

Make a... keyring

Step 1

STITCH your design onto plastic canvas, taking care to finish your thread ends by running them through the back of your stitching. Trim the finished design, leaving one square all round the plastic canvas.

Step 2

CLIP a split ring through a plastic canvas hole at the top of the trimmed shape. Thread satin ribbon through the clip, and then tie in a bow. Finish with a few stitches to hold it in place. If you would prefer the back of your stitching not to show, cover the reverse side with felt.





training. By the end of 2016, over 200 women had been through the programme. The course teaches the basics of cross stitch, and when they've completed it, the women can create work that brings them an income.


When we unveiled the wall hangings to the group, Rose Caldwell, the CEO of Concern Worldwide UK, explained how the project had come about, mentioning that so many stitchers had included personal messages along with their work, and it was great to see everyone realise that not only were the wall hangings a beautiful addition to their workspace, but they were filled with love, peace and solidarity.

The designs were stitched together to form three wall hangings to show our support to the Livelihoods project in Lebanon

Lebanon, bordered by Syria and Israel, is currently home to approximately 1.5 million refugees from Syria. Concern Worldwide is one of several NGOs working in the area. The sheer volume of refugees in Lebanon makes it difficult for people to find work to sustain themselves. So it was terrific to visit the Livelihoods project in Tripoli and find out how embroidery was helping people. Based in the Basmeh and Zeitooneh's Women's Resource Centre, the Livelihoods project meets four times a week, bringing together about 30 women for six weeks of embroidery

The trip to Lebanon, although a quick one, was packed with all manner of emotions for me. Meeting people whose lives had been like mine, who had been removed from their homes and were simply existing in Lebanon with very little to give them hope, was heart breaking, yet the resilience of their spirits was inspiring. It's a bleak situation for them, and so the benefits of the Livelihoods project and the power of embroidery were even more apparent.

Make a... butterfly display

Step 1

FINISH stitching the main design and then stitch more mini butterfly hoops to create a complete display for your wall, if you wish.

Step 2

STITCH the three smaller butterflies outside of the main design on the chart onto a small piece of yellow evenweave, then frame in a hoop.

Step 3

SELECT butterflies from the main design that can be stitched onto perforated paper. Once the stitching on paper is complete, cut out, leaving one square of blank paper around the stitching. Wrap string around the butterfly's body for the antennae, and attach to fabric mounted in a hoop.





How to... frame your work in a hoop

Step 1



TRIM your stitching and a fabric piece into a circle slightly larger than your hoop. Place the inside hoop beneath the two pieces and the outer hoop on top. Centre and press over your work. Pull taut and tighten the screw.

Step 2




TURN your stitching to the reverse and cut a piece of felt to fit inside the inner circle. Place the felt inside the hoop. You can use a bit of fabric glue to keep it in place. The felt will pad your stitching, and stop anything showing through.

Step 3



USE a glue gun or double-sided tape to begin attaching the first layer of fabric, pulling taut as you go. Repeat for the second layer. Cut a second felt layer to fit over the back of your hoop. Secure with glue or small neat stitches.


How to... frame a picture

Step 1



CUT a piece of white mount board to fit inside your frame. Place your design centrally over the mount board and pin the fabric around the board to secure, starting at the centre of each side and working outwards.

Step 2



PIN around the entire perimeter and check you are happy with the positioning of your design, then turn over to the reverse. Use double-sided tape to secure the fabric excess around all four sides.

Step 3



SECURE the fabric edges with masking tape and remove the pins. Position your stitching in the frame and back with a second piece of mount board. Seal the edges with more masking tape to finish off.

ayering, using different elements to create layers in your work, is simple and fun! We've started with perforated paper layers to create our mini boat scene, where the paper has been cut to create the crest of the waves. Next, keeping on the sea theme, we've created our own boat in an acetate bottle. And who could resist our cute caravan? Its flowery fabric roof, ric-rac awnings and button tyre are a lot of fun and the ribbon and cross stitch layers add the finishing touch! We know you'll







have fun making these - enjoy!








HOW TO... CREATE PERFORATED PAPER LAYERS

Stitch, then layer up, our rolling waves for the perfect sea scene.




Step 1



START by stitching the background boat design, using the chart below, onto some 28 count linen, followed by the first layer of your perforated paper waves. Leave at least four perforations around the stitched area.

Step 2



cut carefully around the stitched waves along the top edge of the perforated paper — backstitched here — leaving a single paper block around your stitching. Neaten the cut edges by trimming the edges to smooth the shape.

Step 3




POSITION this layer over the stitched background, matching up stitches and covering unstitched areas which need to be hidden. Pin in position and backstitch around the sides and bottom edge to hold in place.

