GameChanger New tech with the power to dent the universe



RETROBLOX

Retro games consoles have been coming thick and fast over the last year - Nintendo brought its own reimagined mini NES to the market and is set to follow with a SNES version - but what if we told you there was another player entering the old-new-school space that could play all your favourite old bangers? Like, all of them (almost).

The player in question is Retroblox: a modular retro console that will enable you to play all those titles gathering dust, so you won't need a cabinet stuffed with old console in order to get your retro gaming fix. The makers call it the 'one console' and it works by using exchangeable Element Modules, each one designed to support a particular type of game and game controller. Want to play a Megadrive classic? Snap in the Megadrive Element Module. When you load a game Retroblox will automatically add it to its built-in storage, so you'll be able to navigate to and play that game by simply loading it from the console menu. A built in CD drive also enables you to play more modern classics from the likes of Sega's Mega-CD or the original PlayStation. All games are upscaled to 1080p, so your rustic collection will look as good as humanly possible, with an HDMI connector enabling you to hook it up to your big screen TV for some lounge action.



Mag-Lev Audio Levitating Turntable

Am I hallucinating, or is that record player floating in mid-air? While all those Pink Floyd and Jefferson Airplane records may have altered your mind, you definitely aren't tripping here. Mag-Lev Audio's remarkable Levitating Turntable isn't powered by the occult, but instead uses strong magnets to keep your wax suspended in zero gravity. The turntable also uses sensing software to ensure it spins 100 per cent smoothly. Just connect the record player to your stereo system or favourite amp through phono-in and you're ready to rock.

It looks amazing. Pricey, though. The vinyl boom has led to no end of budget friendly turntables, but to experience your collection in high fidelity you'll need to pony up. Not only does this higher price tag equal slick operation and a richer sound, it also bags you premium components including a Pro-Ject 8.6 tonearm and Ortofon OM 5E cartridge. The zero friction operation means parts will take much longer to wear out.

What if there's a power cut? Won't my vinyl go flying across the room? Nope. The Levitating Turntable features an Uninterruptible Power Supply. In the event of a power outage the turntable stores enough power to lift the tonearm, stop the record spinning and, like a scene from a sci-fi flick, raises retractable supports to cradle the platter and bring your wax back down to earth. Now that's what we call vinyl for the future.

Out of this world! I want one. Us too! The Mag-Lev Audio Levitating

Nice timepiece, T3. What's the story? This is LG's new sporty smartwatch, rocking Android Wear 2.0 and developed in collaboration with Google to make the most of the updated OS – expect better navigation, some nifty standalone apps and, of course, Android Pay functionality. So you can pay for your Butterscotch Brulée Latte with just a tap of the watch.

Butterscotch? Pff! I see it has a crown thingy.

Exceptional use of language. And yes it has a crown or 'rotating side button', enabling you to scroll through menus, messages and notifications on the display. And what a display it is: a 1.38-inch P-OLED beauty optimised for bright light conditions, so no more squinting to read data in the sundrenched outdoors.

The UK doesn't do sun-drenched. Now. what about activity tracking? Well, pardon us for being optimistic about the weather! The Watch Sport looks promising for fitness fans. It has a PPG sensor that uses light to accurately measure your rate of blood flow, and utilises Google Fit, which automatically recognises the activity you're engaged in, offering real-time tracking and coaching. An IP68 rating means you can wear it while swimming.

Cool. When can I buy this watch? The LG Watch Sport, along with the slimmer LG Watch Style, is available to buy in the States now, with UK availability to follow shortly.

What have you got for me today, T3? How about a sexy DSLR? Compact and portable, the autofocus Pentax KP has a range of features to help you get the most from every frame. In short, it'll help your photos look pro even if you have little clue what you're doing.

Good, I often mess up my photos. Don't worry, you're not the only one – but the Pentax KP, with its new-generation CMOS image sensor and high-performance imaging engine, is designed to deliver captivating 24MP photos. Also built-in is a five-axis shakereduction system to reduce blur.

I hike a lot. Is this camera adventure-proof? With 67 seals across its body, the Pentax KP is dust-proof, rain-proof and cold-proof down to temperatures as low as -10°C. You can change the grip to suit your shooting style, holding comfort or choice of mounted lens, and tinker with the control-panel layout to better suit the way you work.

Does it record video, too? Full HD, baby, with a range of recording functions including a 4K Interval Movie mode that connects 4K-res stills at a fixed interval to create a single movie file.

Sounds ace. When is it out? The Pentax KP is available to buy now, in either silver or black, for £1,099.99 (body only).



What am I looking at here? A giant **IKEA picture frame?**

This minimal rectangle isn't a 'Fjörksta', it's the latest flagship 4K TV (available in three sizes) from Sony. Don't feel stupid for not recognising it as a telly, though -Sony's designed it to look as inconspicuous as possible. Only the screen and a thin black bezel are visible from the front, with no speaker grill or stand to be seen. Instead, business takes place at

the rear, with a kickstand housing the TV's guts and subwoofer.

Ok, but where are the speakers? Sony's innovated here, creating an 'acoustic surface' using tiny actuators. In other words, it's turned the screen into a speaker by using vibrating motors behind the panel. This allows for audio that can accurately track what happens on screen. It won't shake the TV off your A/V unit, though - the

micro-vibrations are imperceptible and won't affect image quality.

But OLED panels are dull. OLED has arguably looked a little lackluster in the past, but the latest generation is ace. Whereas LCD requires a backlight that illuminates the panel, here each OLED pixel can be switched on/off independently. The A1 supports Dolby Vision HDR, too, which is capable of vivid, 'contrasty'

pictures. Powering it all is Sony's X1 Extreme chip that upscales HD footage to 4K and SDR to HDR.

It sounds pricey, but I want one. Prices haven't been announced yet. The Al series, featuring 55-65- and 77-inch models, is expected to go on sale later this spring.



Think of them as ways to enhance what you're listening to, whether that's your favourite album or the latest audiobook. You can choose from Commute, Clear, Workout or Podcast profiles. Oh, and the memory foam inside each ear cushion creates passive noise isolation, so your music shouldn't leak out and external noises shouldn't bother you either.

They look simple to use, too. Aye. There are three control buttons on the right earcup, enabling you to take calls, pause/play your music, control the volume and pair the headphones with your smartphone. They're comfortable to wear, too, with plush ear cushions adapting to the shape of your ears, delivering a supportive fit throughout those marathon listening sessions.





It's now officially impossible for car launches to get any more crazy or awesome

n the bar, the people at the next table have literally frozen on the spot. In the corner, a group of card players have done the same, now sitting as still as statues. Statues of card players. In a bar.

