To the student

Reading is very important to help you learn English. It is also a lot of fun. But to learn as much as you can from reading, it is important to read different kinds of English. For example, the English you need when you read a train timetable is very different from the English you need when you read a story. This book has a lot of different kinds of English.

There are six sections in the book:

Section 1 is Messages: In this section somebody wants to send information in writing to somebody else. There is a test on menus and another on timetables. There is also a test on text messages and another on e-mails.

Section 2 is People: In this section all the tests are about people, in different ways. For example, there is an informal letter between friends. There is formal English in a biography. There is a CV and a job application that you can use as models to help with your writing, as well as testing your reading.

Section 3 is Places: In this section, too, many different styles of English are shown, some informal and some formal. There is the informal English of a holiday postcard. There is also the formal English of a novel – like all the fiction extracts in the book it was written by me – and a formal letter of complaint.

Section 4 is Things: You will find some descriptive writing in this section. There are descriptions of clothes and of a computer. There are more examples of letters, including an informal letter thanking someone for a present. And there is a test about buying and booking on the Internet.

Section 5 is Fiction: There are many different kinds of fiction in this section, from an adventure story to jokes, a comic and a cartoon. There are also (as in other sections) examples of American and British English.

Section 6 is Fact: This section has different kinds of newspaper stories, an encyclopaedia entry, a recipe and advice on how to survive an earthquake.

You can read these tests in any order you like. You can do a complete section or jump about between sections. You can do all the tests with a fiction text, or all the tests with a letter text or a newspaper text, or all the tests with a formal or informal text. Or you can do the ones you like best first. Who knows, maybe you will like the others too, when you do them!

I enjoyed writing this book and I hope you enjoy using it.

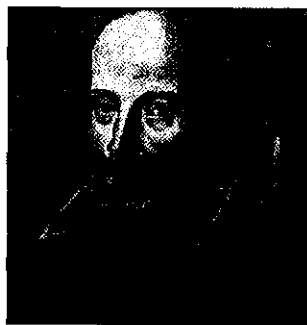
William Shakespeare (1564–1616)

William Shakespeare was born in Stratford-upon-Avon in 1564. His mother was called Mary Arden. She came from a rich family. His father, John, was a businessman who sold gloves, wool and meat. William went to Stratford Grammar School where he learned a little Latin and Greek. He married Anne Hathaway in 1582. She was eight years older than him. They had three children, Susannah, born in 1583, and the twins Judith and Hamnet, born in 1585. There are no descendants of the Shakespeare family alive today.

It is possible that in 1587 William Shakespeare joined a group of travelling actors and left Stratford because he was in trouble for stealing a deer but nobody is sure if this is true or if the date is correct.

By 1592 he was definitely an actor and playwright in London. In 1599 the Globe Theatre opened in London and most of his 36 or 37 plays were performed there. Nobody is sure exactly how many plays Shakespeare wrote.

The Globe was made of wood. It was round. There was no roof, so if it rained the audience and the actors got wet. The audience stood on three sides of the stage. They were not quiet, as theatre audiences are today. They made a lot of noise, and sometimes they had sword fights. They also ate oranges because of the bad smell everywhere.



Shakespeare wrote three kinds of play: comedies, tragedies and histories. The comedies had happy endings, the tragedies had sad endings (like *Hamlet*) and the histories told the story of the past, either in England (like *Henry V*) or in ancient Rome (like *Julius Caesar*).

Although there were other successful playwrights at the time – especially Christopher Marlowe – Shakespeare was recognized in his own lifetime as one of the finest playwrights of his time. By 1597 he was rich enough to buy New Place, the finest house in Stratford.

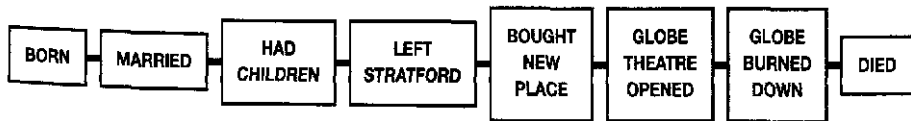
In 1613 the Globe burned down during a performance of Shakespeare's *Henry VIII*. The following year Shakespeare retired and went back to New Place in Stratford. In 1616 he died of a fever and he is buried in Holy Trinity Church, Stratford.