Step 4



CREATE the second perforated paper layer, and trim and stitch in position as explained above. To finish, cut an aperture mount from white mount board, with an aperture measuring 5.5x5.5cm.



Perforated paper produces a larger stitched area compared to the 28 count linen. Keep checking your stitching to match up the finished size.



HOW TO... ADD AN ACETATE LAYER

Create an acetate bottle to reveal what's in the layer under it.




Step 1



START by tracing the bottle template on this page onto a sheet of graph paper, taking extra care to keep it square to the graph grid. Position your acetate rectangle on top of this and then tape in place.

Step 2



PLACE the graph paper over a piece of craft foam and with a sharp needle make a series of perforations around the bottle outline as shown above – one grid square in from the drawn template outline.





Step 3



KEEP the graph paper in place – the static from the acetate will help to hold it in position, as well as the tape – cut the bottle shape from the acetate, cutting along the drawn bottle outline on the graph paper.


Step 4



POSITION the cut-out acetate bottle over your stitched boat – backstitched here – and hold in place with tape. Finally backstitch around the perforated edge, keeping your stitches square to the fabric as much as possible.

HOW TO... LAYER FABRIC AND RIBBON

A great stashbuster, our cute caravan pincushion is made from multiple layers.



Step 1



MAKE the layered background fabric first. Cut out three pieces to measure 15x5cm. Place the top and middle fabric right sides together. Pin and machine stitch the long edge, 1cm from the fabric edge. Iron open the seam.

Step 2



PLACE this machine stitched fabric face up and position the third fabric piece on top, matching up the cut fabric edges, as shown above. Pin the layers together and machine stitch, 1cm from the fabric edge.

Step 3




IRON open the seam next, ready to add layers. Prepare your cross stitched layers by backing with iron-on interfacing. Cut out, leaving a 2-3 linen thread border and buttonhole stitch around the edges.

Step 4



TACK and machine stitch a length of ribbon over the visible seams of the backing fabric. Position and machine stitch the cross stitched window and door in place. Add button details, before making into a pincushion.





Make a... cake band

Step 1

CUT the aida band to fit around your cake, plus overlap. Work all the cross stitch in two strands of stranded cotton, and the backstitch in one strand. You can either stitch the three pigs in the centre, or repeat the design to cover the complete band.

Step 2

SEW a pink button over each pig's nose. Wrap the band around the cake, holding it in place with a pin.



An interview with...

Tessa Perlow

Embroiderer Tessa Perlow takes make do and mend – and makes it super pretty. She spoke to *CrossStitcher* about what inspires her....

Interview by Katie Allen

essa Perlow's awesome
embroidery skills turn the
plainest charity shop finds
into must-have fashion.

A real stitch artist, her dream is to put
on a show in a gallery – we think it's
only a matter of time! We asked the
New Jersey-based stitcher what excites
her about needle and thread.

Have you always been creative?

I've always loved drawing, making things and being imaginative. My favourite thing to do growing up was drawing people out of magazines with my little sister at the kitchen table.

When did you first get bitten by the fashion bug?

As I grew up I really fell in love with fashion and asked my mum to teach me to sew. By the time I was in high school I had decided I wanted to be a



fashion designer and I was making all of my clothes and sewing every day after school.

What do you love about stitching?

I've always loved embroidery from a visual standpoint – seeing couture

garments in magazines or vintage pieces in a museum.

For me, embroidery combines everything I love – art, fashion, craft and history. It's like painting but with threads and is so dependent on your hands.

What inspired you to begin upcycling clothes with embroidery?

During my degree I did an internship at a design label where I hand-beaded garments. I totally loved the process and seeing how the beading could transform a garment. The summer after, for fun I embroidered a thrift store cream shift dress. It was pretty sloppy but I totally fell in love.

I've been upcycling things most of my life. It started out as a way to save money but I also love the challenge of giving garments new life. Growing up I didn't have too much money to buy fabric, so I would make dresses

out of old curtains or cut apart hand-me-downs. My mum is totally my inspiration, she used to make pillows out of old dresses.

Can you tell us more about your process in making your artworks and embroidered clothes?

I usually have a handful of ideas in my mind as well as a million scribbled in my journals. I either try to find a garment that works, or make a simple top. I like to go to a Goodwill thrift store without aim and stumble upon pieces. If I'm ever stumped about what to work on, I go to the library and check out some art and science books.

Why do you love using embroidery so much?

I love how embroidery can turn something basic into an extraordinary and romantic piece. It usually takes me anywhere from one day to a week to complete a project. Usually I am really excited to see how it will turn out and just embroider non-stop until it is finished!

There's so much detail in your work - do you stitch full time?

I currently work part-time at The Market Project which is a really amazing local retail collaborative project in Asbury Park, New Jersey, and I sell my embroidery with them too. Its really easy for me to just work non-stop but it is actually healthy to get out and interact with other makers and friends.