International megamodel, movie star and mum Mila Jovovich leans in, lightly touches my shoulder and breathily intones, "When a door opens, you should walk through it." A camera flash pops, capturing the moment.

So, yeah, that was my last evening out. What have you been up to lately?

Part of the fun of being a tech journalist is being invited to lots of snazzy, swanked-up events, where I get fed canapés by attractive young people from Eastern Europe, in return for sitting through a ten-minute presentation about a new sat-nav, or what have you. It's a decent perk.

Now and then, I'll get invited to an event so spectacular, it makes your average flagship-smartphone launch seem like a leaving do for an unpopular colleague. But Toyota's 'The Night That Flows' immersive event for its C-HR car? Now, that *really* took the biscuit.

Car-razv

I have a theory about cars that actually applies to a lot of tech products: they're practically all good. Seriously, when was the last time someone brought out a car that stank? It never happens. The same goes for nearly all smartphones, TVs and laptops above a certain price point. We're in a kind of techy golden age – which is probably why everyone is so miserable.

Basically, (as the song says) everything is now literally awesome, which means brands have to work harder than ever to sell their wares.

Traditional advertising just won't cut it, so one promotional method that's dead popular nowadays is to get

opinion-forming 'influencers'
– for instance, Kate Moss, Joe
'The Body Coach' Wicks, George
Clooney, or me – to mention a
product to their legions of adoring fans.

As you can see, in the case of Toyota's C-HR, this approach has worked very well. The car's full name is actually the 'Coupé High Rider', which sounds a bit like a high-class prostitute from an EL James novel. I'm not a prostitute, high-class or otherwise, but I'm more than happy to plug the car, because the event to launch it was just really, ridiculously impressive.

Here's what happened: I was driven, with two other influencer types, to an industrial estate in south London.

Now, I know you're probably thinking, "That doesn't sound very swanky," but bear with me. What Toyota had set up was an "immersive experience". Yes, that makes it sound by dancers at a full-on rave, and given a brief lecture on the subject of sunglasses design. I didn't quite get that bit.

Now, OK, when I said 'movie', what I really meant is 'slightly pretentious car advert' – but nonetheless, it was gob-smacking. Even the exquisite embarassment of having to talk to actors 'doing improv' in supporting roles couldn't stop it from being one of the most singular experiences of my life.

What did I learn about the car? That it looks like a cut-down Batmobile – or perhaps a robot pitbull – and has rear doors with handles in a weird place, and remarkably small windows. Reading from the press release now, I can add that it also boasts "the lowest centre of gravity in its class", it comes in both 1.8-litre hybrid and 1.2-litre petrol options, and it costs from £20,995 on the road.

What did I learn about launching a car? That if you throw an event as incredible as Toyota did, I will totally write about it, even though I hardly ever write about cars. What remains to be seen is how any product launch – be it a car, gadget or cure for baldness – can ever top this. When everything is awesome, making a new product stand out just gets tougher and tougher.

It was like a slightly pretentious car advert, but nonetheless it was gobsmacking

shit as well, so let me explain what it really was: a movie, in which I was the star and my co-star was Mila Jovovich. Yes, that Mila Jovovich.

We walked or were driven from location to location, across a vast and sprawling set, as movie-esque things happened around us. It was seamless. Opulent. Preposterous? Well, yes, that too, but I'm not complaining.

A C-HR drove round and round me at speed as I sat at a roulette table. We were mobbed by paparazzi, surrounded



GADGET GURU

This issue

Can you build me a DIY toolkit? What can I do about my unwanted hair? How should I tune a guitar? How can I tell someone where I am? Why would I use insoles? Can I jam phone signals in the office?





Can you build me a DIY toolkit, Guru?

It's well known at Guru Towers that if you need a DIY job doing, you come straight to GaGu because Guru's phone has the number for the local handyman! All jokes aside, Guru will now reveal the sum of his secret DIY knowledge, on the proviso that you don't tell Mrs Guru that your gadget master has been near a power tool.

Taking the absolute essentials first, you need to get yourself a combi drill, something equally suitable for driving screws or hammering through concrete, and preferably one that boasts a hefty amount of torque and a decent rechargeable battery. The

Metabo SB18LTX (£290) tops out at a rather silly 110Nm of torque and can hammer at 32,300 impacts per minute. Yes it leans towards the top end of the average home driller's price range, but it's pretty damn cool.

You'll also need a decent hammer. The Craftsman Autohammer with Articulating Head and Nextec Quickboost (£190) drives in nails at 0. 45 and 90 degrees without so much as

out of hand',

a swing of the wrist. although rare is the occasion that it will be more useful in a corner than a manual claw hammer. Remember: the longer the hammer, the kinder it'll be to your wrist.

Rounding out the burrowing, hitting and cutting triumvirate is a good saw. Look for a reciprocating saw that can do a stack of different jobs. Makita's 18V battery-powered DJR185Z should do the trick. It retails at a slightly walletstraining £144, but you'll find it for less if you spend some time looking online.

Don't forget to then stock up on all manner of manual tools, drill bits. saw blades, nails and screws of every conceivable size, and stuff the lot into a badass toolbox. The Vaunt 12013 Aluminium Tool Case (£30) will handle the job nicely for you. Once your bits are safe inside, cover the case with stickers and find somewhere to hide it.

And hey, Guru is not responsible for the loss of any digits, particularly at the hands of one's spouse!

GaGu, what can I do about my unwanted hair?

GaGu's long-suffering groomer has been forced to invest heavily in the appropriately-named Grizzly

10-inch Wet Grinder Kit (around £220) to keep his clippers in working order; all being well, your follicles won't eject the same steel fibres that Guru's do.


Over-manly hirsuteness aside, we've all felt the pain of a hair or two in the wrong place. There's no shame in instituting a proper grooming regime that includes hair removal, and if you use the correct tools with the correct skill you should be able to get yourself fuzz free without much drama.

Guru has covered shaving before (see *T3* issue 258 for that pep talk) but let's quickly recap the essentials. The BaByliss i-stubble + (£45) remains the recommended option for accurate hair clipping, while Cornerstone's subscription razor system (from £30) is a top option for a silky smooth face. So what of the rest of your body?

Cyclists' legs will benefit from a sharp razor and a proper technique knee to thigh first, then ankle to knee - and the same exfoliation and lotion application you'd perform on your face (you do that, right?). Other hairprone areas can be dealt with using similar care and consideration for hair direction. If you can get away with not going super-close on your armpits or on other specific areas prone to sweat and rubbing, that would be Guru's primary recommendation.

More permanent hair removal gets a little scientific. You could wax your coarser hairs (the Zeos Men's Waxing Kit will set you back £30), although you may be better off getting the job done for the first time at a professional salon, then take advice from them about maintenance and ongoing care.