In his will he left his wife his second-best bed. This may mean that he did not love his wife very much but it may also mean that he was trying to avoid paying death duties.

I'm a bit of a computer fan so I have lots of toys like a scanner, that I don't really need. I don't play computer games, though! Next to the computer there's my CD player, which really is important to me. I play everything from Vivaldi to the Beatles but I do like rock music, played loudly.

All around the walls you can see my past. I'm a hoarder – I never throw anything away. You can see certificates I got when I was at school on the walls. And there are photos from a lot of my plays. There are no pictures of me, though. I don't want to see my ugly face when I'm learning my lines or writing.

And now I'll tell you what *isn't* in my room. Because I think you can learn as much about a person from what is not in his room as from what is there. There is no television. There isn't a television in the house. Enough said! And there are no photographs of other people, except actresses and actors who have been in my plays. There's an old saying, you know: 'He walks farthest who walks alone.'

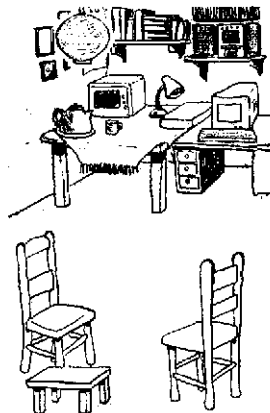

As late as World War II there were kids in the town who couldn't walk properly because they didn't get any vitamins. Rickets they called it. You could see little kids limping down the town's main street with rickets.

The main street was about all there was of Moxton, too. The houses on either side of it were one line of tiny cottages, all covered in black from the mine. When you walked in you were right in the main room. There was no hall or anything. There was a tin bath in the main room where the miner father washed himself in the evening, after his wife had heated up the water and carried it in.

35 Autobiography: describing scenery

This is an extract from *If I Can Make It Anybody Can* by Victoria Rothésay.

After I left Debrecen I walked for days and put up my tent at night. An old couple driving a horse and cart stopped and spoke to me. I tried out my broken Hungarian and they laughed. But it was obvious they were offering me a lift, so I got up on the cart, with my backpack and tent. They offered me some fiery apricot liqueur, home-made by the look of it. We drank it from the bottle.

The land was flat. You could see forever. You could see as far as the future. At first we could still see the Hortobagy River, brown in the weak sunshine, and carpets of sunflowers. But then, as we jolted along a track in the cart, there was just the *puszta* – the dry Great Plain of Hungary. It's where the Hungarians grow their wheat and catch their wild horses.

A Hungarian poet once said that the earth and the sky are one in the *puszta*. I understand what he means. As far as you can see in every direction, the sky comes down and touches the land. This dry yellow land is not beautiful in the usual sense, but being in it, being part of it, I felt a great sense of peace. I have always hated mountains and skyscrapers because they are bigger than I am. But this ... When I lay down and watched the *puszta* from the back of the cart, it was like being in a great safe flat bed that had no sides but just went on forever. It was then, at that moment, that I felt I could do anything in the world that I wanted. I was eighteen years old.

Then, in the distance, we saw the horses. At first there was just a cloud of dust. Then, suddenly, about ten small, wiry, brown Hungarian wild horses charged across the Great Plain. They got near enough for me to see them tossing their heads. Two *csikos*, Hungarian cowboys, were chasing them. The cowboys saw the cart and shouted something. The old man shouted something back and he and the old woman laughed. They said something to me in Hungarian, probably trying to explain what the cowboys had said.

I fell asleep. When I woke up, the horses and the two *csikos* had gone but nothing about the scenery had changed. We were still moving forward but it was as if we had stopped.

I didn't want us ever to arrive anywhere. I wanted to stay on that cart in the Great Plain forever. But at the same time I knew that when the journey was over, everything was going to be just fine. And it was.

