canvas and painted down the joins. Finally, I added some Tim Holtz Idea-ology Alpha Parts numbers to complete the design.

Masterclass: Alcohol Ink

Use alcohol inks to develop wonderfully colourful effects and finishes. By Christine Dark

ccording to the product information. 'Ranger Enamel Accents is a dimensional, opaque medium with a high gloss finish.' Originally they came in two tones, black and white, but now they come in ten additional luscious colours.

I tended to use them for doodling and dotting, but this addition of colour prodded me to look further into what they can do.

I particularly love the high gloss effect which looks fantastic on die cuts and embellishments, and the fact that it's opaque which means you don't have to bother masking your stamps in the final piece as the enamel covers up any overlapping stamping. The fine point tip means you can pipe outlines quite easily as well as fill in the centres.

The enamel look is great for creating enamel effects as in the pendant piece and they will also colour on multiple surfaces as well as paper and card, for example, metal, acetate, acrylic, wood, glass, MDF etc.


Masterclass: Alcohol Ink



Technique 1: **Stencilled Alcohol Ink**

Acheive unpredictable results by dropping ink through a stencil onto Yupo paper and allowing it to dry to reveal beautiful patterns.









- 1 Place stencil onto Yupo paper, (unbordered stencils work better as they lie flatter).
- 2 Drop alcohol inks into the spaces in the stencil. Use colours that are harmonious and will blend well.
- 3 Allow to dry completely then lift stencil to reveal pattern beneath. Clean stencil with blending solution.

Technique 2: Alcohol Ink Stamping

Alcohol ink works well for stamping even on fine lined stamps such as the PaperArtsy flower stamps I used for this technique.



Technique 3: Painting with Alcohol Ink

The consistency of alcohol ink makes it possible to apply it in a similar manner to watercolour paint.









- 1 Apply generous amounts of harmonious colours of alcohol inks to a clean felt on an ink applicator.
- 2 Dab the colour around the stamp and check the coverage by holding to the light to see that it is wet everywhere.
- 3 Stamp down onto glossy cardstock and press well to ensure even transfer of ink.







- 1 Stamp an image onto glossy card using alcohol ink and allow to dry. Add chosen inks to craft sheet.
- 2 Paint flowers. I started with one colour and left space to add another into each one for interest.
- 3 Continue painting until the image is complete, mixing the inks on the image to create new colours in some areas.



Technique 4: Alcohol Ink with Embossed Metal and Gesso

Use alcohol inks on gesso covered metal to achieve a matte painted finish with shiny highlights.







- 1 Apply self adhesive metal tape to card then emboss with the embossing folder and paint with gesso to cover the metal.
- 2 Apply inks and allow to disperse over card. If there's a particular image in the embossing it can be filled with appropriate colours.
- **3** When the ink is completely dry, sand over the raised embossing with sandpaper to reveal the metal.



Technique 5: Alcohol Ink and Embellishments

Wonderful effects can be achieved on all sorts of surfaces with the addition of Snow Cap mixative. Create gorgeous patina and agate finishes!









- 1 Add bold colours of ink and Snow Cap mixative to an applicator. Bolder colours will still be visible after mixing with the white ink whereas paler colours may become too pastel.
- 2 Apply to the embellishment, making sure to cover all sides on clear plastic to prevent light shining through.
- **3** More than one coat may be necessary, particularly to plastic embellishments. Add other colours for variation.



Fun Floral Gift Box

I decorated a gift box using sections of my experimental technique samples. Often larger pieces look even better when they're cut down and layered up like this. I cut a wide strip from the metal card piece and glued to the box first. Next I cut out the flower and added Chit Chat stickers on top. Finally, I threaded together a tag cut from the stenciled Yupo and two of my inked embellishments with colourful twine glued just under the flower. For an extra touch of shine, I used silver mixative to make the flower centres and add a dotted border.

Further Ideas



▲ Tag Canvas

I was delighted with the little tag I cut for the gift box and continued to cut more of them. I was pleased with how they looked side by side which led to them being presented on a rectangular canvas with colourful twine. The finishing touches are the little Chit Chat sticker words.




3D Challenge on p.54