Alternatively, you could try hair removal creams (a tube of Nad's – stop tittering at the back! – costs around £10) as long as you're aware that the results will be patchy and your skin will sting. And you could, if you were really desperate, use an epilator (the iVog X-Tweez at £30, for example), but that's an instrument of pure torture even Guru can't enjoy.

How should I tune a guitar?



Ah, guitar tuning. You just twiddle the things at the end of the long thing, right? Admittedly GaGu

is no stringed instrument expert, but Guru has managed to distract Great Uncle Guru from playing folkster Ralph McTell's greatest hit for long enough to get a half decent answer to your question. Here goes...

Apparently, most electronic tuners have been made all but redundant by tuning apps for smartphones. Grab gStrings Tuner (free with IAP) on Android, or GuitarTuna (free, with a pro version available) on iOS, and your cover of McTell's *Streets of London* will sound spot on in no time.

That said, electric players are still well-served by a digital tuner like the Korg Pitchblack Custom (£55), which sits in the effects chain along with the rest of your pedals. That way you

can twang your strings to your heart's content and get them all in tune while muting the sound going to your amplifier.

Great Uncle Guru suggests that electric players should, in fact, leave the muting on at all times, but then he's yet to forgive Bob Dylan for the events of 1965. Ouch!

GADGET GURU'S MAGIC BOX



Spring has sprung, and with it Guru's wallet sprang open to exchange money for goods. In this case, a new vacuum cleaner. Alright so Guru didn't stray far from the status quo on this one by picking up a **Dyson DC50 Multifloor** (£250), but it's nothing if not impressive. The vast selection of cyclone generators on top of the cleaner looks mighty mean, and it sucks like nobody's business, successfully inhaling all the hair Guru's beloved pet Chompsky

sheds, plus the crumbs that are the natural result of Guru's flamboyant lunching style. This new Dyson is dinky, too, housing a vast amount of power in a tiny package. GaGu could only find it in yellow, though.

As you might expect, the spring cleaning bug has infested the whole of Guru Towers, although GaGu's eldest offspring does insist that his bedroom is a perfectly viable bacteria habitat and therefore not to be interfered with. 

How can I tell someone where I am?



Permissive stalking has become a lot more difficult since Google dropped its cross-platform Latitude

location service. Battery lives have gotten longer, though, so there's a silver lining there. If your friends and family are all nestled within Apple's bosom, Find My Friends, when properly set-up, should do the trick in helping them locate you when you're out.

If you drop the automated aspect you can send locations manually with apps like Hangouts. Use Guru's favourite 'within-three-metres' location sharer what3words.com. Be sure not to tell your recipient what basket.milk. fillers or legwork.movements.fiasco actually refers to. If they can't work it out, they don't deserve to find you.





HOW TO USE DYSON'S CONNECTED-HOME PRODUCTS TO COOL, CLEAN AND PURIFY YOUR HOUSE

> There was once a time when home robots were the stuff of dreams, existing only in the realm of sci-fi movies and cartoons from the 1970s. But now, finally, home automation is gaining traction, and Dyson is, in its own way, at the forefront of the movement.

For the uninitiated, Dyson's connectedhome products fall into two categories: vacuum cleaners (for which the company is best-known) and fans/air purifiers. Thanks be remotely controlled from wherever you are (see the next page for how to set this up).

So, let's start with the Dyson 360 Eye, the company's revered robotic vacuum cleaner. Rather than using guide wires to map your house, the small 360-degree camera on top of the unit navigates your home, ensuring the 360 Eye doesn't bump into things and can intelligently track where it's cleaned. You can schedule the robot vacuum to begin work at a certain time each day, or set it off manually from your phone. At the end of cleaning, it'll return to its base station to recharge, with the Dyson Link app showing you which areas of your house it's cleaned.

APRIL

Now onto the fans... These Dyson Link products comprise the Dyson Cool fan/air purifier, available in desk and floor-standing fan and air purifier. All work in the same way: set your device up in the Dyson Link app, and you can turn it on and off remotely (or set a schedule so that the device cools or heats the room it's in at specific times of the day). You can also use them to measure the air quality of the room. If you have allergies, this gives you an immediate idea of how clean the air is. Of course, you can also control the fans and purifiers on the device or via remote control.

Dyson's Link products don't yet work with the likes of Amazon Echo (as Roomba's 880 see this being too far off; it can't be long 360 Eye", or "Alexa, start my Dyson Cool Link". Until voice recognition arrives, use the Dyson Link app to control each device. Here's how...

SETTING UP DYSON LINK

DOWNLOAD IT

▶ The first thing to do is grab the Dyson Link app from the App Store or Google Play. Before you set up your Dyson device, it's a good idea to check out the demo videos - they'll give you an idea of how the Pure Cool Link fans and 360 Eye work. You can also see how the app works without connecting to a device.



CONNECT IT

■ Let's take the Pure Cool
Link fan as an example.
First of all, go into the
Dyson Link app and hit the
+ button top-right. Hit
Start on the screen that
appears. The Link app will
scan for machines nearby
and, in this example case,
the Pure Cool Link will





Should I buy an **Echo or** wait for **Google Home**?



ROB CARNEY REPLIES:

Google Home still doesn't have a UK release date, so you could be in for a long wait. That said, it's pretty

easy to import one from the US using a service such as Big Apple Buddy. The real question here is which is better: Google Home or Amazon Echo? That's a tough question to answer, but we'd say Echo is a safer bet for UK users at the moment because it has more support for smart home devices. Google Home is pretty limited right now, with only a few devices (including Nest) supported.


The Amazon Echo can control virtually every smart home device, from Hive to Hue to a Neato robot vacuum. It'll also hook up to Spotify, as well as play anything from Amazon Music. What we really love about the Echo is the scope for us to ask for more random stuff. For example, when we tell it to "Play sad

songs" or "Play party music". On *T3* we have both the Echo and a Google Home. The former gets used so much more – possibly as it sits neatly in the kitchen and is a fantastic tool for converting measurements whilst cooking and listening to the radio.

Google Home is more entrenched in search function, as you would expect from a product created by the internet giant. You can ask this device any question and it will give you the top result from Google. The Echo can't do this.

So whilst both Amazon Echo and Google Home are amazing products, with lots of promise for future innovation, right now we can recommend one of these devices and that's the Amazon Echo – purely due to its wide-ranging support for smart home and multiple media options. Oh, and the speaker is much better than on the Google Home.

I'm getting my garden sorted for spring. What gadgets can help?

So many! Get started with a personal weather station, like the Netatmo Weather

Station (£169), now integrated with Amazon Alexa. This kit with its supporting accessories enable you to monitor weather conditions by asking questions such as, "Alexa, ask Netatmo how much it's rained today".