How to survive an earthquake

1. If you are indoors, stay there!

Get under a desk or a table and hold onto it, or move into a doorway. The next best place is in a hallway or against an inside wall. Stay away from windows and heavy furniture or appliances. Get out of the kitchen, which is a dangerous place. Do not run downstairs or rush outside while the building is shaking or while there is danger of falling and hurting yourself or being hit by falling glass or debris.

- Put out fires in your home or neighborhood immediately.
- Shut off the gas if broken pipes or odor cause you to suspect a gas leak.
- Do not use matches, lighters, camp stoves, barbecues, electrical equipment or appliances until you are sure there are no gas leaks.
- Shut off electrical power if there is any damage to house wiring.

2. If you are outside, get into the open.

Get away from buildings, power lines, chimneys and anything else that might fall on you.

3. If you are driving, stop carefully.

Move your car as far out of traffic as possible. Do not stop on or under a bridge or under trees, streetlights, power lines or signs. Stay inside your car until the shaking stops.

4. After the quake stops, check for injuries and apply the necessary first aid or seek help.

Do not attempt to move seriously injured people. Cover them with blankets and get medical help for serious injuries.

5. Check for hazards.

- If you can, put on a pair of sturdy thick-soled shoes (in case you step on broken glass, debris, etc.).

6. Check food and water supplies.

Do not eat or drink anything from open containers near broken glass. If the power is off, plan meals to use up frozen foods or foods that will spoil quickly. Food in the freezer should be good for at least twenty-four to forty-eight hours. If the water is off, you can drink from water heaters, melted ice cubes or canned vegetables. Avoid drinking from swimming pools.

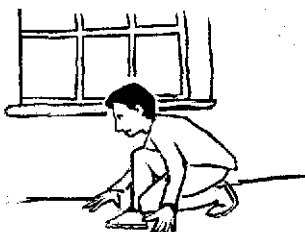
7. Be prepared for aftershocks.

Another quake, larger or smaller, may follow. Use your telephone only for a medical or fire emergency – you could tie up lines needed for emergency response.

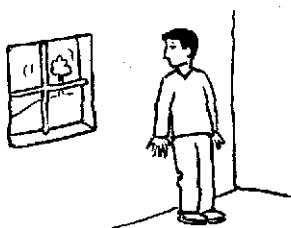

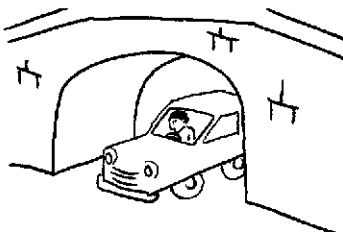

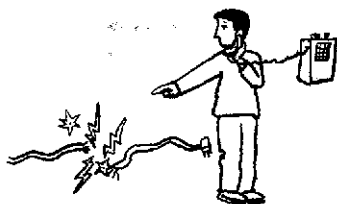

EMPTY! – No oil as the first hospitals and schools are hit

B **BRITAIN HAS NEARLY STOPPED**
TODAY, only the second day of the
oil crisis. Despite the warning given by
Prime Minister Tony Blair, many of
Britain's oil refineries are still blocked
by lorries, tractors and taxis.

Lorry drivers angry at the price of petrol
have again stopped petrol tankers from
leaving oil refineries in Wales, the north-
west and Essex. The drivers are angry at
petrol prices. At 80p per litre Britain has the
highest prices in Europe and 60.82p of the
price goes to the government in tax.

'I employ twenty people and I'm going
out of business,' says haulage contractor
Jim Sowerbuts of Lincoln, one of the
people blocking the Immingham refinery
on the east coast. 'We cannot make a living
with petrol at these prices. It's impossible.
It makes goods dearer for the consumer.
And Britain is an oil producer. It's mad.'

