



We need to talk about Alexa



In the last four weeks alone, Amazon Echo's virtual assistant has learnt to lock your doors, schedule appointments in your calendar, order your usual at Starbucks, and even diagnose what's wrong with you. Better known as Alexa,

the system has 7,000 skills at last count, but this is clearly increasing all the time. 'So what?' you say - automation tool IFTTT has millions of ways of working with your gadgets and web services. Rather it's how you interact with Alexa that's so innovative: you just say what you want aloud and she makes it happen.

The Amazon Echo launched in the UK last September, but is set to be everywhere this year. Alexa will be able to control your washing machine, talk to you through your television, travel with you in your car and even strap to your wrist, thanks to Fitbit. 



WHAT ever Happeneb to...





The Italian company better known for making iconic scooters is branching out into robotics. Piaggio, which makes Vespa scooters, is developing Gita, a spherical 'cargo robot' that will carry your shopping for you and follow in your footsteps.

Resembling an exercise ball with tyre tracks, Gita (pronounced 'jee-ta', which is Italian for 'short trip') is two feet tall and can carry 40 pounds (about 18 kilograms or five shopping bags full) of supplies. It can also travel at speeds of up to 22 miles per hour (mph), so can easily keep up with you if you're cycling home. The manufacturer also says it will have an eight-hour battery life.

Rather than using facial recognition or body tracking to follow you, like some

drones do, the Gita tracks a special white belt with built-in camera that you have to wear. While following you, Gita develops a 3D map of the surroundings, so that it can repeat the journey on its own. The robot also has its own cameras and an ultrasonic range-finding system to help it avoid obstacles, including other pedestrians. This means Gita could also be used to make deliveries across town on its own.

There is no word on a consumer launch date or a price just yet, but the robot will be test-piloted by a Boston-based spinoff of the company called Piaggio Fast Forward later this year, with Gita working in businesses and on university campuses around the US.

A TASTE OF THE FUTURE?

Gita is not the first droid that could be used for making deliveries. The grandly-titled company Starship Technologies is currently testing its own six-wheeled robots in 56 cities worldwide. In the UK, this is in a partnership with online takeaway service Just Eat to transport pizzas, curries and more across the capital. After being tested in Greenwich, the drones are slowly being rolled out across London. These robots can carry 10kg and have a maximum speed of four miles per hour. When the robot arrives, the customer receives a notification with a code that unlocks the robot's lid.







ANDROID WEAR 2.0 WANTS YOU TO LEAVE YOUR PHONE AT HOME

OUT NOW

After several delays, Android Wear 2.0 is finally here, and it's the biggest update to Google's smartwatch operating system ever.

Apps will now be installed on the wearable, and won't require a smartphone to open. Instead, compatible watches will be able to use Bluetooth, Wi-Fi, or even their own mobile signal to receive notifications or get online.

To access apps, Android Wear 2.0 includes its own version of the Play Store. This should be of particular interest to iPhone users, as it will allow them to cheat on Apple and try a more affordable smartwatch without having to

replace their preferred phone. (A few Android Wear-compatible apps are available on iPhone already, but enough to make it worthwhile.) Some of the first apps to work with Wear 2.0 are the taxi-ordering service Uber, fitness app Strava, and Glide, which allows you to video chat via your wrist like your Inspector Gadget.

The update also adds support for contactless payments using Android Pay; customisable watch faces so that you can better personalise your device; in-depth fitness tracking with Google Fit; and you can choose to respond to messages by dictating,

typing or handwriting your answer. Android Wear 2.0 also brings Google's Assistant to your wrist, the same voice-controlled service that's also used on the Google Pixel and Google Home smart speaker.

Android Wear 2.0 was launched alongside the LG Watch Style (pictured, above) and LG Watch Sport. The Tag Heuer Connected 2 will also launch with 2.0 built-in later this month as will the Casio WSD-F20 in April. But the update is also available for every existing Android smartwatch, except the original Moto 360, LG G Watch and Sony Smartwatch 3.

Poster boy for the Android Wear 2.0, the LG Watch Sport (pictured, right) can support its own cellular connection, so that it can totally replace your phone. But, unlike our American cousins, UK users won't be able to tie their current number to the second SIM inside the wearable. In the States, network providers AT&T and Verzion allow users to do it, so if someone calls your regular mobile number, your watch will ring, even if you're away from your phone. However, UK networks EE, 02, Vodafone and Three have confirmed they won't be offering a similar service. Instead, you'll be forced to grab a pay-as-you-go or SIM-only package and use a second number for your smartwatch – which is cumbersome, to say the least.

What's the point of a smartwatch if it costs as much as the limb you would wear it on? This watch is a little lacking in its looks, but costs half as much as most Android Wear and will be as fully featured as the rest once you update it.





Earlier this year, Lego was said to have built itself into the world's most powerful brand, overtaking Ferrai for pole position. It doesn't appear ready to be knocked from its towering position any time soon, having unveiled Lego Boost, a new 843-brick coding kit that lets create your own working robot.

Set to come with a Bluetooth LE-enabled Move Hub that has an integrated tilt sensor as well as motors and a colour-distance sensor, you'll be able to build five high-tech models.

These include a robot called Vince, a playable electric guitar, an interactive meowing cat, a bulldozer and, perhaps most intriguing, an autobuilder which actually constructs small Lego models for you.

Unlike Lego's current, more advanced, robot-builder, Mindstorms, Boost will utilise the ordinary iconic bricks that are found in most kids' cupboards or on the floor (much to the dismay of bare feet). The creations can then be brought to life using a simple, easily-

learned drag-and-drop coding language that is similar to Scratch. This will be integrated within a free app for Android and iOS and there will have more than 60 activities to try.

With sound and light capabilities as well as the potential for open-ended creation, Lego is hoping the set will encourage a new generation of robotic enthusiasts and coders. Costing \$160 (UK pricing has yet to be announced). it's certainly looking to be good value for money.

Last year, Lenovo released its ultra-thin, dual-screen tablet Yoga Book which was available with Windows or Android and allowed you to take notes or draw with a real-ink stylus. This year, it has dispensed with the pen yet retained the slim styling in the expectation its new lightweight Yoga A12 is going to fly off the shelves.

Although this fresh, lower-cost model has a larger, 12.2-inch HD screen, it opens to just 5.4mm at its slimmest edge and weighs in at less than a kilogram. It uses a modified version of Android Marshmallow that allows you to multitask over three columns while flipping between a laptop and tablet with the utmost ease, thanks to its 360-degree hinge.

