

# **Shape right shoulder**

# knitwise

This chart features grey boxes, which represent 'no stitch'. This is because of shaping that has yet to be worked. By placing these squares on the chart, it keeps the chart in a neat grid and means you can see where the rest of the stitches sit in relation to each other.

- ☐ Next row: k to end
- ☐ Next row: p to end working wraps tog with st Leave sts on holder

# **Shape left neck**

Using 3.5mm straight needles, cast on 137 (156, 175, 175) sts

NOTE: if you have too many sts for straight needles, use circular needle and work back and forth in rows

☐ K eight rows

Commence Lace patt using Chart or written instructions as folls:



- end. 30 sts
- □ Row 46: p
- ☐ Row 47: (k1, k2tog) to end. 20 sts
- ☐ Row 48: p
- $\square$  Row 49: (k2tog) to end. Ten sts
- ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

- $\square$  Row 6: (k2, kfb) to end. 40 sts
- □ Row 7: p
- $\square$  Row 8: (k3, kfb) to end. 50 sts
- $\square$  Rows 9-17: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Row 18: k10, (k2tog, k1) ten
- times, k10. 40 sts  $\square$  Rows 19-29: beg with a p row,
- work in st st  $\square$  Row 30: (k2tog) to end. 20 sts
- $\square$  Row 32: (k2tog) to end. Ten sts
- ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

## **HEAD**

Using 3.5mm needles and yarn A, cast on ten sts

- ☐ Work as Body to \*\*
- $\square$  Rows 6-26: beg with a p row, work in st st
- $\square$  Row 27: (k1, k2tog) to last st, k1. 27 sts
- ☐ Row 28: p
- ☐ Row 29: (k1, k2tog) to end. 18 sts
- ☐ Cast off

#### **ARMS** (make two)

Using 3.5mm needles and yarn A, cast on 20 sts

- ☐ Beg with a p row, work 35 rows
- ☐ Row 36: (k3. k2tog) to end. 16 sts

- $\square$  Rows 37-47: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Cast off

#### **LEGS** (make two)

Using 3.5mm needles and yarn A, cast on 22 sts

- $\square$  Beg with a p row, work 33 rows
- ☐ Row 34: k2, (k2tog, k2) to end 17 sts
- $\square$  Rows 35-41: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Cast off

#### **INNER EYES** (alike)

Using 2.75mm needles and oddments of medium brown DK, cast on 14 sts

- ☐ Row 1: p
- ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off Sew sides together to make circle, attach bead in centre

#### **EYE STRIPS** (alike)

Using 2.75mm needles and oddments of Medium Brown DK, cast on five sts

- ☐ Beg with a k row, work ten rows in st st
- ☐ Cast off

## **NOSE**

Using 2.75mm needles and oddments of Dark Brown DK, cast on 16 sts

- ☐ Beg with a p row, work three rows in st st
- ☐ Next row: (k2tog) to end. Eight sts
- ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **CLAWS** (make 12)

Using 2.75mm needles and oddments of Medium Brown DK, cast on eight sts

- ☐ Rows 1-3: beg with a p row, work
- ☐ Row 4: k1, k2tog, k2, k2tog,
- k1. Six sts
- ☐ Row 5: p

Most sections of the chart use the intarsia method, where you use a smaller bobbin of yarn for each colour section on the row. Give the two strands a twist when changing colour to avoid a hole. Where the colour changes after just a few stitches, you can carry the yarn across the back of the work, but keep the tension even. If it's too loose it'll look untidy, but pull it too tight and you'll get puckers in the fabric.

urn your child's bedroom into a magical land with this fun and sparkly cushion. The castle motif is worked using a combination of stranding and block colourwork – see our Knitwise panel to learn the difference between the techniques. Only one ball of each colour is needed, so why not make another in more unisex colourways?

# Start knitting here...

#### FRONT

Using 4mm needles and yarn G, cast on 90 sts

- ☐ Beg with a k (RS) row and reading RS rows from right to left and WS rows from left to right, work from Chart until Chart is complete
- ☐ Cast off

#### **LOWER BACK**

Using 4mm needles and yarn F, cast on 90 sts

 $\square$  Beg with a k row, work 56 rows in st st \*\*

- Change to yarn A
- $\square$  Next row (RS): (k2, p2) to last two sts, k2
- $\square$  Next row (WS): (p2, k2) to last two sts, p2
- Last two rows set rib
- ☐ Work ten more rows in rib☐ Cast off in rib

#### **UPPER BACK**

- $\square$  Work as for Lower Back to \*\* Change to yarn A
- ☐ Work four rows in rib as for Lower Back
- ☐ Next row (buttonhole): rib 24,

  \* cast off next two sts in rib, rib 20

including st used in cast-off, rep from \* to end

- ☐ Next row: rib to end, casting on two sts over each cast-off gap
- ☐ Work six more rows in rib
- ☐ Cast off in rib

#### **TO MAKE UP**

Weave in loose ends. Align cast-on edges of Lower Back and Front and sew side and bottom seam. Stitch Upper Back in place, overlapping Lower Back. Attach buttons to correspond with buttonholes. Insert cushion pad and fasten **LK**

"Knitting garments for babies is a lot quicker than knitting for adults which is a blessing for an impatient knitter like me. I love how garments always look adorable in small sizes, and animals just seem to make everything a little cuter.