Britain has run out of petrol very quickly.
Today well over 1,000 of Britain's 8,000
filling stations ran dry and even more are
out of unleaded petrol – the most popular
choice. Among those affected today:

- *Hospitals are running out of beds
because patients cannot get home either
by ambulance or by taxi.*

- *Operations are being postponed because
only nurses who live within walking
distance of hospital or who use public
transport can get in.*
- *There are fears that hospitals will run
out of blood.*
- *Supermarkets report that people are
buying more tinned goods – stockpiling
in case food cannot be delivered.*
- *Some areas of the country, such as
Cumbria in the north-west, have almost
no public transport services. They are
now virtually cut off from the rest of the
country and there are fears for food
supplies in this and similar areas.*

In a statement yesterday Tony Blair said that
however strongly people felt about petrol
prices this was not the way to get them
down. He said that no government could
give in to pressure like this. He explained
that recent rises in petrol prices were due to
an increase in crude oil prices (to 15.46p
per litre), not an increase in government tax.

He then said that Britain would be 'on
the way back to normal' within twenty-
four hours.

Unfortunately for Mr Williams, who has two children, the story will not go away yet.

Gloria Latrobe has been on coast-to-coast television in the US, telling the story again and again. The day after she got the tip, Miss Latrobe described Mr Williams as 'a very nice English gentleman.' Even now she says, 'I hope his family isn't angry with him.'

They're off!

Sydney 2000, the long-awaited Millenium Olympic Games, started here in Sydney yesterday. It is HUGE. It is HERE. And it is OURS.

Australians in every corner of the land felt proud as Aboriginal runner Cathy Freeman, who won the 400 metres silver medal in Atlanta four years ago, held up the famous Olympic torch in the opening ceremony at the 110,000-seat Olympic Stadium.

And our pride grew as thirteen-year-old Nikki Webster sang *Under Southern Skies*. And when the tiny figure in her pink dress sang the last line – 'Every child can be a hero if the world can live as one.' – we all felt hope and optimism and we make no apology to anyone for that.

Our Games has 10,000 athletes competing in 28 sports. We have nearly 300 events at 36 venues watched by 250,000 spectators and a predicted audience of 3.5 billion TV viewers worldwide. The 27th Olympics is the biggest yet and every one of us hopes it will be the best.

And who's the best and brightest of our medal hopes? The Sydney Globe nominates the Torpedo – seventeen-year-

old Ian Thorpe, the local boy from right here in Sydney. The boy who brought the glory back to Australian swimming is in with a shout for four gold medals: in the 200m and 400m freestyle and the 4 x 100m and 4 x 400m relays.

Thorpe, you will remember, was the youngest Australian since the 1950s to swim for our country when he represented Australia at the age of fourteen. Since then he's broken 10 world records. Competitors like Thorpe are what the Olympics is all about. He laughs when people put his success down to his admittedly enormous hands and feet. He puts it all down to hard work. He starts his training at 4.15 a.m.

Where else can we look for success? Well, tomorrow 15,000 people will gather at the State Hockey Centre at Olympic Park to see if our women's hockey team can take the gold medal for the third time in four Olympics, as they are expected to do. In seven fantastic years under coach Ric Charlesworth the Hockeyroos have won 191 games and lost just 24. Our team are in Pool A along with Argentina, Great Britain, South Korea and Spain.

