oile de Jouy has been part of traditional decorating since clothdyeing ace Christophe-Philippe Oberkampf turned his printing press loose on cotton fabric near the banks of the Bièvre River in 1759. His groundbreaking technology-with copper plates that allowed for fine lines and light and shade effectsopened up a world of design possibilities that went far beyond the era's ubiquitous florals and geometrics. Celebrated artists turned out pastoral scenes that captured the imagination of decorators in Europe and Colonial America. Centuries later, those classic looks remain a design staple. But traditional patterns and shades of red, blue, green, or black on a white background are no longer the only toiles in town. Fresh twists have reinvigorated this old favorite.

verything started with a trip to the local art store over lunch. That's where North Carolinian Louise Gaskill, who had built a 20-yearslong career in software sales, signed up to learn the craft of gold leafing so she could embellish frames for her collection of original artwork.

"I had always loved taking things apart, then redoing and refinishing them, especially furniture," explains Gaskill. "I learned the process of gilding and experimented with different finishes. By the time a year had passed, I had refined my look."

Gaskill's art class lunch trips paid off a lot more than a seat for the daily soup-and-salad special would have. Today, she's the visionary behind a custom lighting company that modernizes vintage art glass by deconstructing it from its original lighting configuration, then reimagining it into new fixtures that prove relevant for current design.

"I committed to only buying vintage glass because new didn't feel right to me," Gaskill says. "But just because something is old doesn't mean that it's quality or good. I pluck only the best elements of the fixtures I buy for reuse. And the result is one-of-akind lighting."

Gaskill's Raleigh workshop does far more than house the vast inventory she's built over 16 years. It is like a museum for lighting parts. Shelves display vintage art glass in a rainbow of colors from jeweltone Italian Murano specimens to the elegant white or clear seeded examples from Germany. Drawers are organized and filled with intricately fabricated metal parts including top canopies, prisms, chains, bobeches, and candle cups.

While it's true that no two pieces of Gaskill's are the same, there is a unifying look to each lamp, sconce, and chandelier. For instance, there's no "either/or" when it comes to selecting a gold or silver finish for the metal parts. Gaskill incorporates both colors into every fixture she designs to ensure its timelessness.

And you won't find any casino-like crystals dripping by the hundreds from the frames. The art glass is Gaskill's focus, so any embellishments she adds have to complement that main component. "I don't like fussy curves with a lot going on," she says. "I counteract highly ornamented components with a streamlined frame. For me, the more simple the better.



Artist at work Gaskill fashions prisms onto the "Mia" chandelier using two pieces of Murano glass that were initially stacked on a lamp in the opposite direction. Italian and German glass compose Gaskill's inventory, and are used for the body of each fixture. Gilded rings dangle prisms. Circular metal arms swirl into white Murano glass with blue spots. New and vintage chains provide length to chandeliers. "I buy pieces with parts not meant for lighting," says Gaskill. "I once bought an old chair and incorporated its brass casters into a piece of lighting. I look at things with a different eye now." Opposite A collection of chandelier cups secures sockets. A once black, midcentury, crown-like ornament was given a regal lift with a new gold-leaf finish. Vintage components, such as decorative caps, were made in standard sizes, so they stack easily on reconfigured fixtures. Originally the top part of a large chandelier, a brass, crystal, and cobalt piece will be disassembled and reborn as a lamp.





Artfully Buttoned-Up

An artist finds meaning in discarded buttons that she fashions into mesmerizing artwork

n the hands of Ran Hwang, buttons and straight pins turn into works of art. She painstakingly pounds tens of thousands—even a million—of them into panels to create plum blossoms, phoenixes, the Buddha, Korean rooftops, and other exquisite wall compositions and multimedia installations that are coveted by collectors like Roger Federer, the Brooklyn Museum, and Robert J. Hurst, chairman of the Whitney Museum's executive committee.

Sometimes, she fixes the buttons tight against the surface; often, she leaves space for the buttons to move freely. She may also use colored thread or beads or colored pa-

per characters in her designs. For a commission at the ultra-modern, dhow-shaped Dubai Opera House, which opened in August 2016, she made a shimmering chandelier with a spiderweb design that includes more than 50,000 crystals.

Like fresh flowers or French bonbons, Hwang's works are hard to resist. "Her work is so beautiful and so well-crafted," says Laura Thompson, the director of education and a curator at the Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Art, which has twice shown Hwang's work. *Untethered*, the more recent piece, is a 140-foot-long sculpture of buttons and pins featuring 14

birds, including six phoenixes, interwoven with metallic spiderwebs.

Arnold Lehman, former director of the Brooklyn Museum, first took notice of one of her "cherry tree" pieces at Leila Heller Gallery in Manhattan. "I was even more taken by an amazing re-creation of traditional-style Korean roofs in what seemed a somewhat more abstracted work," he says. It's now in the museum's collection.