# **PURLS OF WISDOM**

# Vintage Problems

"How thin were people in the 1940s?" demanded a tearful voice on the other end of the phone, which I had just picked up. No greeting.

"These aren't the kind of cold calls I'm used to," I said, blinking. "It's me"

I then knew the exact identity of the friend who's too upset to say hello – and the answer to the question. "No, it's rationing. All the butter and biscuits and things were rationed during the war. It was basically like Slimming World, but everyone was on it at once. Why?"

I could hear muffled swearing at the other end, so I took control of the conversation. "Is this a knitting thing?" "YFS."

"Come round to mine, have a cup of tea and tell me about it," I said firmly.

An hour later she was sitting sniffling on my sofa, clutching the

offending article, and the whole sorry tale came out.

This was the story of a smart modern woman who had become enamoured with 40's fashion and style after watching a couple of episodes of Agent Carter. Googling knitting patterns from the era, she came across a cute Fair Isle sweater



pattern that was just so 1942. She threw a tape measure around herself, found which size she thought would fit her – so far so good.

Then she ran into trouble with the yarn. The original yarn for that pattern had been discontinued long before, the yarn company no longer traded and she was forced to try and fudge it by finding something similar in a modern yarn - which turned out to be thicker. What she ended up with was overly tight, stiff and inflexible. Despairing at the hours of her life which she had lovingly poured into perfecting the complicated yoke, she did the grown up thing - burst into tears and phoned a friend.

"WHATEVER PROBLEM A KNITTER ENCOUNTERS, SOMEONE ELSE ON THE INTERNET HAS ENCOUNTERED IT FIRST." "I can't bear to rip it back," she sobbed into a half-eaten pink wafer biscuit. "It's taken too much of my life to make."

I understood this completely.
So, in the end, after several more pink wafer biscuits, another cup of tea and the breaking out of the emergency Dairy Milk I keep hidden from everyone else (for such is my commitment to friendship), we finally decided to make it into a cushion instead. By that time the sobs had calmed somewhat.

"Are you feeling better now?" I asked, and she nodded.

"Next time Google yarn substitutes," I ordered. "For whatever problem a knitter encounters, someone else on the internet has encountered it first."

Later, as she skipped out of the house clutching her new cushion, I reflected on the wonder of shared knowledge, the joy of repurposing and the fact that if I ate fewer biscuits, I might have been thin enough to wear that iumper.

Cut two cardboard rings and hold them together. Cut lengths of yarn and wrap them around the outside of the ring until the centre hole is filled. Insert sharp scissors between the card and snip the wrapped strands. Thread a longer length of yarn between the rings and tie tightly to secure your pompom. Remove the rings and trim any untidy strands. Leave the long strand for sewing your pompoms together.



# Start knitting here...

**SWISS ROLL** 

NOTE: stitch counts for Swiss roll slice are shown in brackets

#### **SPONGE**

Using 3.5mm straight needles and yarn A, cast on 28 (7) sts

- ☐ Row 1 (RS): k each st tbl

- ☐ Rep Row 2 until work meas 20cm

- ☐ Using yarn B, work as for Sponge until work meas 14cm

# crochetelever

The loop for the scissors keeper is worked using a crochet chain. To do this, first make a slipknot and place it on your crochet hook. Don't pull it too tightly as you need it to slide on your hook. Wrap the yarn around the hook from back to front, then pull this strand through the loop on your hook. You have just made one chain stitch. Keep doing this until your chain measures 34cm. Then cut the yarn and pull it through the loop on your hook to fasten off.

When stranding the colours, try not to pull the floats too tightly. As you knit, use your index finger to stretch out the work and even out your stitches. After the tail has been completely knitted, insert a pencil into the tail and press it around to smooth out the stitches.