Are you battling jungle grass and weeds? Try a robotic lawnmower and power weeder. We love the Bosch Indego 1000 Connect (£1,169), an app-controlled robo mower with Logicut Intelligent navigation to ensure it stays away from your flower beds. As for a weeder, the eco-friendly Batavia Maxxheat 2000w Weeder (£48) requires no herbicides, instead blasting weeds with 600° blasts of hot air.

When it comes to caring for potted plants, we're still hung up on the Parrot Flower Power Plant Monitor (£39.99), an app-controlled device that sits in planters to monitor food, moisture, sunlight and temperature levels. You'll need a gadget to help with watering, too, so try Hozelock's Cloud Controller (£134.99), an app-controlled kit that enables you to devise multiple watering schedules.

I need an outdoor **security cam**. Got any recommendations?



SPENCER HART REPLIES:

Outdoor security cameras are a great way of keeping an eye on the exterior of

your property. Gone are the days of needing miles of bothersome wiring routed through your walls and a hard drive stashed in your loft. Now there's a wide selection of affordable, Wi-Fi enabled cameras that can stream footage to your smartphone and the cloud, and send notifications to your smartphone or tablet if they detect unusual behaviour on your property. This gives you peace of mind if you're away from home, enabling you to check on your abode with a few taps.

There are lots of brands making such security cameras, with two of our favourites including the Netgear Arlo Smart Security System (from £409.99) and the Nest Cam Outdoor (£179). Both of these cameras are fully weather-proof, so you can position them outside without having to worry about rain and cold temperatures damaging them.

The Netgear Arlo is wireless and runs on four CR123 batteries, which last (on average) around six months. The Arlo cameras (included in the system are four Arlo smart security cameras and two Arlo Q cameras) connect to a low powered Wi-Fi hub plugged into your

router. They will only begin recording if they sense movement. The Nest Outdoor Cam records 24/7 but relies on a reinforced power cable that can either be plugged into an external outlet or internally (requiring a hole drilled through your wall). Nest also has a built-in speaker, so if you do see someone hop over your fence without permission you can tell them to go away quick smart.

Image quality from the Nest and Arlo cameras is similar, so the brand you choose depends on your specific security needs. It may also be worth you waiting a little longer before purchasing, as the Ring Floodlight Cam and the Bosch Eyes-Outdoor Camera are being released this year. Both cameras look worthy contenders for your cash.

Concerned about the state of your heart? Many of these smart scales can monitor your cardio health, especially the Withings Body Cardio (£149.95), which takes and presents daily readings of your arterial health by measuring your pulse wave velocity. New for 2017 is the Terraillon R-Link (£120), a

sleek scale with BodySense tech to calculate your body's unique composition (fat mass, bone mass, water weight and so on). It's similar to the popular Fitbit Aria (£99.99) and Garmin Index Smart Scale (£149.99), both fully-fledged weight and body composition scales designed for use with a robust companion app.

THERE'S NO SHORTAGE OF WIRELESS MUSIC SYSTEMS TO CHOOSE FROM - BUT WHICH SOUNDS THE BEST?

F YOU WANT MUSIC

The catch is that these proprietary systems are generally incompatible with one another,

and not all play high-res audio. The hi-fi industry has effectively instigated a format war.

While inter-operability may be too much to ask, all multi-room systems tend to work in the same way. They connect wirelessly and are driven with a bespoke app. You can stream tunes from your service of choice, or play tracks direct from a local NAS or PC. Speakers in different rooms can be grouped so that they receive the same content simultaneously, or individually fed with different tracks.

For this sonic showdown, we're auditioning three big-brand contenders, each loyal to its own ecosystem. HEOS by Denon is the original rival to market-leader SONOS, while MusicCast by Yamaha is stealing a lead through sheer system variety. Panasonic's All Connected sits somewhere in the middle. We'll compare three compact desktop active speakers from each, then a trio of larger living-room sound systems with comparable specs, ultimately pairing them together for a mini multi-room house party...



\rightarrow TEST 01:

DESIGN

There's more to wireless multi-room audio than just streaming Spotify...

epresenting Panasonic in our multi-room Octagon is the titchy SC-Allo5 and the bruising SC-All9. The former is a portable for all occasions; it'll last around nine hours on a fully charged battery, while an IPX7 rating means it's waterproof to a depth of one metre – more than enough for the average wet room. The flagship SC-All9 is rather more sedentary, preferring a table-top or wall-mount. We were immediately impressed by their design and build quality. Streaming-service implementation includes Spotify, Napster and AllPlay Radio served via third-party apps.

The compact Denon HEOS 1 also boasts a water-resistant design, but to take it outside you'll need to invest £79 in a HEOS Go Pack, which consists of a rechargeable battery and a Splashguard. The battery clips to the base of the speaker and plays for around six hours. The Splashguard upgrades the unit from steam resistance to IPX4 splashproof certification.

The HEOS 7 is a scarily potent table-top music system; its bass is seismic

By way of contrast, the HEOS 7 is a scarily potent table–top music system distinguished by a bass performance that borders on seismic. It's also heavy, which must be a good thing. The HEOS's streaming support is best in class, covering Spotify, Tidal, SoundCloud, Napster, Deezer and TuneIn. Its trump card, though, is its ability to play ultra–high–res DSD audio files.

Yamaha's MCR-N470D micro-system is a more conventional alternative to the HEOS 7, but, even with separate stereo bookshelf speakers, it requires only marginally more floor space. It has all the functionality you'd expect from a standalone hi-fi, including DAB. The fascia is tidy, with a CD drawer positioned beneath a clear display and a USB reader to the right. The WX-010 has a two-way speaker design and a passive radiator for enhanced bass. You can plonk it on a bedside table or use the hole on the rear to hang it on a wall. It's cheap enough to warrant being paired with a second WX-010 for stereo. MusicCast support includes Spotify, Napster, Juke, Qobuz and Internet Radio, and it's AirPlay-compliant.

What kind of compatibility can you expect when you buy one of these systems?

→ Panasonio's All Connect system is based on the Qualcomm AllPlay platform, and is therefore theoretically compatible with other products that use the same chipset. Now available in a second-gen HS2 guise, HEOS by Denon has added high-res audio support and extended interoperability to work with Denon home-cinema receivers. Rather than foster a standalone multi-room brand, Yamaha has opted to treat MusicCast more as a feature, building support for it into a swathe of products (35 at the time of writing, and that number's increasing all the time). Buy any Yamaha hi-fi or AV today, and you'll probably be able to MusicCast it tomorrow...

FILES AHEAD

All our systems support 24-bit audio, but there are a few complications...