But there is more to her work than visual appeal. "It also has a powerful, simple message, about hopefulness and about freedom and the limitations of freedom," Thompson says.

Oddly enough, it was 9/11 that brought out Hwang's true talent. Born in Busan, South Korea, she started out there as a painter of landscapes and still lifes. In 1997, she moved to New York intent on developing her own style, but after studying at the School of Visual Arts, she took a job designing embroidery in the fashion industry—a throwback to her childhood habit of making hats, shoes, and clothing for paper dolls.

Deeply affected by the terrorist attacks, she yearned to have a greater impact. She left fashion to make art that would impart meaning about ephemerality and eternity as well as convey a sense of spirituality. "I grew up in a Buddhist family," she explained one day last summer in her New York studio. Looking chic in black pants and top, with a red plastic flower bracelet on her arm and a matching red dome ring on her finger, she said, "I mix fashion images and Buddhist philosophy. Eastern style and Western style come together, and I make something new."

And whereas all that pounding—usually about 25 times per pin—in the assembly of

her pieces might seem tedious, for Hwang it has a Zen meditative quality that is integral to her practice.

These days, Hwang is so busy that she employs assistants to help with the pounding, and she divides her time between studios in Seoul and New York. "I get my ideas here," she says. "Seoul is like a factory."

Those ideas keep taking her in new directions. She started with vintage buttons, then began buying buttons to her taste from manufacturers, and now frequently orders handmade paper buttons. She has incorporated LED lights or video projections on some installations, changing their

colors and giving them more vitality. Lately, she has started working on more traditional, three-dimensional sculptural forms, though not departing far from her subject matter. Last summer, she was working on a mold for a bird's wing. It was too soon to tell how the wing would ultimately turn out, but there's little doubt that it would soar aesthetically. \blacksquare

Designer Tobi Fairley creates the perfect palette for her whole-house renovation

Tobi's Top Color Tips

Selecting paint colors can be tough, especially if you aren't a professional. Here's my advice to help you get the mix just right.



1. Let fabric be your guide. When I start on the design for a space, I always go to my fabric room first. Fabrics can set the tone and mood for an entire room

- **2. Get a jump-start from art.** I love to use original art. It makes a space unique and shows the personality of my clients. It can also be the perfect inspiration for the colors you use in a room.
- **3.** Make a paper delivery. Wallpaper is a fabulous way to bring color into a room. Use it as a jumping-off point for a room's palette, and paint the trim and ceiling to complement the pattern you choose.
- 4. Select paint color last. You read that right—I always choose my paint color last. Otherwise, you could choose a tone or hue that clashes with everything else in a room.

5. Look up. Because of my reputation for working with color, I think people expect that I use almost every hue in the spectrum. But I often stay in the lighter two or three squares on any paint swatch for my selections, instead of the darker tones near the bottom. The colors at the top of paint cards are the ones most people like, so that's my sweet spot.

And here's a bonus tip—go with colors you love! If they make you happy, then you know you're on the right track.

s a designer who's known for her use of color, naturally I took palette planning for my new house very seriously. Most important, I wanted to use colors my family and I love—and that fit this traditional-meets-modern house.

One trick in my color book is to ensure there is a common thread through a whole-house design. It might be a touch of blue in the hall to pick up the cobalt in the living room, or a gray trim in a dining room to complement charcoal cabinetry in an adjoining room. There should always be one thing that ties all the rooms in a home together—otherwise you can end up with a hodgepodge of color.

So how did I choose the colors in my new home? First, as I do with my clients, I took my family's favorite hues into consideration. We really love anything on the blue and green side of the spectrum, so I knew

those colors would be included. The one "through line" in my home is blue—there are shades of it in almost every room. But I also like to take some fashion-forward risks, so my favorite pinks and yellows are part of the palette too. Look for some color and pattern surprises when I give you the big reveal in a few months—like pink on my dining room ceiling.

Once I had a general idea of the colors that make each family member happy, I started to go through fabrics and patterns that would both fit our traditional home's design and be bold and modern. I love, love, *love* wallpaper—so for my entry and a powder room that's where I started with the design. I can't wait to show you some of those eye-popping selections!



"I've become focused on the Earth and what pressure and time have created within it," says Mayer. "Agate is interesting in its organic swirling beauty. I like to change the colorations of nature to combinations that might not be possible but make me swoon."

Moved by her water-evoking fabric pattern, Mayer designed an oceanic dinnerware, "Portofino," for this gathering. Oranges plucked from backyard trees and stacked into glass vases lend an indigenous twist. Coordinating napkins are made from a geometric pattern from another of her fabric collections.

A vibrant tablescape calls for recipes with equal visual splash. Coconut-crusted goat cheese and mini pizzas with vegetables started the food rainbow, sustained with sea bass topped with mango salsa and guava sauce, followed by a trio of refreshing sorbets.

garden doesn't have to be perfect," Maryellen McCulloch says, surveying the colorful perennial borders she's created around her hilltop home just west of Portland. "You have to let things happen." Among other things, that means if an interesting but uninvited plant shows up in one of her garden beds—say a tall mullein, which is usually regarded as a weed—Maryellen doesn't yank it out. She welcomes it to coexist with her plantings.