☐ Fasten off

Using two yarn ends, sew back and forth through beak to make it stronger. Weave in ends **LK**

# Knitted home with ERIKA KNIGHT

Top designer **Erika** shares her home style secrets

his colourful cushion is a little parody on the ubiquitous colour wheel found in every colour theory book and art school lecture. I started out as a student of Fine Art and was always fascinated by the theory behind how colours work and how to employ this knowledge in practice, to stimulate a very emotional response from the viewer. Of course colour is a very personal and individual concept and inextricably linked to our mood and memories so it is impossible to be prescriptive. But that is the best thing about making something by hand - you can adapt and modify your project to suit your own taste from beginning to end. This round cushion is worked in stocking stitch in a linen-cotton yarn and designed using eight colours to mimic the colour wheel, but you may wish to use tones of the same colour to fit your own style or home décor. I chose a linen-cotton yarn for the clear stitch definition which gives a neat finish, but this would also be a great way to use up oddments that you might have in your stash from a long finished Fair Isle or colourwork project. This pattern uses 'short row shaping' which is a seam-free way of shaping your knitting to create curved wedges of colour without hard edged 'steps'. The very simple and clever technique works beautifully to create a swirl of colour. Colour theory, a new knitting technique and a stylish cushion - that's multi-tasking at its very best!"



# TIPS, SHORT-CUTS AND MORE!



Hi there! This month we discuss colourwork and the ins-and-outs

This is a type of colourwork where blocks of colour are used to create motifs, from something as simple as spots to entire picture knits Each section of colour must be worked with a differen bobbin of yarn, which can make the technique a little fiddly, although the end result is worth it. To avoid getting your bobbins in a tangle, it helps to work at a table or desk. Some of the most colourful and extravagant knits ever designed use the intarsia technique - just look at the work of Kaffe Fassett!

### **Ask Martine**

Is blocking my knitting really necessary?

Blocking, for me, is one of the least fun parts of the knitting process

(with the exception of weaving in ends, obviously!) But in many cases, it's important.

Some knitters insist on blocking everything, whereas some only block the projects that need it. I fall into the latter category, but I have quite specific rules on what I do and do not block. You can find out more about the actual process of blocking (essentially, stretching and shaping your knits) on page 93.

It's essential that lace shawls are blocked, preferably using blocking wires. Knit Picks' blocking wires and pins are recommended. The beauty of a lace shawl is only revealed after blocking. In fact, any knitted lace item should be blocked for this reason. Fair Isle knitting also benefits greatly from blocking. The process can fix uneven tension, and if you are using wool, you'll find it blooms when dry, giving a nicer overall look.

Blocking sweaters is not always necessary - it's a personal choice and depends on the pattern. If you are going to block garments don't forget to block your gauge swatch. Otherwise, you could be in for a nasty surprise with your garment sizing! You might choose to block garments in sections before joining everything up.

I never block socks. They are washed so frequently and end up shaping to your foot. That's sufficient blocking for me.

When you are making a decision about whether to block your knitting, consider the yarn you are using. Natural

fibres such as wool and cotton tend to benefit from blocking more than acrylic.

### TRY NEW TECHNIQUES WITH LYNNE ROWE'S FAB FELINE ACCESSORY



Adrienne Chandler shows you how...

This adorable purse is a fun and fabulous make and uses basic shaping techniques and an easy textured pattern. All you need to know is how to knit, purl and cast-off, then I'll show you how to do the rest.

### Start knitting here...

FRONT AND BACK (make two)

Make a slipknot and place it on a 3.5mm needle. Now cast on 22 more stitches, giving you 23 stitches in total

Find out how to make a slipknot and cast on over on page 94.

☐ Row 1 (RS): (k1, p1) in first st, (k next st, p next st) to last two sts, k1, (p1, k1) in last st. 25 sts

Here you are working twice into the same stitch. To do it, knit the first stitch as normal but keep it on the right needle, move the yarn to the front of the work between the tips of the needles, then purl the same stitch.



At the end of this row, purl the stitch first, then move the varn to the back of the work between the needles so you can knit into the same stitch.

☐ Row 2: (k1, p1) to last st, k1  $\square$  Row 3: cast on two sts, (k1, p1) to last

st, k1. 27 sts

To cast-on at the beginning of a row, it's best to use the cable cast-on method.

Step 1: insert the right needle between the first two stitches on the left needle, wrap the yarn around the needle and pull the loop through.



Step 2: place this loop on the end of the left needle.



Repeat Steps 1-2, counting your newest stitch as the first stitch on the left needle. Then work to the end of the row as instructed.

# P2TOG

This decreases by one stitch. To do it, insert the right needle through the next two stitches on the left needle as if to purl, as shown. Wrap the yarn around the right needle tip and pull it through both stitches, letting them both drop from the left needle.



☐ Row 40: p2tog, (k1, p1) to end. 49 sts ☐ Rows 41-42: (p1, k1) to last st, p1 ☐ Row 43: k2tog, (p1, k1) to last st, p1. 48 sts

This is similar to a p2tog and also decreases by one stitch. Insert the right needle into the next two stitches as shown, wrap the yarn around the needle and pull it through both stitches. Let both the original stitches drop from the left needle.