What is it you love so much about stitching flowers in particular?

I've always been in love with flowers! In school when everyone was working in black I was the one with some crazy floral print. Growing up my mum was always gardening; she is also Dutch, which I think contributes to my love of flowers – we always had a lot of tulip folk imagery around the house. There is something about flowers that is incredibly magical.

Can you tell us a little bit about your customers?

I am so lucky that people want to buy and wear my work. My first

customers were friends and family, but I've sold to people all over the world with Etsy. I've done a lot of cool embroidered jean jackets and custom projects for gifts. I've also made a couple of wedding dresses which was a really cool honour.

Do you still have any dream projects that you'd really like to work on in the future?

I have so many! I would love to work on a collection of embroidered performance pieces and incorporate them into a short film.

I'm really excited about embroidery art. I'd love to focus completely on some large-scale pieces I've started that are kind of like embroidered paintings of still lives. I think embroidery is a pretty untapped medium in the world of fine art. This year I want to challenge myself to step out of my comfort zone.





Make a... weather board

LAY the wadding on top of the art or stiff cardboard, and then over this place your stitching, wrapping the excess fabric around and onto the back of the board. The fabric needs to be held firmly over the board, so to do this either use double-sided tape, or lace across the back, pulling the fabric edges together.

Step 2

COVER the back of the board with the felt rectangle, and then catch stitch around the edges to hold it firmly in place. Stand the board on a work surface, or stitch a hanger to the back.

Step 1

with the stitching right-side up, place the backing fabric on top. Pin, then machine stitch, the cushion front and the backing fabric together with a 1.25cm (½in) seam allowance, but leaving a gap at the bottom for turning.

Step 2

TURN to the right side. Insert the cushion pad, and then sew up the gap with small, neat stitches.

Make a... cookie cutter card

Step 1

WORK all the cross stitch in two strands of stranded cotton, and the backstitch and French knots in one strand.

Step 2

MAKE a cardboard shape to fit inside the cookie cutter. To do this, draw around the cutter, transferring the shape to the cardboard. Cut out using sharp scissors, and then trim away a small amount of cardboard from the edges, until it fits inside the cutter shape.

Step 3

PLACE the cardboard shape on the reverse side of the stitched aida. Make sure that the design is centrally placed on the shape. Draw around the shape with a pencil working on the wrong side of the stitching. Cut out the shape from the aida, adding 1.25cm (1/2 in) outside of the pencil line.

Step 4

WRAP the stitching around the cardboard, cutting 'v' shaped indents to help ease the aida around the shape. Use double-sided tape to attach the stitching to the cardboard.

Step 5

CUT a felt shape to fit the back of the covered cardboard. Stitch or glue this to the back.

Step 6

USE a hole punch to make a hole in the centre top of the card. Cut a length of ribbon long enough to go between the back of the assembled shape, and through the hole to the inside of the card. Sew one end of the ribbon to the felt on the back of the shape. Push the assembled shape back into the cutter.

Step 7

THREAD the other end of the ribbon through the hole in the card, and then glue it to the inside of the card to hold the cutter in place. Make a small bow with the rest of the ribbon, and attach this to the card to cover the hole made in the cardboard.



Make a... zipped purse

Step 1

as your stitched purse front, for the back. Turn over the top edge of the purse front and back, so that you have 7mm (¼in) above the stitching. Press in place. Open up a 10cm (4in) zip, and then place one side on the reverse side of the stitching, so that the zip is at the top of your purse front, with the teeth facing up. Machine stitch in place, close to the zip's teeth. Repeat for the purse back.

Step 2


PIN the purse front and back together, aligning the zip. Stitch down the side seams and along the bottom of the purse. Neaten the seams and clip the corners before turning to the right side.


Step 3

WRAP stranded cotton onto the cotton reels, and stitch to the front of the purse, into the positions shown on our photos. Sew the scissor charm to the front of the 'I Love Sewing' purse.

Make a... needle case

Step 1

COMPLETE the stitching then fray the edges of the evenweave, carefully removing one thread at a time.

Step 2

PLACE the red felt on top of the white. Fold in half widthways, and then stitch down the fold which will be the spine of the needle case.

Step 3

PIN the stitching on the front of the needle case, making sure you attach it to just one layer of felt. Using a sewing machine, stitch around the edge of the fabric, just inside the frayed edge.

TIE the cord or string around the spine of the needle case, adding a few stitches to hold it in place.


















































































Our designs were stitched on 14 count aida and 27 count evenweave over two threads of fabric. The cross stitch is in two strands and the backstitch and French knots are in one strand. The stitch count, design size and stitch time will depend on which motif or scene you choose to stitch.

More to make...