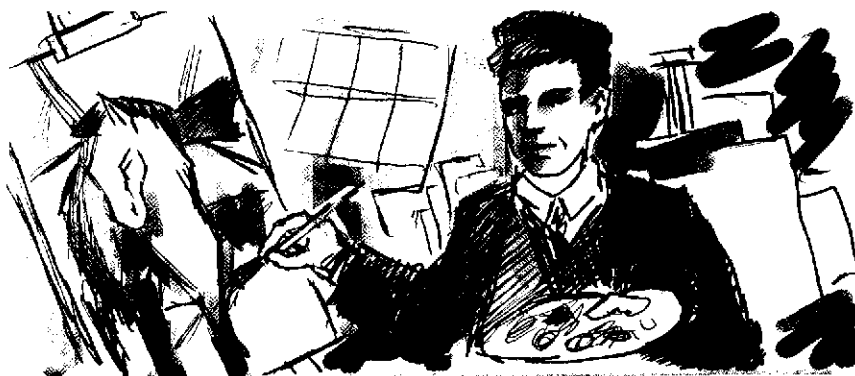
Franz Marc

Biography

Franz Moritz Wilhelm Marc was born on 8 February 1880 in Munich, Germany. He was the second son of the Munich landscape painter Wilhelm Marc and his wife Sophie. After deciding not to become a priest he studied art in Munich but broke off his studies after a visit to Paris in 1903 where he was fascinated by French Impressionism, though he disagreed with it. In 1907 he married Marie Schnur, also a Munich painter, who had an illegitimate child with an earlier partner. She and Marc divorced in 1908. An early painting *Schlick, the dog, jumping* was a Christmas present to his mother in that year. In 1910 Marc joined a group of painters based in Munich called *The Blue Rider*, whose best known member was the Russian-born Wassily Kandinsky. In 1911 he married another Munich painter called Maria Franck in London. On 4 March 1916 Marc was killed at the battle of Verdun.

Marc's early painting and drawing were realistic studies of horses, in the style he had learned at the Academy in Munich. He was particularly interested in animals moving, at this time. The early oil painting, *Schlick, the dog, jumping*, belongs to this period. He was also interested in landscape from an early age. But when he joined *The Blue Rider* group he became fascinated by colour. From then on he painted animals, especially horses, as part of the landscape. In the beautiful *Horse in the Landscape* (1910) the horse is not moving. It is part of a beautiful, mainly yellow and green, landscape. The lines of the horse and the lines of the landscape are one.

In *Horse in the Landscape* the horse was still its 'natural' colour – brown. But in 1911 Marc painted the first of a series of paintings called *Blue Horse*. The daring idea was that this particular horse's true colour was blue because blue was the colour of strength, dignity and courage. Blue, for Marc, was the masculine colour. The feminine colour was yellow and in 1912 Marc painted *The Little Yellow Horses*. Three beautiful, graceful yellow horses are again part of the landscape, totally at one with it.

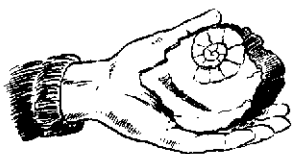

Charles Darwin (1809–1882)

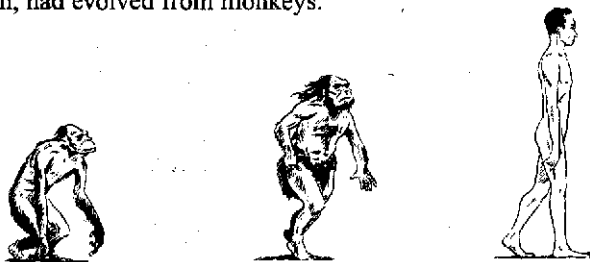
Before Darwin's book *On the Origin of Species* (1859) people believed that everything in the world was created at the same time. They believed that every animal and plant had always been the same and had not changed in any way.



Fossils in a rock

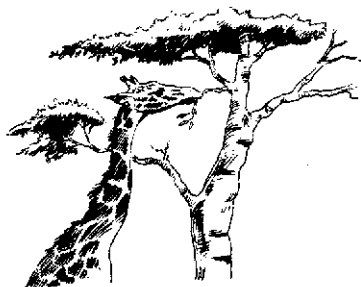
Then Darwin looked at rocks. In the rocks were fossils – life ‘frozen’ in the rock. The newest fossils were at the top of the rock. But as Darwin looked under them he found older and older life forms, until at the bottom of the rock he found animals that no longer lived in the world at all.

The old fossils, deep in the rock, had changed into the newer fossils at the top. This slow change was known as evolution. All species, that is all plants and animals, evolved – changed. Most famously, he said that our species, *homo sapiens*, man, had evolved from monkeys.



Darwin thought that man evolved from monkeys.

Darwin also asked himself why evolution happened in one direction and not another. His answer was an idea called ‘the survival of the fittest’. For example, the giraffe with the longest neck would survive because it can reach the tops of trees and so it can find food. Because it can find food, that giraffe would live long enough to have young giraffes, which would be born with long necks.



A giraffe reaches the top branches of the tree with its long neck.



The young giraffe has a long neck, too.