But it's the entirely flat, touchscreen Halo keyboard which will amaze you the most. The same as that of the more expensive Yoga Book, it only activates when the needed. The unraised keys light up and give a gentle haptic feedback as you bash away so you know they are working, while built-in predictive software figures out your typing habits so that your wordsmith sessions become that much faster.

In many ways, the Yoga A12 shows how the productively landscape is changing: you don't need Windows or macOS to make light work of those tasks these days. Even better, while Yoga A12 is more akin to a Chromebook than a laptop, at \$299 (around £240 - a UK price is TBC), it proves innovation doesn't always have to cost the earth.

Just bought yourself a shiny new iPhone 7, but realised there is no where to plug in your headphones? Don't worry, high-end audio maker Bang & Olufsen has got you covered with its new Bluetooth Beoplay H4 over-ear headphones set, which is also the company's most affordable yet.

However, before you start rummaging through bargain bins looking for them, bear in mind Bang & Olufsen's previous wireless gold standard, the Beoplay H7, cost £330/\$400. Relatively speaking, the Beoplay H4 is more accessible, priced almost £100 less at £250/\$300. Crucially, the H4 even offers near-identical specs to the H7: the set has the same Beoplay sound signature, the same

life while the H7 set boast 20 hours. Bang & Olufsen has not skimped on design materials, either: its aluminium earcups are polished and anodised, while both of its ear cushions and headband are covered

in super soft lambskin.

Where concessions have been made is that the H4 does not support the AptX audio codec that improves the sound of tunes streamed from your phone. Where the H7 set

also had touchscreen controls built into the earcups, the H4 only has physical buttons for adjusting music. But while these may seem less futuristic, they are also less finicky.

Of course, this is 2017, so the sets come with an optional app to download. The Beoplay App (for Android, iPhone and Apple Watch) allows you to switch between different sound profiles, including adjusting the audio for listening to podcasts instead of music and for when working out at the gym. It also allows you to tweak EQ levels to suit your needs and monitor the H4's battery life.



DELL'S CANVAS IS LIKE A SURFACE STUDIO WITHOUT A PC

Microsoft caused a stir when it launched the Surface Studio last year. Many called the PC with fold-down touchscreen display a 'Mac Killer', offering a level of innovation Apple hasn't for some time, while also appealing to the Mac's user base of designers. But priced at £3,200/\$4,000, the Studio is unlikely to have the same mass appeal Apple has cultivated. However, Dell's new Canvas offers similar tech for less than half the price.

The Canvas is a touchscreen with a similar sloping drafting table design as the Studio.
However, it is only a monitor, so it will work with

any existing PC. The Canvas is intended to work as a second screen that can be used for sketching or animation. The Canvas even comes with its own version of the puck-like controller that impressed people in the Studio demo. What Microsoft called the Dial, Dell has named the Totem, and both do the same thing: when placed on the screen, it pulls up a circular menu that can be used with different apps, such as a colour picker.

There is a slight trade-off, however, with the Canvas' chunky bezel looking less polished than the Studio and the screen is sub-4K.





Things have moved on along way from that Scalextric set you had as a kid. Anki Overdrive's racing cars are remote controlled by your smartphone, but they use Al to make sure they stay on the track, leaving you to concentrate on beating your opponent. You can do this by overtaking them or blasting them with virtual weapons, including a railgun and mines that explode after a set time.

Because you're playing with some seriously clever toys, you don't just have to duel friends – you can also race one of 25 different Al opponents

(though the track only supports four at a time). The better you play, the better these robotic racers become and regular software updates add new features to the game all the time. You can also reassemble and extend the modular track into any shape you like, adding corners, ramps, jumps and more, to vary up the gameplay.

While the Overdrive Starter Kit has been around for a little while, Anki have now added two more battle-racers to the fray in the form of supertrucks. Almost three times the size of Anki's supercars, with

weapons that can physically blast opponents off the track, these robotic rigs pit size and strength against speed and agility. The supertrucks also have their own game mode called Takeover, which allows any racer that can break through the lorry's defences to take command of it and wreak havoc on their opponents' supercars.

Amazon wasn't at the CES 2017 gadget showcase in Las Vegas but Alexa certainly was.

Thanks to a decision to allow third-party devs and manufacturers to integrate the technology into their own products, the number of gadgets making use of Alexa has exploded.

Voice command tech is already the hot trend for this year and everyone seems to want in on the action. Google is certainly putting up a fight with its low-cost Home speaker and there's talk of an equivalent device using Apple's Siri. Sony is hoping its cute Xperia Agent will give it the edge too but Amazon is leading the way.

Echo sales have reached more than 8 million units to date and the Christmas period has given this burgeoning sub-industry great hope. Nines times as many Echoes were sold at Christmas compared to the one before and thousands of developers are eagerly lending it a host of new Skills.

By incorporating Alexa into tech as diverse as fridges and lamps and by allowing it to work in conjunction will all manner of gadgets, such as mobile phones, thermostats and audio systems, the seeds are being sown for truly connected home automation. So sit back, ask Alexa to order you a pizza and read on.

LET ALEXA LIGHT THE WAY

Alexa is already on the road to sainthood – she certainly won't swear or get angry with you – but giving her a halo? Really? Well, it appears that GE has done exactly that by devising a standalone, voice-controlled, circular lamp that has an Alexa-enabled microphone and speaker built into its base.

Not only does it look contemporarily gorgeous, it works in exactly the same way as Amazon Echo albeit without the use of separate unit, phone or hub. Issue instructions and a set of blue LEDs on the inner rim will light up to the sound of your voice, prompting Alexa to respond.

You can then play music, set alarms, listen to a news briefing, create a shopping list enjoy a joke or control other Alexa-compatible devices. And because it operates as a fully-functioning light that illuminates your room, you can also use it to switch the lamp on and off.

MAKE SOME EXTRA NOISE




While Amazon Echo has a 2.5-inch woofer and a two-inch tweeter capable of sending deep bass and high notes to your ears, the sound still won't reach neighbouring rooms with any great clarity. Pop these Bluetooth speakers into your ceiling, though, and you'll be able to stream music from an Echo or Echo Dot while using either device to control them.

Aside from turning the speakers on and off and figuring what you'd like to play, you can change and even cap the volume – perfect if you want to tone someone's taste in music down a bit. The speakers also come in two guises: one for use in normal rooms and a waterproof version.

In either case, they are fitted without the need for a separate amplifier and they only need to be connected to your lighting circuit in order to power. Since you can connect up more than one, you can have stereo sound and because they use magnetic covers, they can be swapped out if you wish.

WHAT ARE SKILLS?