- ☐ Row 44: k2tog, (p1, k1) to end. 47 sts ☐ Rows 45-46: (k1, p1) to last st, k1 ☐ Rows 47-54: rep Rows 39-46. 43 sts



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




### **EARS** (make two)

### Thread 28 beads onto your yarn

Thread a sewing needle with a short length of sewing cotton and knot it to make a loop. Place the end of your yarn through this loop and fold the end over. Now, slide your beads onto the end of the sewing needle and push them right down onto your yarn.



### Using 3.5mm needles, cast on 34 sts ☐ Row 1: k2, (pb, k1) seven times, k to end

The abbreviation 'pb' means 'place bead'. Bring the yarn to the front of the work between the needle tips then insert the right needle into the next stitch as if to purl and slip it from the left to right needle. Slide the bead up the yarn so it sits against work, then take



the yarn back between the needles, leaving the bead sitting in front of the slipped stitch.

- ☐ Row 2 and all even-numbered rows: p☐ Row 3: k1, skpo, (pb, k1) five times, pb, k2tog, k2, skpo, k11, k2tog k1. 30 sts
- SKPO

This stands for 'slip one, knit one, pass slipped stitch over' and is another way to decrease one stitch. Insert the right needle into the next stitch as if to knit and slip it from the left to right needle, then knit the next stitch as normal. Now use the tip of the left needle to lift that slipped stitch over the knitted stitch and off the right needle.



An skpo leans to the left, whereas a k2tog slants the right, so make sure you use the correct one.

□ Row 5: k1, skpo, (pb, k1) four times, pb,
k2tog, k2, skpo, k9, k2tog, k1. 26 sts
□ Row 7: k1, skpo, (pb, k1) three times, pb,
k2tog, k2, skpo, k7, k2tog, k1. 22 sts
□ Row 9: k1, skpo, (pb, k1) twice, pb, k2tog,
k2, skpo, k5, k2tog, k1. 18 sts

- ☐ Row 11: k1, skpo, pb, k1, pb, k2tog, k2, skpo, k3, k2tog, k1. 14 sts
- ☐ Row 13: k1, skpo, pb, k2tog, k2, skpo, k1, k2tog, k1. Ten sts
- Row 15: k1, (skpo, k2tog) twice, k1. Six sts
- ☐ Row 16: (p3tog) twice. Two sts
  ☐ Cut yarn leaving a 20cm tail for sewing up, thread it through the remaining two sts,

### **TO MAKE UP**

pull tight and fasten off

Place the lining fabric flat and, using the knitted pieces as templates, cut out a shape that is 1cm bigger all around. Place the wrong side of the fabric against the wrong side of each knitted piece and fold the edges of fabric under to create a hem. Pin the lining to the knitting, then using a sewing needle and thread, slip stitch them together using small stitches. Starting at the centre and working out toward edges, use a glue gun to carefully stick the lined pieces to the purse frame. Make sure the lining is on the inside of the purse and glue a little bit at a time as the glue will dry very quickly. Once the frame is fitted, sew the sides of the purse together using mattress stitch. Fold the Ears in half with the beaded side facing out, and sew the seam using the yarn tail. Sew the Ears in position and attach the chain to purse loops **LK**

### TENSION HEADACHE

It's really important to knit a tension square before you begin a project. Not everybody knits the same way – some knit more tightly than others – and this will affect how the stitch pattern looks and the finished size of the item. Tension squares are usually presented like this:

### 22 sts x 30 rows 10cm x 10cm stocking stitch 4mm needles

To knit your tension square, cast on the instructed number of stitches, in this case 22, plus five more. Then, using the needle size and same stitch pattern given, work the instructed number of rows, plus five more. Using a ruler and taking your measurements from the centre of the square, count the number of stitches and number of rows over a 10cm square. If you have more than you should do, it means your knitting is a little tight and you may need to use larger needles. Similarly, if you have fewer stitches and rows, use smaller needles to get the correct tension.

"Using the correct size of needles for the yam weight helps to produce a taut, neat fabric"



### AT A LOOSE END?

Follow these steps for weaving in any tails of yarn:

- 1. Thread the yarn on to a tapestry needle and work with the WS of the project facing upwards.
- 2. Insert the needle under the loop of each stitch, and draw it through. Work it up

and down the loops of the stitches for 8cm. An alternative method is to weave through the back of the stitch, splitting the strand of varn as you sew. 3. Cut the yarn close to the fabric. NOTE: In colourwork, weave the yarn tails into the matching colour section.

### **SUBSTITUTION**

There are many reasons to want to substitute the yarn given in a project, from price to colour selection, but there are some important points to remember.

- Choose a yarn with a similar tension to the suggested yarn. Match the tension given on the ball band of the yarns, as the pattern may use a different stitch. Remember to do a tension square in the new yarn before you begin.
- Consider the fibre content of the yarn and how this might affect the finished project. For example, cotton yarn will knit up very differently to a wool yarn.