→ Multi-room manufacturers tend to brag about their systems' file compatibility and playback promiscuity, but there's always devil in the detail. The Panasonic All Connected models embrace MP3 and AAC, WAV, FLAC and ALAC up to 192k/24-bit, but not ultrahigh-res DSD.

On the Yamaha MCR-N470D and WX-010, MusicCast

file-format support also includes 24-bit FLAC, AIFF, WAV and ALAC, plus AAC and WMA, but again not DSD.

Denon's HEOS range offers the best out-of-the-box support. All second-generation HS2 active speakers play uncompressed WAV, ALAC, AIFF and FLAC up to 24-bit 192kHz. plus DSD 2.8MHz.

SET-UP

Which of these systems is the easiest to get going?



ith Panasonic's All Connected system, set-up proved reasonably painless, thanks to the admirably efficient Music Streaming

companion app. All you have to do is connect the AllPlay device over Wi-Fi, name your speaker based on the room it lives in, and you're done. In just a few minutes, we were browsing our NAS music library – and navigation was satisfyingly quick and buffer-free. All Connected speakers can be grouped or run individually. If you own multiple AllPlay speakers, you can stream everywhere simultaneously.

The Denon system is driven by an equally competent HEOS companion app. Whether you have music on your smartphone, networked on a DLNA NAS or lurking on a laptop, the app will discover it. Unlike rival systems, you initiate Wi-Fi set-up by connecting your HEOS device to your smartphone via a 3.5mm cable (supplied).

You can then update the speaker with your network password. Hardwiring HEOS speakers to get them online is simple and effective.

Our Yamaha micro-system proved rather more problematic. To network MusicCast components, you need to pair the Controller app through the Connect button on your MusicCast kit. Once discovered, you can use a Wi-Fi password to connect. However, we experienced repeated failures trying to do this. Perseverance, it seems, is the key. Once linked to the companion app, you can assign your component an identity. Grouping rooms or zones is a case of ticking boxes.

All three control apps are polished affairs. Although pedantic, the MusicCast app is actually the most visual. We particularly liked the way you can assign fabulously aspirational images to each of your home zones when customising them.

Naturally, all three of the multi-room systems on test are Bluetooth-compatible, making it straightforward to stream your favourite tracks to them from a smartphone.

The first AVR on the market to support HEOS speakers, it reinforces interoperability by bundling in a free HEOS 1. You can play a CD on a Blu-ray deck, select that input as the

source on the AVR via the HEOS companion app, and then stream the music through both your cinema system and any connected HEOS speakers. Similarly, you can also share movie soundtracks, although Dolby/DTS bitstreams play out of sync with connected HEOS speakers.

→ Denon isn't the only company that's integrating multi-room into home theatre. The £899 Yamaha RX-A860 is a seven-channel Dolby Atmos and DTS: X receiver that can also stream from, or function as, a zone in a multi-room system. Want to route TV audio to a compact kitchen speaker? No problem! In fact, with seven HDMI inputs, you can send all manner of sound sources around the house. The receiver also supports Apple AirPlay. Yamaha's Cinema DSP processing means that whatever is streamed to the AVR can be processed into multiple flavours of multi-channel.

PERFORMANCE

In a head-to-head comparison, which system leaves us happiest?

cursory glance would suggest

that the Panasonic SC-Allo5 is a modest all-purpose active speaker, but it performs well and can be considered exceptional given both its price and waterfowl functionality. Sure, it may be a tad monophonic, but with 20W on board it makes a surprisingly big noise. There are two 6.5cm drivers, paired to matching passive radiators; DSP-enhanced mid-bass serves rock and dance tracks particularly well; and it has great vocal integrity for such a small box. Sadly, when running off its battery, power output drops to just 8W, which is noticeable.

The SC-All9 is the kingpin in the Panasonic All Connected range, and with an integrated 40W sub, dual 8cm woofers, plus a pair of 2x20W 2.5cm tweeters, it packs quite a punch. The stereo soundstage is a bit constrained, so it's not really going to evoke the big screen with those Hans Zimmer soundtracks, but pop, rock and grime sound jolly enough. As an all-in-one sound system, it does a decent job.

Denon doesn't publish specs for its HEOS speakers, but the big HEOS 7 doesn't suffer from a lack of volume; it's perfectly at home in larger rooms. But this deep reach is balanced by a rich, melodious mid-range. The HEOS 1 has a custom tweeter and woofer, driven by an efficient digital amp module. Curiously, the Bluetooth implementation on both HEOS HS2 models isn't aptX, so you're not getting the best-quality wireless BT available.

Significantly, both speakers sound fabulous with high-res audio, and DSD in particular, finding nuance and detail.

Yamaha's MCR-N470D may look like the heavy-metal option here, but in terms of grunt it's in line with the SC-All9 and the HEOS 7. Those bookshelf speakers don't drop deep, but they have a workmanlike mid-range that fits the bill with most genres. Multi-room playback between our Yamaha zones was in sync, although the micro-system did sporadically drop its wireless connection when rooms were linked and music streaming.

A DESIGN FOR LIFE

Don't forget you'll need to factor-in how the speakers look with your home's furnishings...

→ When it comes to cosmetic design, wireless systems run the gamut from wacky to dull. The HEOS 7's teardrop design is more handbag than high-tech, while the HEOS 1 is rather angular.

Yamaha plays it safe with the WX-010, and entertains only a modicum of retro chic with its MusicCast micro-system.

Arguably the best-looking wireless speakers on test come

from Panasonic. There's no unjustifiable, impractical silhouette here. Both the SC-All05 and the SC-All9 feature classic lines that are lifted by subtle, clever refinements. We like how the waterproof model has a slanted top with touch-sensitive controls, while those chrome trims complement the stock grille.

Discs are copied in 320kbps MP3 or WAV format. This is handy, but hampered by the lack of metadata support – rips are label-less and lack track info.

The SC-All7CD has a five-driver configuration, comprising two tweeters, two three-inch woofers and a subwoofer, though there's only 20W of amplification.
There's also a sweet spot, so listening position is crucial to a good stereo performance.

Back in the day, all you needed for a good house party was a Dansette, a couple of Matt Bianco LPs and a generous carton of liebfraumilch. But that just doesn't cut it any more. These days, the kids want cocktails, consoles and karaoke (and if you can throw in a few bags of Wotsits, too, that'll be much appreciated).

So when T3 asks me to throw a (mock) house party for my teammates, I reach for my little black book of gadgets to find the best kit for a domestic blowout. Like Russ Abbot, I want an atmosphere - and I'm going to use tech to help me get it.

WHO'S FOR A TIPPLE?

But I'm also going to use alcohol. Now, I'm not saying you need booze to have a good time (unless you're a morris dancer), but hey - it gives me the excuse to try out some pretty awesome gadgets.