Ask Alexa what a skill is and it'll answer: "A skill is the learned ability to carry out a task with predetermined results often within a given amount of time, energy or both." That, in short, means it is an ability possessed by any one person but it's not far off the mark when it comes to Alexa's own particular set of 'Skills'.

In Alexa's case, a Skill is a specialised app controlled by your voice, and when the Echo was launched there were 13 of them. Today, there are more than 8,000, with new Skills being created every week. By installing them, you can widen the scope of Alexa's interactions to play voice games, plan trips away, order rides, dictate messages, get recipes, hear flash briefings and much more.

Installing them is easy: just search for a skill on your Alexa app and tap Enable Skill. Some Skills require you to log into third-party accounts while others will work immediately. You can also enable and disable Skills using your voice. Saying "Alexa, enable BBC News," for instance, will activate this particular flashing briefing. Likewise, uttering, "Disable Sky News," will have the opposite effect.

From that point, you can verbally ask Alexa to put the heating on at a specific temperature, switch lights on and off or activate any devices plugged into a Hive socket. Best of all, Hive has got to grips with British dialect and unique turns of phrase. Say, "Crank the heating up," or, "Let there be light," for instance, and it'll know exactly what you want to happen.

HUSH! IS SOMEBODY LISTENING?

Of course, inviting an internet-connected listening device into your home raises privacy concerns. When you say "Alexa", your Echo springs into life. So that means it's always listening, doesn't it? Well, yes and no. Alexa is indeed constantly keeping its digital ear out for its wake word, but the listening at this stage is only local and it is not being saved.

Audio streaming only begins once Alexa is activated, either by uttering its name, pressing the button on top of the Echo or holding the mic button on an Amazon Fire TV remote (that's right, Alexa lives there, too). You'll know Echo is recording by looking out for the illuminated blue ring. It stops when the request has been uploaded to the cloud and processed.

You can then, if you wish, go to History in Settings in the Alexa app for your phone to review what the device has picked up (deleting any or all entries if you wish). Anything which remains is analysed by Amazon, which it claims makes the results more personal and accurate over time

Yet while the data is encrypted, protecting it from hackers, the information will include the device location and it can be shared with third parties for their own anonymous market research. For that reason, you may want to refrain from linking sensitive accounts to Alexa and to mute Echo when it's not being used by pushing the mic on/off button on the top. You will know Alexa is not listening because the Echo's LED ring will glow a ferocious HAL 9000 red, until you switch the microphone back on.

SPEAK TO ALEXA IN THE CAR



Drive with a mobile phone clasped to your ear in the UK and you'll face a fixed £200 penalty and six points on your licence. Fix your Android phone to the magnetic ZeroTouch car mount, however, and you can make and receive calls, play your music and even text using nothing more than your voice.

As the first product to make Alexa available for any car, this uses Bluetooth to automatically open the ZeroTouch app. You can then keep your eyes on the road while you control your home from afar or keep in touch with the wider world, sharing your location with others or using navigation apps to find your way around.

There's a big drive to make use of the voice service, though. BMW's Connected smartphone app uses Alexa in the US, allowing owners to lock the car remotely, check their fuel levels and keep an eye on the battery charge. Hyundai is also offering Alexa voice commands in its Genesis range while Ford recently announced it had teamed up with Amazon to offer the industry's first in-car Alexa capability.

A REALLY PERSONAL TRAINER

If you already feel the number of available Skills for Alexa is exhausting, then you're going to be flat out when you hear that Fitbit has been integrating Alexa into its health products for around a year.

As the first wearable company to do so, it calls on Alexa to encourage you to stay on top of your goals. So aside from offering words of encouragement tailored to the time of day, you can ask for your step count, check how many minutes you've been active for, the number of

calories you've burned and how well you are sleeping.

Indeed, you can also ask for your resting heart-rate, your weight, the number of stairs you've climbed and how much water you've had. As long as the tracker is background syncing with the Fitbit app, the answers are just a shout away. In doing so, you don't have to lift an arm or even a finger.

DESIGN/LOOKS

One of the better things about the Home system, is that it can purchased with an array of different bases, which help it blend into any home. It's noticeably bulker than the Echo, which will put off some, but its unusual shape is more pleasing on the eye.

PERSONAL ASSISTANT

Thanks to Google's exploits with its Now software, Home is as clever as they come. Users can have a full conversation with Home's virtual assistant, through which subjects can be explored more closely when needed. It then saves this conversation for later use for its own reference.

HOME HUB

Home doesn't have the same wow factor when it comes to managing your daily life, and lacks the reminder system that Echo boasts. It does provide support, however, for improved use with a wide range of smart home devices, allowing users to automate different functions through them.

ENTERTAINMENT

Although Home doesn't boast the same breadth of streaming capabilities, it's holy grail is its YouTube capability that Echo can't offer. Playlists, mixes and even obscure DJ sets can all be picked up through Home providing instant playback. We would say it's behind Echo in terms of audio quality, however.



WHATEVER HAPPENED TO SIRI?

Siri was the world's first virtual assistant when it launched six years ago. But the iPhone's own digital genie has massively fallen behind the new kids on the block, Alexa and Google Assistant. Algorithm improvements have made both of Siri's primary competitors able to perform more functions, and work in tandem with a greater spectrum of devices. But we shouldn't discount Siri just yet.

Just last autumn, Apple made Siri the marquee feature of its macOS Sierra launch. This brought its virtual assistant to its computer range for the first time. 





Honor delivers high-end performance and an accomplished camera phone on a budget

It's fair to say that Samsung pretty much has the Android flagship market sewn up. While competitors have fallen by the wayside, the S7 and S7 Edge command huge sales – at huge prices – providing Android's best hope of competing with the latest Apple iPhones. But what if you don't want to spend £500 on a device? What if you want to spend half that amount, but still have access to the majority of the features on Cupertino's finest? The Honor range just might be the answer. High-spec and high value is the Huawei subsidiary's bread and butter - its handsets offer unique features, great specs and great quality, all on a budget.

The latest Honor device, the 6X, follows in the footsteps of its predecessor and fixes the primary complaints with that device. It's true to the classic Honor formula, which means it has every chance of being a great device.

The last Honor release, the 5C, performed admirably, but cut one corner too many - the lack of a fingerprint sensor was particularly disappointing. Thankfully, there's no such issue here. The Honor brand is aimed at 'Digital Natives' – those of us who spend our lives on our phones. The brand has been marketed through non-traditional (digital) channels in the US and Europe, and as a result it has a much younger following than its Huawei parent - it's definitely the 'cooler' sub-brand, which is no bad thing.