- Don't forget to check the care instructions of your new yarn. Not all yarns are machine washable.
- Look at the meterage of the new yarn, rather than the weight of the ball. Not all 50g balls have the same meterage and you don't want to run short when nearing the end of your project.

### ON THE BLOCKS

Blocking is the process of stretching and shaping your finished items to create the correct dimensions from the pattern and even out your stitches. It is also really useful for ensuring that pieces to be joined fit well together. There are a few different ways to achieve this, so check the information on the yarn ball band and pick the most suitable option.

Wet blocking: dampen the pieces so that they are wet through and gently squeeze out the excess water. Lay out the pieces and pin them to the correct measurements, then leave them to dry. For delicate fibres and lace projects, you can just spritz the pieces with a water spray, rather than submerging them fully.

**Steaming**: lay a damp cloth over your work and gently iron over the top - do not iron directly on to your knitting. Continue to iron until the cloth is dry. Another option is to gently hover over your work with the iron and apply steam until the knitting relaxes, this is good for delicate projects and textured stitches. Pin to the desired measurements and allow to set.

# Step-BY-Step

Learn to knit today with these clear guides



### KNIT STITCH



Once cast on, insert the tip of the right needle upwards and from front to back into the top stitch on the left needle. The right hand needle should sit behind the left hand one. Wrap the ball end of yarn anticlockwise around the tip of the right hand needle.




Using the right hand needle, pull a loop of the wrapped yarn through the original stitch to create a new one on the right hand needle. Slide the original stitch off the left hand needle. Repeat from step one. You are now knitting! The knit stitch can be combined with other stitches to create hundreds of different stitch patterns.

### MAKING A SLIP KNOT



Holding the yarn under your left thumb, wrap it twice around your left index and middle fingers, with the second loop closer to the base of the fingers. With the backs of the fingers uppermost, insert the tip of the needle beneath the first loop and over the second, and pull the second loop under the first.



Remove the two fingers and gently tug on both ends of yarn to tighten the slip knot around the needle.

### GRAFT THE TOE



### Kitchener Stitch is the method used to achieve this. It is worked as follows:

**SET UP:** Before starting you need to prepare the stitches on the needle. Hold the two needles with the remaining stitches parallel. The loose end of yarn should be coming from the back needle and lying to the right of the work.

Thread yarn end onto a tapestry needle and insert it purlwise into the first stitch on the needle closest to you. Pull the yarn through but leave the stitch on the needle.



2 Insert the tapestry needle knitwise into the first stitch on the back needle and pull the yarn through, leaving the stitch on the needle.



A Having set up as shown in steps 1 and 2, repeat steps 3 and 4 until all stitches have been grafted. Insert the tapestry needle knitwise into the first stitch on the front needle and slide the stitch off. Before you pull the yarn through this stitch insert the tapestry needle into the next stitch on the front needle purlwise and pull the yarn through, this time leaving the stitch on the needle.



A Insert the tapestry needle purlwise into the first stitch on the back needle and slide it off. Before pulling the yarn through this stitch, insert the tapestry needle into the next stitch on the back needle knitwise and pull the yarn through, leaving the stitch on the needle.

### **CAST ON**



Treate a slipknot on your left hand needle, pulling it taut (but not too tight). Carefully insert the right needle into the knot from front to back, passing under the left hand needle. Wrap the ball end of yarn anticlockwise around the point of the right needle.



2 Pull the loop that forms back through the original stitch (knot) and insert the tip of the left hand needle into the new stitch from underneath to transfer it from the right hand to the left hand needle. There should now be two stitches on the left hand needle.



3 Repeat the above steps, knitting into the top stitch on the left needle and returning the new stitches from the right to the left needle until you have the required number of stitches.

### **BACK STITCH**



Pin the pieces to be joined, with the right sides together. Thread the loose end of yarn onto a tapestry needle. Start by stitching the two outer edges together, then bring the needle through the two pieces 1cm from back to front ahead of the previous stitch.



Push the needle back through at the position where the yarn emerged from the previous stitch. Return it to the front of the work, approx 1cm ahead of the stitch just made. Repeat this until the whole join is complete, working in a straight line.

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
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
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### JOINING CAST OFF EDGES




1 Lay the two pieces to be joined right side up and with the cast off edges touching. Thread a tapestry needle with the loose yarn and push this through the centre of the first stitch, and then in and out through the centres of two stitches on the opposite side.



2 Take the needle over to the first side and insert where it previously exited, bringing it out through the centre of the next stitch. Repeat this process alternating sides and stitching single stitches until the pieces are joined.

### BEGINNING A SEAM



1 With the pieces placed next to each other with right side upwards, thread the yarn tail through the fabric after the first stitch, moving the needle from front to back. Then, take the needle behind the first stitch on the second piece from the back of the work to the front. The yarn will form a figure 8. Tug gently to secure.