The first of those is Klarstein's Stal Beer Tap Dispenser. Art editor Luke looks visibly distressed when he walks into the kitchen to discover that I haven't laid on any tinnies for the party - but then I show him what

this beautiful stainless-steel beast does. Having already inserted a five-litre keg of Czech lager, all I have to do is pull down the tap and out flows the delicious brew. An integrated thermoelectric cooling system keeps the beer refreshingly chilled, while CO2 cartridges inside the machine ensure you get a nice foamy head - something I haven't had since I fell asleep in the bath.

For those who don't like beer, there's the SodaStream Fizzi. Now, I know what you're thinking: a) it's not the 1980s, and b) how are my guests going to get pissed on cherryade? Well, reader, everyone's favourite Israeli drinks giant is back, and the Fizzi is a super-sleek new take on its iconic pop producer. With the supplied canister providing enough gas to carbonate 60 litres of tap water. it's a fun way of rustling up bespoke cocktails - add a squeeze of lemon and some Bourbon, and you have yourself a deliciously fresh whisky lemonade.

I also have a gadget called the Coravin Model One System, a trigger-operated handheld that pushes a fine needle through the cork of a wine bottle, enabling you to enjoy a glass of wine and save the rest of the bottle for another day. It's the perfect tech for discerning drinkers - not that there are any to be found at this party.

After an hour's boozing, the mood has livened up somewhat and inhibitions are abandoned - I even hear someone laughing

at one of deputy editor Nick's jokes. This tells me that it's time to start the swingers - sorry, singers! - party. I love a bit of karaoke but my warbling skills are more Pat Butcher than Pat Boone, so the Easy Karaoke CD/CDG Pro System is ideal. Echo, pitch-shift and auto-tune controls give your vocal acrobatics the X factor; it comes with a 100-track CD to help you practise (the lyrics appear on a seveninch colour TFT screen). There are also two mics so you can team up with a mate if you're lacking in confidence. Assistant editor Claire and freelance writer Chris receive heaps of praise for their moving rendition of Take That's Never Forget - before clarifying that they were actually singing Queen's We Will Rock You.

INFINITY AND BEYOND

At this point, I ask the rest of the team if they want to try something that'll blow their minds. As a nervous hush falls over the party, I slip out into the back room, before returning a few minutes later with... a PlayStation VR headset. It wasn't so long ago that virtual reality was a lonely place; once you'd attached those crummy handmade goggles to your eyes, it was you and you alone who would partake in the experience (and by 'experience', I mean squinting your eyes so that you could tell if that thing behind you was the Eiffel Tower or just a lamppost).







but VR has come on in leaps and bounds over the past couple of years, and Sony's headset is a much more inclusive proposition; not only can you mirror on the TV what you're seeing on those lenses, giving your buddies the chance to experience those blood-spewing zombies, too; but on some games (such as launch title *The Playroom VR*), they can also play alongside you, albeit not in the virtual world. As it turns out, neither of those options beat staring at Warren, *T3*'s gaming expert, as he swats and swipes his Move Motion Controllers in front of his helmet, like The Stig on acid.

This sight becomes even more amusing once I get the disco started. Thankfully, I don't have to don a ridiculous oversized baseball cap and start talking like Nicey and Smashy's long-lost cousin (bonkers, mate!). In fact, I don't even need a set of decks. I can do it all via some products from the Bluesound high-res music-system range, and a few carefully placed Philips Hue lights. Central to my Bluesound set-up is the Vault 2. This solidly built 2TB unit (it looks like a safe!) will store high-res music downloaded - via your mobile device - from the likes of TIDAL, Spotify and Qobuz; as well as any CDs that you've ripped (there's a CD slot on the front). Further music can be streamed from internet radio, and you can distribute all of the above to further Bluesound speakers dotted around your gaff (I used the Pulse 2 and the Pulse Mini). There's no sign of lag as my music is pumped from room to room, with Kajagoogoo's Greatest Hits

sounding crisp and punchy at all times (some might say that's a bad thing).

I teamed this Eighties soundtrack with some suitably kaleidoscope lighting from Philips. The Hue Bloom and the Hue Go table lamps are each capable of projecting 16 million shades of colour onto your wall (cosmic!), and both can be controlled via the companion app - you can even set them so that they change colours to the beat of your music. The only real difference between the two is that the Hue Go can be used as a portable lamp its rechargeable battery should be good for three hours of use - plus, the Hue Go also gives you a bunch of 'natural dynamic lighting effects'. Our favourite is Night Adventure, which might well sound like an intense 1970s porn film but actually adds some chilled ambience to proceedings.

With the party in full swing, and everyone having thrown a few shapes on the dance floor (I can't tell if Luke's is a hexagon or a dodecahedron), I decide that now is a good time to take a selfie – and HTC's new U Ultra phone is the perfect way to do it. A feature called UltraPixel gives you unparalleled 4x light sensitivity – ideal for capturing detail (smudged lipstick, vomit stains, that kind

of thing) in darker settings. Another called Live Makeup smooths the subjects' skin in real time. And you can set the camera to take pictures whenever someone says cheese (not ideal if you work on a cheese counter). Then, once your selfie is taken, you can admire your handiwork on the U Ultra's glorious 5.7-inch liquid-surface display.

Speaking of liquid surfaces, the blearyeyed faces on the picture lead me to think that someone might soon yack-up on the kitchen worktop. And seeing as it's not my kitchen, that's good enough reason to call time on *T3*'s tech party. It's been a blast and I've learned a few things today. For one, you don't need alcohol to have a good time - but you need it to have a brilliant time. Secondly, Kajagoogoo really should consider making a comeback. And finally, some cool tech can have a wondrous effect on gatherings such as these, helping your guests to mix cocktails like bartenders, dance like West End stars and take selfies like pro photographers. Right, I'm off to find some tech to help me sleep.

Ahead of the game

NAVDY'S FUTURISTIC HEADS-UP DRIVING DISPLAY COULD BE THE ULTIMATE IN-CAR UPGRADE FOR PEOPLE WHO LOVE TECH AND CARS - BUT IS IT WORTH THE SUBSTANTIAL OUTLAY?

t 73, we're always on the hunt for the next big thing – tech that could potentially change our lives for the better – and we might've just found it. Cue Navdy, a gadget for people who love driving cars. Billed as the world's first augmented driving device (or a heads-up display, as we prefer to call it), Navdy mounts on your dash and projects a display onto a transparent screen in your line of sight, enabling you to see crucial driving data – think speed, navigation and more – with just a glance.