This device's predecessor, the Honor 5X, looked at launch like it was going to be a smash hit. As the first device to be sold under the Honor brand in the US, it was significant in its use of the Snapdragon 616 processor rather than the expected homegrown Kirin CPU, but in practice this turned out to be

TWO CAMERAS ARE BETTER THAN ONE

WHY DOES THE 6X BATTERY LAST SO LONG?

One of our favourite things about the Honor 6X is the battery life – it just lasts and lasts. This is the result of a multi-pronged approach from Honor, common to many of the company's devices. First and foremost, the 6X uses a 3340mAh battery, which is larger than most of its peers. Despite this, the device isn't excessively chunky, at only 8.2mm thick. Of course, a big battery alone isn't enough – the 6X stamina is also assisted by 16nm chipset, which reduces both power usage and the energy that is lost as heat.

The love-it-or-hate-it EMUI software layer includes numerous software tweaks designed to improve battery life, including the ability to warn when applications are consuming excess power in the background. The Android Doze feature is of course included, which saves battery life when your device is not being used by effectively 'pausing' apps.

>> something of a negative – performance was disappointing. Since the 5X's release, however, Huawei has made a strategic shift and with the launch of the budget flagship Honor 8, introduced Kirin to America. The 6X dispenses with the Qualcomm part and instead packs a Kirin 655 - Huawei's latest, mid-tier 16nm processor. At the launch of this device and indeed the 5C, Honor talked a lot about the CPU, and with good reason. While discussing the fabrication process might bore the most dedicated of Android fans, the reality is that using such an efficient process yields clear benefits in performance, battery life and thermals (cool running) - a Kirin processor is certainly no longer a negative point as it was a few years ago. Add in a generous 3GB of RAM and it's no surprise that Honor's 6X handset runs impressively smoothly

It wasn't long ago that metal unibody finishes were solely the domain of high-end HTC devices, but Honor has definitely got the process perfected now, too. The frosted metal curved back feels great in the hand with a subtle curve that helps disguise even further the impressively svelte 8.2mm body. The effect du jour at the moment is a thin bevel on the front with 2.5D glass curving to meet the edge of the device and this technique is employed on the 6X to great effect.

When you turn on the device, the first thing you'll notice is the 5.5-inch full-HD screen and, specifically, its brightness. With a maximum level of a near eye-searing 450 nits, you're likely to spend most of your time at a relatively low setting, which helps with battery life. As well as being bright, the 403 PPI display is impressively sharp with good colour

reproduction. As with its siblings, the Honor 6X uses on-screen buttons, with the bezel below the display proudly wearing the Honor logo. The bezels, in general, are well proportioned, the black 6X in particular is quite a looker.

The devices at the very top of the Android tree, the Google Pixel and Pixel XL feature a rear-mounted fingerprint scanner, a design choise that Honor has also employed when making the 6X. Unlocking the handset is accurate if not quite as fast as on the Pixel devices (or the Honor 8), but the location of the sensor, just below the dual cameras, falls naturally to the hand. The sensor also doubles as a configurable button which can be used to scroll or take selfies based on a swipe or a tap. It works very well.

Connectivity is provided in the form of 4G LTE on one SIM slot with 2G available in a second hybrid slot. A hybrid slot is one that can either be used for a second SIM card, or for a microSD card up to 128GB in size, should the provided 32GB storage not be sufficient. Bluetooth 4.1 is present as is 802.11b/g/n one of the main notable omissions from the 6X is 5GHz Wi-Fi, which is a little disappointing On the bottom of the device you'll spot a Micro USB port in lieu of the emerging USB C standard. At this point in time we can forgive this and in reality, many buyers will already have a host of Micro USB chargers and cables, so it might not be such a bad thing. A 3.5mm headphone jack is also present, so you won't need a crazy adaptor just to plug in your headphones. Phew!

One of the most polarising features of Honor or Huawei devices is the custom software overlay, EMUI. EMUI dispenses with many aspects of the stock Android experience such as the app drawer and heavily skins everything else. While unforgiveable for Android purists, EMUI does have a large number of useful changes, including a raft of power management optimisations that help the 6X deliver seriously impressive battery life. Out of the box, the phone has Android 6.0 Marshmallow with EMUI 4.1, however a software update is imminent that will bump the OS to Android 7.0 with EMUI, which features a notification pull-down that is much closer to Google's vision. This tweak alone will satisfy most EMUI detractors.

You've probably guessed by now that we're fans of the 6X. With the great camera and well rounded spec sheet, Honor has a real recipe for success on its hands. While lacking a few of the features found at the very top end, the device is plenty good enough for all but the most demanding flagship fans. Our main disappointment being the lack of an oleophobic coating or Gorilla Glass with the screen, which leads to extreme fingerprints. Keep a cloth in your bag and you can go about your business safe in the knowledge you've snagged yet another Honor bargain.

There's no denying that the fitness tracker market is oversaturated, and it takes something unique to stand out from the crowd. For years, most will have chosen a tracker that's placed on wrist, usually sacrificing comfort in favour of functionality. Now that's all fine, but what if we told you that both of these things are possible, and in a product a quarter of the size you'd expect.

The Motiv Ring is a bold, new take on the classic fitness tracker formula, packing in the usual wireless tracking features into the small frame of a ring. Its size means you'll never need to take it off, and its modern look won't mean you'll be embarrassed wearing it to the gym either. From a technical standpoint, putting a fitness tracker on your finger makes a lot of sense. The usual issues of hair and tattoos impeding the band's heart rate monitor is a thing of the past.

When you then factor in the superb tracking app that comes with every Motiv Ring purchase, this could be the product to breathe new life into the fitness tracker market.

Tough to the touch

The Beoplay M5 wireless speaker is the latest creation from the manufacturer, and while the £530/\$600 price may still make your wallet wince, the tech packed into its tiny frame is pretty fantastic. A lot of comparisons have been made between the M5 and Sonos' top-of-the-line Play:5 speaker, and while there are plenty of similarities, the M5 does manage to carve out its own niche.

Firstly, the M5 offers a vast array of ways to wirelessly connect to your music. There's everything here from Chromecast support to Spotify Connect and everything in between, and thanks to its tuned wireless drivers, connecting and streaming takes all but a few seconds to complete. We should mention at this point, a big difference between both the M5 and Play:5 is that Beoplay's offering doesn't require a specified app to work, where the Play:5 requires you to get hands-on with Sonos' official app.

It's other standout feature is its 360-degree sound, which is built using three evenly-placed tweeters around the circumference of the M5, and when twinned with the powerful sound drivers within, you'll get a rich, loud and bassheavy audio experience. There's even multiroom support, so multiple units of the M5 can be placed around your home, giving you room-filling sound no matter where you are. Don't be deceived by its tiny frame, however, the Beoplay M5 is an impressive piece of audio tech.