### **MATTRESS STITCH**



With the two pieces to be joined lying next to each other, hook the horizontal bar of the first stitch with the tapestry needle. Move to the other piece and hook the first horizontal bar of the stitch on that side.

2 Repeat this moving from one piece to the next and pulling the yarn to tighten the join.

- ☐ Next row (RS): k32 (37, 42, 42), k2tog, pm, k69 (78, 87, 96), pm, ssk, k32 (37, 42, 42). 135 (154, 173, 173) sts
- $\square$  Beg with a p row, work 9 (5, 5, 9) rows in st st
- ☐ Next row (RS): k to two sts before marker, k2tog, sm, k69 (78, 87, 96), sm, ssk, k to end
- ☐ Rep last 10 (6, 6, 10) rows 2 (5, 8, 2) more times. 129 (142, 155,
- 167) sts ☐ Work as for Back from \*\* to \*\*
- ☐ Cont in st st without shaping until Front meas 43 (43.5, 44, 44.5) cm along sides, ending after a WS row

### **Shape left neck**

- ☐ Next row (RS): k27 (34, 35, 38), turn Leave rem sts on holder
- ☐ Next row (WS): p1, p2tog, p to end
- ☐ Next row: k to last three sts,
- k2tog, k1 ☐ Rep last two rows once
- more. 23 (30, 31, 34) sts ☐ Cont in st st until Left front matches Back to shoulder shaping, ending after a RS row

### Shape left shoulder

- ☐ Next row (WS): p16 (20, 20, 22), w&t
- ☐ Next row (RS): k to end
- ☐ Next row: p8 (10, 10, 11), w&t ☐ Next row: k to end
- ☐ Next row: p to end, working wraps tog with st (see special
- abbreviations on p14) Leave sts on holder

### **Shape right neck**

- Leave 43 (44, 45, 47) sts on holder at Front neck, rejoin yarn to neck edge
- ☐ Next row (RS): k to end. 27 (34, 35, 38) sts
- $\square$  Next row (WS): p to last three sts, ssp, p1
- ☐ Next row: k1, ssk, k to end
- ☐ Rep last two rows once more. 23 (30, 31, 34) sts
- $\square$  Cont in st st until right Front matches Back to shoulder shaping, ending after a WS row

### **Shape right shoulder**

- ☐ Next row (RS): k16 (20, 20, 22), w&t
- ☐ Next row (WS): p to end
- ☐ Next row: k8 (10, 10, 11), w&t
- ☐ Next row: p to end
- $\hfill\square$  Next row: k to end, working wraps  $\ensuremath{\vdots}$   $\hfill\square$  Rep last two rnds twice more tog with st (see p14)
- Leave sts on holder

### **SLEEVES**

Using 3.5mm straight needles, cast on 80 (80, 99, 118) sts

- ☐ K eight rows
- Commence Lace patt using Chart or written instructions on page 14:
- ☐ Next row (RS): work Row 1 of Lace patt working 19-st patt rep 4 (4, 5, 6) times
- $\square$  Next row (WS): work Row 2 of Lace patt working 19-st patt rep 4 (4, 5, 6) times
- ☐ Cont as set until all 14 rows of Lace patt have been worked twice in total
- $\square$  Beg with a k row, work in st st Commence Sleeve shaping as folls:
- ☐ Next row: k2, m1, k to last two sts,
- $\square$  Beg with a p row, work 5 (3, 5, 9) rows in st st
- $\square$  Rep last 6 (4, 6, 10) rows 6 (11, 7, 1) times more. 94 (104, 115, 122) sts
- ☐ Cont in st st until Sleeve meas 34 (35, 35.5, 36.5)cm, ending after a WS row

### **Shape sleeve cap**


- $\square$  Cast off 6 (7, 8, 9) sts at beg of next two rows. 82 (90, 99, 104) sts  $\square$  Next row (RS): k2, ssk, k to last
- two sts, k2tog, k2
- ☐ Row 2 (WS): p to end ☐ Rep last two rows 11 (12, 15, 15)
- times more. 58 (64, 67, 72) sts ☐ Next row (RS): k2, ssk, k to last
- four sts, k2tog, k2
- ☐ Next row (WS): p2, p2tog, p to last four sts, ssp, p2
- $\square$  Rep last two rows 4 (4, 3, 4) times more. 38 (44, 51, 52) sts
- ☐ Cast off 4 (5, 6, 6) sts at beg of next four rows. 22 (24,
- 27, 28) sts ☐ Cast off