Our home décor motifs are great for all sorts of projects. Here are some more ideas you could make...

- Use waste canvas to decorate a plain hot water bottle cover with the bed design.
- 2 The craft room motifs are perfect for making a birthday card for a stitching friend.
- Stitch four household scenes and attach them to the inside of an empty shoe box to create a mini doll's house for a child.

THE ESSENTIAL KIT YOU'LL NEED TO START STITCHING

NEEDLES

For basic stitching you'll need a tapestry needle that has a blunt tip and large eye. Use a size 24 needle for most aidas, and a size 26 for evenweaves and linens. Use a sharp embroidery needle for finer details such as backstitch and French knots.

EMBROIDERY SCISSORS

Embroidery scissors are an absolute must-have. Keep yours sharp by only using them to cut threads .

STRANDED COTTON

Embroidery thread is also called stranded cotton. Each thread length is made up of six strands of cotton twisted together. The chart key will tell you how many strands you'll need to stitch with.

HOOPS AND FRAMES

Though not absolutely essential, we do recommend using an embroidery hoop or frame to keep an even stitching tension.

FABRICS


Aida is an ideal choice for cross stitch beginners. 14 count is the most common, although it's available in a huge variety of colours and counts. Each cross stitch is worked over a single aida block, making counting and keeping your place a cinch.

Evenweave is much simpler to work with than you might think. Start with a 25 or 28 count evenweave, such as Zweigart Lugana. Once you're confident, try your hand at a linen version.

THE KEY


all the symbols that appear on the chart are listed in the key with their corresponding thread codes beside them. The key also tells you the different stitches used in the design.

The closest column of thread codes listed next to the chart symbols is the thread brand that's used in the design.

Similar colour matches are listed alongside it. Where no close match can be found, you may have to use a different brand of thread for that shade.



EACH square on the chart represents a single cross stitch. Start from the centre of the design and your fabric. The centre of our charts are indicated by arrows at the designs' edges. To find your fabric's centre, fold it in half and into quarters.



HOW TO JOIN OUR STITCH-ALONG

STITCH-ALONGS CAN take many different forms – in our case we're unveiling a new chart in each issue between January and December, with a bonus design in our Summer issue.

To join our stitch-along you will need a 61x41cm (24x16in) piece of platinum 28 count Cashel linen, ref: 3281/770, or 14 count aida to complete the whole design. The finished size is 40x19cm (15%x7 ½in) which is 221 high x 105 wide. The twelve rectangular designs, one for each month of the year, will all be the same size, and you will be stitching them two columns wide and six rows deep.


Start with the dark blue stitch in the top left-hand corner of the March design, leaving one square between this and the corresponding blue stitch on the snowman border above.


Start stitching... on aida

Step 1




CUT a 40cm thread length, and thread your needle with two of the six strands. Knot one end and start with a waste knot (opposite). Make a diagonal half cross stitch across a single aida block.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to make the cross. You can work a row of half cross stitches first, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches. All the top stitches should face the same way.


and... on evenweave



INSTEAD of taking your needle diagonally across a single aida block, take your needle diagonally across two evenweave threads, creating a half cross stitch as before.

STARTING A THREAD

1. Away waste knot



KNOT one end of your thread and take it down through the front of your fabric, 2cm from your starting point.Bring it back up to the front of the fabric to make your first stitch. Begin stitching your design, making sure you stitch over your starting thread with each stitch. Once you're happy that your starting thread is secure, snip off the knot. To secure your thread when you've finished stitching, weave it through the back of your stitches.

2. Loop knot



knot the neatest method. Cut a single length of thread, twice as long as normal. Fold in half to create a loop at one end. Thread your needle with the two tail ends. Bring your needle up to the front of your fabric, leaving a small loop of thread on the reverse. Make a half cross stitch, passing your needle through the loop on the reverse, as shown. Pull all the way to secure the thread then continue with your stitching.

FRENCH KNOTS

Go dotty with this simple way to add neat knots to your designs

Step 1



BRING your needle up at your starting point and wrap your thread once or twice around the needle. Use one strand for a small knot and two for a chunkier knot. Hold your thread end firmly and take your needle down, ever so slightly away from where you came up. Slide the twisted thread down the needle, so it rests on the fabric's surface, and gently feed the needle through the fabric.

ADDING BACKSTITCH OUTLINES & DETAILS

Step 1



WORK your backstitch once you've finished the cross stitch. To secure your thread, weave it through the back of your stitches, then bring your needle up to the surface.

Step 2



MAKE each backstitch over one thread of fabric on aida and two threads if you work on evenweave. Follow the chart to see where to place each one.

Step 2



KEEP your thread as taut as possible to prevent the knot becoming loose. Gently pull your thread through to tighten the knot, so that it sits neatly on the surface.

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

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