The BeoLab 90 is a £60,000 speaker that oozes class, and in many ways, the much smaller M5 takes its lead from it. The M5's True360 sound system originates from the BeoLab 90, with 18 individual drivers placed around each panel of the speaker. These are then tuned to work with 14 different beam channels, which help give the impression of projecting the audio in different directions. What's remarkably clever about this system, is that it recognises when the sound may be impacted by walls and furniture, automatically altering the audio to suit the requirements from your room. The M5 offers this tech on a much, much smaller scale. Instead of 18 drivers, it uses tuned tweeters to increase the bass output from the speaker, individually placed around the circumference of the M5 to deliver room-filling sound. It then mimics the power of the BeoLab 90 by offering immediate multi-room support, compensating power for richer sounds.

Shoot the night with the Pentax KP's insane ISO


In digital photography, there are three principles for exposure – aperture, shutter speed and ISO. The ISO rating indicates how sensitive a camera's sensor is to light – the higher the number, the more sensitive, and the better positioned it is to capture images in extreme low light.

Most cameras start at a base of ISO 100 or 200, topping out at around ISO 12,800. That's not the case for the Pentax KP, which is making headlines with its incredible top native speed of ISO 819,200 - in other words, more than 60 times more sensitive than ISO 12,800.

You may hear of other cameras, such as the Nikon D5, which have even higher expanded ISO ratings - but when the ISO rating is 'expanded', it means that sensitivity reaches the sensor's top capability, and is then pushed by the camera's software, generally resulting in lower quality.

Higher ISO speeds also mean that you can shoot at faster shutter speeds to get your shot - spectacular news for shooting handheld without a tripod to steady the camera. If you like shooting star trails at night, or other low light photography (such as indoor subjects like gigs), then it's the ideal camera - but avoid high ISOs in bright light as it will lead to overexposed images.

If this sounds fantastic – there are downsides. Higher ISOs usually equate to more image 'noise' – the grainy dots that take away detail in your images – Pentax claims its new generation sensor combined with a Prime IV imaging engine helps to compensate for that, but you shouldn't expect any miracles.

Audeze's iSine20 headphones may look strange, but they also set a new benchmark

It's a surprisingly tough task to find a pair of headphones that cater for every need. Some demand the comfort that in-ear offerings bring, while others want the sound quality achieved by a pair of over-ear cans. But what if we told you that you can actually get both of these, and more, in a single headset? Audeze's new iSine20 range are looking to change the way in-ear headphones are perceived. Despite weighing just 20 grams, they include some of the best audio gear that are normally found in over-ear headphones. At the earphones' core is their magnetic planar technology, which is used to pulsate sweet sounding tunes through your ears. This is done through a small, metal plate in each earbud, which bounces off between a layer of magnets to get the right sounds delivered at the right times, all depending on the type of track you're listening to.

We should mention the rather peculiar design used here, but there's method to the madness. The semi-open design helps minimise the distortion usually caused by using magnets in headphones. For you, this means the iSine20s are going to give you a tailored audio experience every time you use them.

Plus, for iPhone users, there's a specially-designed cable that works in tandem with these in-ear marvels and plugs directly into your Lightning port. The Cipher cable has an in-line DAC that optimises audio from your iPhone up to a staggering 24-bit, which is said to be up to five times better than the normal audio quality achieved through the 3.5mm audio jack. If you're a series audio lover, can you really afford to be without these?

The power of magnets

A thin layer sits in each earbud, which moves back and forth to produce the sound waves that then go into your ear. In tech terms, this is known as a planar magnetic diaphragm



PURE POWER AT A COST

Chillblast brings out the big guns

British manufacturer Chillblast has made something of a name for itself in recent years. It is now feared and respected in equal measure by rivals and potential consumers alike. The company has built a reputation off of constructing and selling custom high-end hardware, designed to appeal specifically to the hardcore gamer. Its no-thrills approach to design means what you're getting here is raw power and pure performance, with a chunky price tag to match.

The Messiah 1080 proves that portability doesn't automatically mean a sacrifice in

performance, making it one of the most powerful mobile and capable gaming devices put out for purchase. The CPU is a souped-up quad-core Intel i7-7700, with graphical output bolstered by an Nvidia GeForce GTX 1080 8GB. The result is a laptop that is more than capable of handling the most power hungry games – from Doom, to GTA V to Halo Wars 2 – on higher settings with little impact to frame-rate or detail.

Thanks to the addition of three 3.0 USB ports, the Messiah is also fully equipped to deal with the virtual reality revolution, while

the addition of a Thunderbolt 3.0 port leaves it equipped to deal with extremely fast data transfer – should the included 1TB SSHD Seagate hybrid drive fail you.

All things considered, Chillblast's Messiah is unique in that it brings the desktop gaming package to a device that can be taken on the road, although as we mentioned before, that comes at a price. With the price starting at £2,500, escalating as you upgrade, it's only for the most hardcore of gamers, but it's difficult to find fault with the quality you're receiving for the money.



GORGEOUS GAMING ON THE GO

Alienware's laptop will break benchmarks

Extravagant, powerful and expensive; Alienware is no stranger to benchmark-breaking gaming laptops. The Alienware 13 R3 model is absolutely no exception. The company does, of course, have a right to boast about its latest release – its first 13-inch model to feature a quad-core Intel HQ-series processor. It's a huge improvement over anything we've seen from Alienware thus far, putting the dual-core U-series processors to shame; the two extra cores ensuring faster video rendering and smoother performance on the latest releases.

Combine this with the integrated Nvidia GTX 1060 and the sumptuous OLED display (boasting a refresh rate of one millisecond, far superior to Razer Blade's IGZO display) and you've got one hell of a powerhouse that is able to hold its own versus some of the larger notebooks on the market. The design is sleek yet, unsurprisingly, bulky; everything about Alienware 13 screams power and performance. On Ultra settings you should expect to see games (such as Gears Of War 4 and Titanfall 2) running beautifully, albeit often restricted to a stable 30 frames-per

second — that is, of course, the trade-off you'd expect to see when opting for a smaller, travel-sized gaming laptop.

Alienware has, once again, delivered, but that isn't to say the 13 R3 is a perfect gaming laptop. You'd be hard pressed to venture too far from a power socket, given the relatively small battery life – pushing four hours at an absolute maximum.

Given the bulky size and undependable lifespan, some may figure the massive price tag to be a touch too much, but that's the cost of gorgeous gaming on the go.