### **TO MAKE UP**

Block pieces to measurements. Set in sleeves. Sew side and underarm seams

### **NECKBAND**

- ☐ Using 3.5mm circular needle, with RS facing and beg at left shoulder, pick up and k 44 (47, 50, 52) sts to Front neck, k43 (44, 45, 47) from Front neck holder, pick up and k 44 (47, 50, 52) sts to right shoulder, five sts to Back neck, k 47 (48, 49, 51) from Back neck holder, pick up and k five sts to left shoulder, join in the rnd, pm for beg of rnd. 188 (196, 204, 212) sts
- ☐ Rnd 1: p to end
- ☐ Rnd 2: k to end
- ☐ Cast off pwise
- : Weave in all loose ends **LK**

We speak to modern knitwear designer Andrea Mowry about her work



# "I couldn't do without shawls! They are my go-to comfort knit."

merican designer **Andrea Mowry is the** face of contemporary knitwear. Influenced by the works of Elizabeth Zimmerman, she designs her own accessories and garments to suit the modern wardrobe. She specialises in fun and easy-to-wear styles, with clear instructions for every level of knitter. She's a strong believer in enjoying every stitch and wearing at least one hand knit every day. Her goal is to leave knitters feeling empowered and inspired, and wrapped up in their own beautiful knits. We got the lowdown on everything from her favourite accessories to her top knitting tips!



Inspiration is everywhere! But if I was forced to choose what inspires me most, I would have to say it tends to be the yarn itself. Its colour, texture and spin tells me what it wants to be.

My favourite aspect of knitting is getting creative. Every day I watch my hands in wonder as they manipulate yarn and needles to create different fabrics. The possibilities are absolutely endless!

My knitting hero is Elizabeth Zimmerman! I discovered her books at the end of my teen years and found them to be so empowering. Thanks to her, it didn't occur to me that I couldn't write my own patterns!

I have two yarn weights that I reach for most. They are single ply and worsted weight yarns. I like to think of them as opposites, but together they fill most of my knitting needs!

My favourite project changes each time I complete a new design. My current favourite would have to be my Find Your Fade shawl (right). I knitted it at a time that I really needed a creative boost in my life, and I hope that it inspires creativity in others!

My favourite place to knit is in a coffee shop. I love getting lost in my stitches with the noisy chatter of other cafe-goers surrounding me as I sip on a delicious cup of coffee! That being said - I am never without my knitting, and often find little moments everywhere I go to sneak in a stitch or two!

### I couldn't do without shawls!

They are my go-to comfort knit. Whenever I need to feel inspired or relaxed, I cast on a new shawl. They are also my most worn handknit, I wear one pretty much every day!

I truly love every aspect of knitting. Even the swatching and seaming doesn't put me off!

Before I began designing, I was a pastry chef. After leaving my life in this field to start a family, my hands found the necessary freedom to begin creating with fibre instead of flour, but being in the kitchen is always a close second to knitting.

My top tip for new knitters is simply to smile. Remember that it's meant to be fun! You can always unravel it if you make a mistake, so just go for it! Oh, and use a row counter – they will make your life so much easier.

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- $\square$  Rows 3-5: beg with a p row, work in st st
- $\square$  Row 6: k5, (k2tog) twice, k to end. 12 sts
- $\square$  Rows 7-12: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Row 13: (p2tog) to end. Six sts ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **TAIL**

Using 3.25mm needles and a contrasting shade, cast on six sts ☐ Beg with a p row, work five rows in st st

☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **EARS** (make two)

Using 3.25mm needles and a contrasting shade, cast on eight sts ☐ Rows 1-3: beg with a p row, work in st st

- ☐ Row 4: k1, k2tog, k2, k2tog, k1. Six sts
- $\hfill\Box$  Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **TO MAKE UP**

Sew running stitch around cast-on

edge of each Front leg and pull to gather. Sew each leg seam, stuffing as you go. Using fasten-off yarn end, sew body seam, stuffing as you go. Sew running stitch around cast-on edge of each Back leg, pull to gather. Seam leg, stuffing as you go. Attach Back legs to body so the pup is sitting or standing, as you prefer. Sew Head seam half way. Sew running stitch around cast-on edge of Head and pull to gather. Stuff Head and close seam. Sew running stitch around face over eyeline row and gently pull to shape. Attach Head with seam facing down. Sew seams of Ears and Tail and attach them to body with seam facing down. Using oddment of Dark Brown DK embroider French knots for eyes (see Knitwise) and sew small straight stitches for nose

### **BALL**

Using 3.25mm needles and yarn E, cast on 12 sts loosely

- ☐ Row 1 (RS): (kfb) to end. 24 sts ☐ Rows 2-5: beg with a p row, work in st st
- Change to yarn C