But why would you want that? Well, for one, it should make it quicker and easier to see what's going on, and this should make for safer driving. And since Navdy is a hands-free system, it's legal to use, too, meaning you won't get a painful fine and penalty points slapped onto your licence for brandishing your phone mid-drive.

That all sounds good, but we wouldn't blame you for thinking that

something this hi-tech is the reserve of the rich and famous. Not so - you can install Navdy in almost any car, new or (relatively) old. All your car needs is an OBD-II port - a standard feature on all cars built after 2001 for petrol engines, and 2004 for diesel.

Installing Navdy is straightforward – download the app, enter your vehicle's make and model, and it'll show you where to plug in the connector. Then find a space on the dash behind your steering wheel to attach the mount, and snap the heads-up display in place with its magnetic connector. Once you've paired your phone to Navdy, it'll automatically recognise it thereafter.

All good, then, but there's one minor caveat: Navdy is better if you have a car stereo with Bluetooth. This enables you to hook up your phone, and Navdy, to pipe sounds – such as voice guidance and music – through your speakers. It's not a deal breaker, as you could just use your phone's built-in speaker, but it's certainly

ABOVE Navdy is a stealthy bit of tech, blending in nicely with your car's dash (unless, that is, it's bright red) something to bear in mind if the most modern thing about your in-car entertainment is FM radio.

By owning a Navdy, you can bring an ordinary car kicking and screaming into the modern day, without it looking like you ram-raided a Halfords store. But with an asking price of £599, is it really worth having? With a degree of scepticism, you might think Navdy is just a glorified sat nav – but it can do so much more.

The most obvious of these features is the heads-up display. By projecting an image onto a transparent screen, you can see all of your driving data without taking your eyes off the wheel. It can, occasionally, distract if you're

playing with the settings, because. even with the smallest of glances, your attention isn't fully focused. But used sensibly, it makes for a safer drive.

The Navdy Dial - a steering-wheelmounted remote - adds to this ease of use. Placed within reach of your thumb, the remote's circular dial and single button enable you to navigate Navdy's menu quickly. A single press of the button selects an option, while a double press brings up your last-used app in the side screen. Getting it all to work together seamlessly can take several hours of driving, but once you get the hang of it, it's very intuitive.

The real party piece of Navdy's interface is gesture control. Whenever you receive a call or message, simply wave your hand left to accept it, or right to reject it. If you like to keep connected to your phone at all times

while you drive, but you don't want to be one of those phone-in-hand jerks, this is invaluable. It's just a shame the use of gestures isn't more widespread, as it's such an intuitive action.

While gestures will only work with specific notifications, Navdy can display more. Go into the Navdy app and you can choose which alerts -Glances, as Navdy calls them - you want to see. You can get updates from umpteen apps, such as breaking tweets and even eBay notifications. Some might say this is overkill, but you can always choose how much to see.

If you get bored of using gestures, you can always tap into Navdy's voice control, whether it's Siri or Google Now - just long-press the steeringwheel button and ask Navdy to call or text someone. It works well, unless you've got a face-full of Greggs.

You can also control how you receive notifications - whether it's reading the content aloud, only displaying it on screen, or both. We found that going for voice only makes it easy to handle a large number of notifications while driving. Controlling each notification wasn't always straightforward, though; occasionally, you'd dismiss one, only for it to pop back up again seconds later.

Considering the small screen on offer, Navdy is able to display quite a lot of information. The speedometer and rev counter get pride of place in the centre, naturally, while the left and right side show different kinds of driving data, such as date, MPG and fuel remaining; and you can scroll through them using the circular wheel. You can also adjust each side independently of the other, which

enables you to change what you see on screen - though swapping sides is trickier to do, requiring a few button presses within the menu. The right side also serves as a space for new notifications and quick controls, enabling you to control what you see.

No driving companion worth its salt would be complete without the offering of route guidance, and Navdy does just that. Routes can only be started from the phone – which is somewhat annoying if you want to drive to a new route without pulling over. When navigation starts, the screen changes to a 3D map, your current route highlighted in blue. Your speedo remains in the corner of the screen, or you can choose the standard view, relegating the navigation particulars to a side screen – still useable but less intrusive.

Navigation is basic; you get neat features like being able to search for nearby points of interest, which Navdy will take you to (though results were limited). Navdy will also navigate you to a fuel stop when your tank gets low. But overall, it lacks polish compared with standalone sat navs. Even Google Maps is more substantial.

Elsewhere, Navdy's most promising function is its ability to play music from your phone. Presently, a plethora of music apps are officially supported, including iTunes and Spotify, and Navdy will, in theory, support thirdparty apps by virtue of the Bluetooth connection piping tunes through your speakers, but you won't be able to actually control the music. The interface is rather rudimentary there's play and pause, and you can skip forward a track using the control wheel. Navdy will also show you the album artwork in the quick-launch screen, but you can't actually browse your music library or, heaven forbid, choose a song you like. Until Navdy broadens the functionality of its music interface, you'll need a substantial playlist for those epic road trips.

Navdy's screen looks impressive, but when you've been staring at a 557ppi screen on your Galaxy S7 all day, you can't help but feel it could be crisper around the edges. The bright, bold screen is easy to read, day or night (eye-searing conditions notwithstanding). Navdy has catered for folks of all sizes, with a choice of three mounts to raise or lower it. Annoyingly, the taller mounts make Navdy wobble slightly while driving, meaning the display vibrates just a touch. The standard mount is rocksolid, though. Short people win.

So Navdy isn't without its foibles, then. Does that make it an overpriced in-car gadget; a solution to a problem that doesn't exist? After all, most modern cars these days are already ABOVE Navdy

equipped with satellite navigation and a media player – and, heck, you could just look at your dashboard if you need to know how fast you're going.

We say no. Though there's no doubt the firmware needs beefing up to make it a more complete package, Navdy offers something genuinely unique, and that's what makes it *T3*-worthy. The standout feature here is undoubtedly the heads-up display, which beams data right into your view. It's supremely slick and when you add up all its capabilities, you realise just how invaluable it is; and that once you start using it, you won't be able to do without it – especially if you drive lots of miles. Navdy makes driving safer and, ultimately, more enjoyable.

→ Discover your inner Californian with this good-looking, e-powered longboard. Belt-driven motors dish out up to 1,800 watts of power, resulting in a hair-raising 18mph top speed in Sport mode. Control comes via a basic Bluetooth remote with a simple throttle/brake lever. The agile board can turn on a dime, eats 25-per-cent gradients for breakfast, and delivers a smooth, consistent ride through its 15-mile range. The built-in handle is a nice touch, while a USB port means you can also charge your smartphone or tablet on the go.



The ride is comfy once you're on the move, with the steering responsive and predictable. Flat battery? No drama - the E-60 2 works as a regular skateboard, too.