A TRULY PORTABLE DESKTOP PC

The versatile virtuoso of our test

HP's Omen line of gaming laptops has never been particularly affordable, but it has provided impressive, powerful devices – that hasn't changed with the Omen 17. While some competitor machines can look like rejects from a SyFy channel production, the Omen is (for better or worse) wholly conservative in its design. Considering the size of the screen and the components shelled inside of the plastic body, this laptop is relatively light and surprisingly quiet – though some may take umbrage with the build quality.

An imprecise multi-touch trackpad will be a turn off for some — as will the tacky looking metallic hinges — but the Omen makes games look and run so incredibly well that this should be an easy oversight to make. While the Omen 17 comes equipped with a 4K, G-Sync enabled display, locking this laptop's resolution down to 1080p is where it really shines; smooth frame-rates and stunning detail from an array of high-performance games, such as Grand Theft Auto V and Halo Wars 2. This laptop is, however, also perfectly equipped to run 4K gaming and VR

(Oculus Rift), although you should expect to see FPS to take a small hit on this front.

There is absolutely no denying HP's Omen 17 is a powerful device, one that is focused wholly on performance. It feels closer to a traditional desktop experience than any of the other gaming laptops listed here, though the plastic-feeling chassis, unspectacular keyboard and frustrating trackpad is more than a little frustrating when you think it costs more than either the Alienware 13 or Razer Blade. Then again, you are paying for power here, not a fashion statement.



CHALLENGING THE MACBOOK PRO

Razer packs power into a sleek package

Gaming hardware specialist Razer has established its platform by chasing a certain type of gamer: the hardcore, competitive enthusiast. The latest overhaul to the Razer Blade, sees the flexibility of an Ultrabook meet the power offered by desktop graphics – and the result is impressive, to say the least.

The Razer Blade is essentially Windows' answer to Apple's MacBook Pro, a versatile and powerful new Ultrabook that offers sublime graphical output, an impressive battery life, and a beautiful, customisable Chroma keyboard. Despite the small size of

the device – with a screen of just 14 inches and a light chassis – it's comfortable and easy to use, be it on your desk or in your lap.

The Razer Blade is more than capable at handling itself with recent releases, with shooters such Overwatch and Titanfall 2 holding a respectably solid 60-plus frames per second on high-quality settings and a full HD resolution configuration. The impressive Intel Core i7 Quad Core processor also ensures that this device is more than capable of handling heavy duty multitasking, not to mention will handle photo and editing

software without a problem – should you be interesting in taking your gaming onto Twitch or YouTube.

The Razer Blade isn't just one of the most powerful device in this group test, but it is also most versatile. It's a lightweight, portable device that is designed to do it all – from playing your favourite games (albeit maybe not at the highest settings imaginable) to supporting your fledging content creation career. There's a lot to love about the Razer Blade, and that's why it should be on every gamer's radar.

hen it comes to unfulfilled ambitions, learning to play an instrument tends to be up there with writing a novel or mastering a foreign language. How many of us have strummed along on air quitar to an Eric Clapton riff or snapped a pencil as we launched into a mock drum solo on the nearest hard surface?

Yet, for most of us, playing music never made it much past dabbling with a recorder at school. Pricey lessons, a general lack of time, and good old-fashioned procrastination conspired to keep those rock-and-roll daydreams from ever getting out of our parents' garage. But help is now at hand.

There's a growing amount of pretty awesome tech out there aimed at making those musical aspirations finally become a reality. Just connect them to your smart device or computer and get ready to finally start playing like you always knew you could.

TICKLING THE IVORIES

Do you fancy yourself as the new Elton John? Then dust off your star-shaped glasses and take a gander at the One Smart Piano.

Designed to look just like an ordinary piano, and made especially for beginners, the firstever Apple MFi Certified smart piano works with an app to teach budding Liberaces of all ages and skill levels how to play by using LED-guided keys with interactive sheet music and video lessons. With more than 2,000 piece of music stored in the free app, there's a huge amount of tunes to dabble with. It's been named 'Best Teaching Tool For Beginning Students' by the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM), and counts Chinese concert pianist Lang Lang among its investors.

Ariel Liu, Head Of International Growth at One Smart Piano, tells us, "With easy-to-follow LED light up keys and well-designed learning features in the free app, beginners can learn to play easy songs such as Happy Birthday in two hours, and experienced players can pick up a new song much faster. You can also choose to learn in your preferred method - such as with interactive games - and record to share with friends."

Another piano-themed gadget is the PianoMaestro. More affordable than some of its competitors, this is essentially a strip of lights that fits onto you existing piano keyboard. The trade off here is that it's more basic when compared to its stablemates.

Inventor Ken Ihara claims that the PianoMaestro removes the frustration experienced by some beginners of not being able to read music, by showing them when and where to press the keys. "If you are just starting out, I would recommend getting a few private piano lessons," he savs.

LEARN WITH YOUR COMPUTER

Of course, if you already own to read guitar tabs and an instrument then there are computer programmes and apps out there that will show you the ropes. One of the most popular is eMedia Guitar Method.

It features lessons from University Of Colorado-Boulder's Kevin Garry, PhD, and over 180 lessons to take you from basic exercises, such as how to tune a guitar and play simple chords, to fingerpicking, how music notation.

Integrated guitar software tools include an automatic guitar tuner, chord chart/ dictionary, fingering charts, and metronome.

"Think of it as a creative toolkit that adapts to you," Jacob Gordon, cofounder of Artiphon, tells us. "We're seen a really strong reception from such a broad range of people, young and old, beginner and professionals. Amateurs love how it lets them explore, experiment, and invent in flexible and intuitive ways.

"More advanced music makers love that it connects to their existing gear and enables things they couldn't do before," Gordon continues. "We're also pushing updates to the iOS app, desktop software, and the INSTRUMENT 1 firmware on a regular basis. This means we can add new features and refine the usability ongoing, which is one of the advantages of a connected device."

THE SMART STRUMMER

What's more, it can be used with hundreds of MIDI apps and DAWs which its maker says that it gives you the creative freedom to play guitar with any sound. Using apps like GarageBand, you can also experiment building and recording an entire song, from drums and keys to guitar and bass.

It can also be integrated with the FourChords Guitar Karaoke app, which allows you to learn thousands of popular songs. Senior Producer Matt Cannon says, "It differs from other learning methods because it comes with interactive lesson apps that will teach you how to play with real-time feedback. It's just a matter of matching in-app cues and following along with the interactive lessons."

Cannon says the advantages of learning with his machine include not having to worry

about your friends taking the Mickey out of you when you hit a bum note.