- Rows 6-7: beg with a p row, work
- $\square$  Rows 8-12: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Row 13: (k2tog) to end. 12 sts ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off Sew side seam half way, matching colours. Sew running stitch around

cast-on edge, pull to gather. Stuff and

### **CUSHION**

close seam

Change to yarn D

Using 3.25mm needles and yarn D, cast on ten sts

- □ Row 1 and all WS rows: p
   □ Row 2: (kfb) to end. 20 sts
   □ Row 4: (k1, kfb) to end. 30 sts
- ☐ Row 6: (k2, kfb) to end. 40 sts☐ Row 8: (k3, kfb) to end. 50 sts☐
- ☐ Row 10: (k4, kfb) to end. 60 sts ☐ Row 12: (k5, kfb) to end. 70 sts ☐ Rows 13-15: beg with a p row, work in st st
- $\square$  Row 16: (k5, k2tog) to end. 60 sts Change to yarn C
- □ Row 17: p
- $\square$  Row 18: (k4, k2tog) to end. 50 sts Change to yarn E  $\square$  Row 19 and all WS rows: p

- $\square$  Row 20: (k3, k2tog) to end. 40 sts  $\square$  Row 22: (k2, k2tog) to end. 30 sts
- ☐ Row 24: (k1, k2tog) to end. 20 sts☐ Row 26: (k2tog) to end. Ten sts☐ Row 27: p
- $\Box$  Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **TO MAKE UP**

Sew seam half way, matching colours. Sew running stitch around cast-on edge, pull to gather. Stuff and close seam. Using yarn E, insert tapestry needle through centre base and bring it out at top. Take back to the base and pull to create a dent. Weave in ends **LK**

Yarn: oddment of Dark Brown DK

Needles: 3.25mm Safety toy stuffing Stitch holder Tapestry needle

### **Tension Square**

- 25 sts x 30 rows
- 10cm x 10cm
- Stocking stitch
- 3.25mm needles

e love this mischievous crew! It's not just their cute toys and cheeky expression, but the fact that they're actually pretty straightforward to knit and all three can be made with your free yarn kit. If you're giving these toys to really young children, just make sure everything is sewn together really securely.

### Start knitting here...

NOTE: work three pups, each using yarn A, B or C as main shade

### **HEAD**

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on seven sts

- ☐ Row 1 and all WS rows: p
- $\square$  Row 2: (kfb) to end. 14 sts  $\square$  Row 4: (k1, kfb) to end. 21 sts
- $\square$  Row 6: (k2, kfb) to end. 28 sts
- $\square$  Rows 7-13: beg with a p row,
- work in st st
- ☐ Row 14 (eyeline): k7, (k2tog) seven times, k7. 21 sts
- $\square$  Rows 15-16: beg with a p row, work in st st
- $\square$  Row 17: (p2, p2tog) to last st, p1. 16 sts
- ☐ Row 18: k
- Row 19: (p2, p2tog) to end. 12 sts  $\square$  Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **FRONT LEGS AND BODY**

### NOTE: worked in one piece

### Right leg

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on six sts

- ☐ Row 1 (WS): p
- $\square$  Row 2: (kfb) to end. 12 sts  $\square$  Rows 3-5: beg with a p row,
- work in st st
- $\square$  Row 6: k3, (k2tog) twice, k5. Ten sts
- $\square$  Rows 7-15: beg with a p row, work in st st
- Cut yarn, leave sts on a holder

### **Left leg**

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on six sts

- ☐ Rows 1-5: work as for Right leg.
- $\square$  Row 6: k5, (k2tog) twice, k3.

 $\square$  Rows 7-15: beg with a p row, work

Do not cut yarn

☐ Row 16 (join legs): k2tog, k8, cast on two sts, working from holder: k8, k2tog. 20 sts

### **Body**

- $\square$  Row 17: p2tog, p to last two sts, p2tog. 18 sts
- ☐ Row 18: k2tog, k to last two sts, k2tog. 16 sts
- ☐ Rows 19-20: rep Rows 17-18. 12 sts
- ☐ Row 21: as Row 17. Ten sts ☐ Row 22: k
- $\square$  Row 23: cast on four sts, p to end. 14 sts
- ☐ Row 24: cast on four sts. k to end. 18 sts
- ☐ Row 25: p
- ☐ Row 26: kfb. k to last st. kfb. 20 sts
- ☐ Row 27: p
- ☐ Row 28: k2. (kfb. k2) to end. 26 sts
- $\square$  Rows 29-31: beg with a p row. work in st st
- $\square$  Row 32: k2, (kfb, k2) to end. 34 sts
- $\square$  Rows 33-37: beg with a p row, work in st st
- ☐ Row 38: k2, (k2tog, k2) to end. 26 sts
- □ Row 39: p
- $\square$  Row 40: k2tog, (k1, k2tog) to end. 17 sts
- ☐ Row 41: p
- $\square$  Row 42: k2tog, (k1, k2tog) to end.
- ☐ Cut yarn, thread through rem sts, pull tight and fasten off

### **BACK LEGS** (make two)

**:** □ Row 2: (kfb) to end. 14 sts