Operation couldn't be simpler: glide forwards and backwards by tilting your feet, and left and right by leaning your knees into the height-adjustable control bar. The 10mph top speed is sedate but never sluggish, even when travelling uphill, and a single battery will clock up around 14 miles. Anti-theft tech makes it harder to pinch, while headlights and turning indicators are ideal for night riding.

urvival horror, that old moniker first bandied around 20 years ago with the first

Resident Evil, has never felt more appropriate than it does now when playing in first-person with a PSVR strapped to your face. If you've been sitting on the fence regarding Sony's budget-priced headset, this will be the game to convince you of VR's bright future in encounter-based gaming.

Capcom has previously dabbled with first person viewpoints with the likes of both the Resident Evil: Survivor and Chronicles light-gun spin-off games. A mixed bag to be sure, but this latest instalment seems to hit the nail on the head - as Resident Evil 4 did in 2005 when it switched from the established fixed-camera angles to the overthe-shoulder viewpoint most action shooters have since adopted.

With the demise of *PT* – Konami's briefly-glimpsed, but much-loved

playable demo - Capcom has resurrected its essence in styling. Gone are the Zombies and infected Spanish villagers of the previous escapades, as RE7 introduces you to the Baker family and their delightful, yet dilapidated, plantation retreat. Every derelict location, from the beginning's abandoned cabin to the maze-like mansion, will send a shiver of terror down your spine. When played in the VR mode these local's become all too real, as Capcom has chosen to depict a realistic world setting. And it all seems a bit too plausible - the Bakers are a messy bunch and you'll baulk at the grime and decay they dwell in.

Filling the boots of Ethan, an average bloke in search of his missing wife Mia, the player has become the average man. You play not an elite member of S.T.A.R.s, a police Special Tactics and Rescue team, but an average joe. A wise move by *Capcom* that actually places you closer to the scares that



will permeate a very vulnerable state of mind as you play. It doesn't really help that Ethan is weaponless for a significant amount of the beginning act, either.


By the end of the first hour you'll be asking yourself why in holy hell you would enter a dank basement that's obviously home to a bunch of lunatics, but enter it you do. Creeping forward, as you would in real life, installs a sense of preparation for the ensuing horror, but the game has you right where it wants you and some cheap jump scares may cause you to let out more than a few screams.

Taking pointers from classic horror films, players will encounter familiar scenarios, with elements

from *The Texas Chainsaw Massacre*, *The Exorcist*, *The Thing*, and even elements from the *Ring* films for good measure. Drawing upon Capcom's rich Resi heritage, you will discover that the Baker family members are far from the stereotypical southerners you first assume them to be.

Doing battle with the likes of Jack, Marguerite and their son Lucas may seem straightforward enough, but when you're without a weapon things take on a deadly game of hide-and-seek. And it's absolutely terrifying when played in virtual reality. We found ourselves dipping in and out of the VR experience for sanity's sake – it really is that scary! It's worth noting that, for the time

Zimmer-framed zombie hunters will no doubt encounter a sense of déja vu, as the Baker abode feels eerily reminiscent of the original's Spencer mansion, complete with secrets, puzzles and traps. *RE7* is a true return to form for Capcom, and a real highlight for VR enthusiasts.

eam Ninja, having witnessed the success of From Software's Souls series, have set out to carve their own slice of the dungeon crawler pie by sticking the meat of a Souls game in a blender along with their own critically acclaimed Ninja Gaiden DNA. Added to this they've topped it off with a sprinkling of Geralt from the Witcher 3, but is it enough to produce a heavyweight contender to the Dark Souls trilogy?

In reality, what's emerged is a sharp and solid take on From Software's established formula. Nioh's atmosphere is every bit as moody, with graphical and audio ambience serving up some dire environments that ingrain a sense of dread at every turn. Players who seek solace in the genre will no doubt feel a connectivity to this new dark world; not quite a hellish realm, but more of an alternative historical nightmare, set in a fictional Elizabethan era/Japanese Sengoku period.

Starting as a western prisoner held in the Tower of London may seem like an odd plot premise for a game spouting Samurai sentimentality, and very close to the bone when compared to the first *Dark Souls* game, but it helps set an international footing that supports the mission-

based structure as opposed to an open-world setting.

Starting off barefoot in a pair of medieval y-fronts isn't the most effective or inconspicuous way of escaping prison, and it's not long before William's pirate skills are used to pilfer clothing and armour from bested guards, or by rooting through a few lost-and-found chests that dot the prison. During the intro mission, and throughout the game, you'll need to equip or replace armour regularly, but every piece requires special attention as each has its own diverse stats and perks; attention to all categories is vital, as player's will require all the defensive help that

Weapon variants pool from Gaijin, Samurai and Ninjutsu armaments. Equally they require careful thought as wielding dual swords for example may look the part; enabling rapid consecutive attacks, but they ultimately lack the power needed to take down harder adversaries.

Ki energy is central to combat: it's essentially a stamina gauge, but it's vital in battle. Both offensive and defensive actions will quickly deplete it, leaving William open to attack, often ending in your swift demise.

For those put off by the Souls series reputation, Nioh offers a great training experience. That's not to say this is easy going – far from it! However, there's a gratifying flow to combat as your character deftly slices and dices his way through adversaries. It'll entice you back, death after frustrating death, but this isn't some hack 'n' slash affair. Discipline is paramount, but when you master both stance and rhythm the game really comes into its stride.

Uerdict

WHAT'S UP WITH THE **NEXT GENERATION** OF SMARTWATCHES?

Standalone apps

→ Previous generations of Android Wear relied on your handset for much of the muscle and for hosting a decent portion of the data. Wear 2.0 puts apps right on your wrist, and implements a standalone app store accessible from the watch. This makes Wi-Fi and (in some cases) cellular connectivity ever more important, and also means that iPhone owners won't be stuck with crippled Wear devices.

Updated design

→ A curved, vertical app selector, brought up via the side button, now featues, as opposed to the left/right swiping of previous versions. There are new options for input, from canned messages to swipe-typing (though we can't imagine this will be hugely useful given the small screens on offer), and card notifications that won't entirely obscure the watchface.

Expanded watchfaces

→ Google is introducing a new system called 'complications', which enables apps to interface directly with watchfaces to bring you the data you need in an instant. While the name might be a little prescient - there's sure to be a bit of infighting over which apps can put things in which places - it'll add a new level of interactivity and usefulness with each wrist raise.

It's here!

→ LG's Watch Style and Watch Sport are the first two Wear 2.0 devices to hit the high street. Stacks more are set to follow, and the upgraded OS will roll out to a number of older devices, too. Don't expect it on everything the original Moto 360 won't get it, for example, though it's set to hit the second-generation model.