"We will never tell anyone that they shouldn't learn the traditional way with a full-sized guitar and an instructor," Cannon continues. "In fact, most of our staff learned the traditional way!

"However, the Jamstik+ has some huge advantages, and the skills you learn with it will translate directly to a full-sized guitar. "For example, it's portable and backpack-friendly, so you can take it with you anywhere and practice whenever you have some down time. The other nice thing about the Jamstik+ is the privacy it enables. It can be discouraging to play the wrong notes for all to hear, but with the Jamstik+ you can just plug headphones into your device and practice in private!"

Cannon adds, "The Jamstik+ has been very well received by both the tech and music industries, as well as by educators, beginners, and pros alike. Educators love using it as a tool in their classroom, and beginners love that it's truly interactive, allowing them to take lessons at their own pace in an engaging way.

"On the other hand, professional musicians and guitarists find it convenient and useful for travelling and recording music digitally. MIDI has long been the realm of keyboardists, and now the Jamstik+ gives guitarists another creative music production tool."

house? Or perhaps you were too worried about the reaction of the neighbours or felt it may finally give your spouse those grounds for divorce? Then fear not because there's a virtual drum kit you can get your hands on, and there's no psychotic JK Simmons character from Whiplash around to make your hands bleed if you can't keep up.

Described as 'the best drum kit you've never seen', according to its maker, Aerodrums use a high-speed camera and reflectors on the drumsticks and your feet to track their motion. Your air drumming gestures then create specific motions that let them determine when you intend to hit a drum, which drum, and at what speed.

Yann Morvan, product developer, tells us: "Aerodrums is great for practicing the drums

at home because the coordination, timing and independence skills translate exactly. Hitting the air is also good for drumstick technique because it improves finger and wrist control, as you cannot rely on rebounds to make notes happen.

"Combining Aerodrums with a practice pad is a great way to learn the drums if you can't have a drum set at home." He added that the firm plan to release a 3D/virtual reality mode in the next few months.

"It will enable people to see the drums as if they were there using virtual reality goggles like Oculus Rift or Gear VR. We also plan to support the augmented reality devices that are coming out like Hololens. This will enable you to make a fully functional drum set appear in your environment."

THE MUSIC TEACHER

Clever technology is all well and good, but what do the professionals think? Can smart technology ever take the place of a human teacher? Or are they best used as a way to dip you to in and practice in between sessions?

Peter Darling is a tutor in composition and song-writing at Leeds College Of Music whose credits include Sky Sports and the BBC Music Video Festival. He says, "Technology can definitely be useful to those first starting learning an instrument or craft; however, as with most skills, you need the motivation and drive to regularly practice it, otherwise it'll end up like most new year's resolutions and be abandoned before February is over!

"This is where a tutor is most effective. I think of it like going to the gym; if you can self motivate, then you might not need a personal trainer, but a personal trainer can push you further than you would have done by yourself, and can help you train in the most efficient and effective way possible to help you achieve your goals."

Casio might be the maker of old-school calculators and classic digital watches, but its modern output has proved to be just as important with a slew of wrist-based timepieces ranging from regular analogue versions to your flash smart variety. The new WSD-F20, the follow-up to the sturdy and reliable WSD-F510, falls into the latter camp and has been designed to give the adventurer of today (or the end of the world survivalist) everything they need in watch form.

The WSD-FS20 shares much of the same physical characteristics as its predecessor, measuring $61.7 \times 56.4 \times 15.7$ mm, but it's noticeably lighter weighing in at only 92 grams. That's certainly still heavy for a watch, but

considering it's been created with a durability standard of MIL-STD-810 (meaning it's been deemed sturdy as a tank by the US's Department Of Defense) we can forgive it a touch of chunkiness.

A lot of that size comes from the impressively vast 1.32-inch, dual-layer LCD touchscreen, complete with a 320 x 320 resolution, that dominates the front of the timepiece. Still, this is the biggest selling point of the device thanks to its ability to display maps in full colour on its face (although you can switch between colour and monochrome mode to conserve battery life). Said full colour maps can also be downloaded offline.

The WSD-FS20 is a definite upgrade from the FS10, thanks in part to the inclusion of GPS. A given considering this is being aimed at the adventurer in us all, the GPS functionality uses Glonass and Michibiki satellites for extra accuracy (without becoming the main drain on the battery). There's even a Moment Link function that shows where your friends are in the world via text, and Location Memory that enables you to leave a digital breadcrumb trail by systematically hitting one of the buttons on its side.

Talking of battery, it's hard not to address the biggest problem holding the WSD-F20 from being a truly all-powerful rugged watch – its limited battery life. Even with a low-power form of GPS, that huge touchscreen and its Android Wear functionality means you will only get a day's worth of use out of it at best.

Once upon a time, iTunes was revolutionary.



And it was, the iTunes Music Store – as it was then known – changed the way we buy and listen to music. However, in the 14 years since then, the desktop app has become a bloated mess, with an overwhelming number of features – movies, television shows, podcasts, apps and most recently a streaming service – crammed into it. This has turned iTunes in a space-suck with storage requirements that go far beyond the size of the files its hosts, which in turn helps make it slow to use, and – the ultimate crime for an Apple product – ugly to look it and difficult to use.

Despite users complaining about this for years now, Apple seems to have given up on iTunes. So it's about time we did the same thing. If you want to get rid of iTunes, but still have personal entertainment options own your iPhone and iPad, try one of these options.




O3 Apple is not the only fruit


The 'walt-ernative' library manager

If you do already have a have a large library on your computer, it doesn't make sense to spend on streaming. Instead replace iTunes with a library manager like WALTR 2. Available for both Windows and macOS, just drag and drop your media files onto WALTR 2 on your desktop, and it will wirelessly transfer the titles into your iPhone's core iOS library in a flash.

STOP ITUNES FROM OPENING AUTOMATICALLY

You can choose to stop using iTunes as your default way of managing your media, but if you tend to charge your iPhone, iPad or iPod by plugging it into your computer, iTunes will still automatically open every time you do. However, next time you plug your device into your computer and iTunes opens, click the device icon that appears just below the Play button. This will then display the 'Summary' tab, which will give you an overview of your device as well as list several options. Uncheck the tickbox next to 'Automatically sync when this iPhone/iPad/iPod is connected' in the listed options, then press the Apply button at the bottom of the screen.





5 Cheaper transfer options
WALTR 2 is very impressive: it transfers music files (including hi-res audio), videos (up to 2160p 4K), iBooks as well as PDFs to your iPhone and they all appear in the right app. But WALTR 2 also costs £32/\$40. If that's too much, CopyTrans Manager offers just music transfer from desktop to iOS for £25/\$20.

06 Change media player

If you don't like the default Music or Video apps on your iPhone any more than you do iTunes on desktop, try a local media player. Instead of writing to your core iOS library like WALT 2, a media player stores your files in their own app, VLC For Mobile and Plex are both great options, allowing you to micromanage your files and stream them across multiples devices.









RESTORE FADED FAMILY PHOTOS


Make vintage photos look as good as the day they were taken

Our family photos offer a physical link to the past. These pictures allow us to put faces to names as well as view older relatives in a new light. But while future generations will be able to find drunken photos of ourselves with a simple search of Facebook, the physical prints we're currently inheriting are prone to have been damaged as they were passed down through the ages. Fortunately, we have the technology to rebuild them. Thanks to the magic of software such as Photoshop, we can restore photos that have naturally faded or have been scratched or torn. Obviously the end result won't have the high resolution of modern digital photos, but they will at least look the same or better than the day they were first taken.

The majority of these vintage photo fixes can be done with the Patch tool in Photoshop, but for the best results we suggest using a combination of tools as shown in this tutorial. Some of these tips can be done quickly and with ease whilst other require a bit more attention to detail and patience but with some trial and error you can get those photos looking good.







Colour correcting
A photo that has a tint can be corrected easily. If the image is monochromatic, go to 'Image' then 'Adjustments' to 'Black & White'; for colour images go to 'Image' then 'Adjustments' to 'Colour Balance' and from there move the sliders away from the offending colour to counter it.



Q2 Adjust contrast

An image's contrast is very simple to adjust, go to Image then over to Brightness/Contrast and move the slider left and right to the level that you want. There is also an Auto-Adjustment function that can do this for you.



HOW TO PRESERVE YOUR OLD PHOTOS


1 Maintain their temperature Avoid attics or anywhere else that the temperature will change constantly. Keep all photos in a cool, dry place as this slows down the rate of decay.

Q2 Frame them properly
If you are going to frame old photos,
make sure it has UV conservation glass and keep
them away from direct sunlight.

Q3 Pack them correctly
Use a container made from board or an envelope that's acid free or isn't buffered. It should also be a similar size so the photos can't move around whilst inside.

Q4 Use safe photo albums

Avoid over-stuffing your photo
albums, and you should use paper or envelopes
that are acid-free or with plastic films, such as
polyester or polypropylene.






Adjust the exposure


Altering the exposure of the image will affect the lightness or darkness of image, affecting the shadows, highlights, mid-tones etc.. Go to 'Picture' to 'Shadows/Highlights' and adjust the levels. If one area is particularly bright create a new layer and paint black with a soft-edged brush on a low opacity.



Remove Creases or folds
Select the Patch tool and use it along the crease a small section at a time. For any areas that are have a pattern or when it changes from one piece of clothing to another use the Clone Stamp tool. A crease that is on the background or low-detailed area can easily be mended using the Spot Healing Brush tool.



O5 Get rid of dust and scratches
Create a new layer and go to 'Filter' then 'Noise' and to 'Dust & Scratches' then make adjustments where necessary. This filter can blur objects so to correct this, use the Quick Selection tool around the subject and then a layer mask to reveal the original subject underneath. Any other spots can be corrected with the spot healing brush or Patch tool.





Repair any damage
Duplicate the original layer and use the Polygonal Marquee tool to select around a rip. Go to 'Edit' to 'Fill' then over to 'Contents' and select 'Content Aware'. If this doesn't work correctly adjust the selection. The Clone Stamp tool copies pixels from one area and applies them to another, this works well for backgrounds.



Android 7.0 is Google's big refresh of its phone and tablet operating system. Also known as Android Nougat (Google has a sweet tooth – previous updates include Lollipop and Marshmallow), this update is feature packed with multi-screen support, smarter battery management and even virtual reality built-in. However, despite launching last August, many Android users still haven't had the Nougat update. This is due to delays by manufacturers and even phone carriers, who have to check Google's complex updates are compatible with their devices. But last month Android 7.0 finally crossed the 1 per cent adoption rate, so let's celebrate with this guide to its best features


Direct reply notifications
Apps such as Facebook Messenger

Smarter settingsNougat has added a quick settings menu at the top of the screen. Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, Airplane Mode and more can all be turned on and off just by sliding a finger down from the top of the screen and tapping on the appropriate icon. Slide down again to access the settings for these options. What appears on the quick setting menu can be changed by pressing the edit button, holding on an the icon and dragging it up.

Changes to interface The size of font and app icons can be changed in the settings, which you can find under 'Display', and in the wallpaper settings lock screens get their own wallpaper instead of having to use the same one as the home screen, much like iOS.


Save your data By going to 'Mobile Data' and clicking on 'More Settings' you can access the 'Data Saver' feature. This restricts the amount of mobile data used by apps in the foreground as well as the background. We'll use Twitter as an example, with data saver on it wont update your feed in the background and when you load it, it may only load the feed, it won't load images unless you tap on them.

5 Get a better battery Introduced with Marshmallow, Doze is a power-saving feature that puts the device into sleep when it isn't being used, but originally it would only start if the phone wasn't moving. With Nougat, Doze has been improved to keep any power usage by apps to a minimum even when on the move. Just go to the battery

options in Settings to activate it. Sony devices seem to lack this and instead has STRAMINA mode, this can be left on at all times or only when battery level reached 15 per cent.



Bundled notifications Instead of having multiple notifications from the same app they are now all displayed in one 'big' notification that can be expanded by pressing the tab and dragging down. For example, emails will be kept in one tab and when pulled down each email gets its own tab.

After a number of successful arcade titles, in 1983 Nintendo launched the 'Family Computer', or, as it was later dubbed, the Famicom. We know it in the West in a redesigned form: the Nintendo Entertainment System. The original console was designed to be as cheap and convenient as possible, which led to decisions such as wiring the controllers directly to the console and making the cartridges the size of cassette tapes. The Famicom went on to sell over 19 million units and had a number of peripherals such as a Modem, 3D Glasses and the Famicom Disk system that used floppy disks for its games. Many of the console's games are played today on current Nintendo platforms such as Nintendo's Virtual Console or its Nintendo Classic Mini range.

Firstly, you will need to find a 'step down' power supply as the voltage will be different, and the Famicom outputs through RF signal which won't work on a PAL TVs. You could send the console to someone who can modify it but this could add a lot to the overall cost. If you don't want to go through that legwork, an easier option is to import the Nintendo Classic Mini: Famicom, a miniature version of the Famicom with 30 games built-in. This has HDMI output and is powered by USB so there should be no issue with region differences.