But, then, she's a woman who does a lot of welcoming, both horticulturally and socially.

Maryellen and her husband, Michael, a Portland-based architect, frequently host events at Westwind Farm Studio, their 80-acre spread overlooking the Tualatin Valley and Coast Range. Over the last dozen years the couple has transformed a former sheep farm into swaths of inviting and completely organic gardens, meadows, woodlands, and lavender fields.

Gardens have always been important to Maryellen, but the scope and scale of her efforts changed when she moved from the city to the farm. With its eye-popping views and 1978 Pietro Belluschi-designed house, the place had an instant and irresistible appeal. It also posed a challenge. What to do with all that land?

The transformation began when Mike designed a series of terraces on the south side of the house. From the first level, with its swimming pool, giant outdoor fireplace, and elegant pool house/yoga studio, the terraces rise up the hillside beside a small waterfall to a series of gardens filled with long-stemmed perennials and wildflowers that attract, shelter, and feed birds, bees, and butterflies. At the top is a greenhouse where

For their larger landscaping issues, the McCullochs consulted with John Greenlee, an expert on native and ornamental grasses. He provided a horticultural blueprint for restoring the property's meadows and forests. Guided by Greenlee, the McCullochs mowed down the thorny tangles of blackberry that had taken over the pastures and reseeded the land with native grasses and wildflowers. They saw an almost instant

decrease in invasive plants and an influx of birds, bees, and other pollinators.

At the edges of the meadows they put in borders of native plants that provide a succession of flowers, starting with hardy Pacific Coast irises in March and April and continuing with St. John's wort and fireweed in the summer and autumn.

The McCullochs are now restoring 40 acres of native forest below the meadows. Maryellen is sanguine about the loss of a few plants every year to elk and deer that love the cool shade of giant Douglas firs and

big-leaf maples. "My philosophy is, if you have 50 plants, the deer can have three of them," she says. "It's their land too."

Up from the forest, long rows of fragrant lavender blossom in shades of white, blue, and purple. During the annual Oregon Lavender Association Festival, visitors harvest lavender, make aromatic wreaths, sample lavender-infused cookies, and sniff homemade oils and sprays. It's all part of the gardens-are-for-sharing philosophy that reigns at Westwind Farm Studio. People, plants, animals—all are welcome here.

ho says you can't have it all? It is possible, at least in Deborah Roberts's Little Rock kitchen. Deborah dreamed of a high-functioning cook's kitchen. Getting dinner on the table every night for a family of six demands it. But she and husband Mike also entertain often—so Deborah yearned as well for a kitchen that looked good even as it was making her life more efficient.

To get that perfect combination, Deborah found the perfect design partner—her sister, interior designer Kimberly Harper.

"The biggest challenge," Harper says, "is Deborah wanted a view." She got it, courtesy of tall triple windows on the sink wall that bathe the spacious kitchen in natural light and allow Deborah to keep an eye on her young daughter when she's outside on the swing set or playing with the dogs.

The flip side to the great view is less space for upper cabinetry. But Harper compensated in style, using every inch of the opposite wall, which she filled with a soaring expanse of crown molding-capped custom cabinets, painted in soft blue.

Paneled doors on the cabinet wall also conceal a full-size refrigerator and a pair of freezer drawers, creating a cold-storage area that forms one of the kitchen's several smart work zones.

"Kimberly was so helpful with organization," Deborah says. "She planned out little stations—for cooking, for baking, for washing vegetables, for cleanup. It makes the kitchen work so well."

Slim racks beside the cooktop stow oils and spices. Drawers under the cooktop house pots and pans. An appliance garage hides Deborah's stand mixer. Pullout shelves in the island reveal pitchers and >

Range hood The Viking rangetop teams with a cast-stone hood and Walker Zanger basket-weave tile backsplash. Refrigerator A spacious Sub-Zero refrigerator is disguised by a stately panel that matches the cabinetry. A slim pullout rack keeps spices and oils at hand so there's no searching for ingredients—and assures Deborah doesn't have to step away from the rangetop when she's in the middle of whipping up her latest culinary creation.

glassware. Glass-front cabinets capping the window wall add lightness and sparkle while keeping everyday dishware at hand. "Everything has a place," Deborah says. "That makes my life easier."

Along with all that function, the kitchen also delivers plenty of beauty. Hand-crafted chandeliers by New Orleans artisan Julie Neill light the island. A custom caststone hood gracefully crowns the cooktop. And expanses of gleaming marble top the cabinets and island.

"Marble countertops were the first thing on my list," Deborah says. "I went to Memphis to see the marble and its veining in person rather than just rely on photos. It was like buying a piece of art."

The white marble pops against a backdrop of ethereal blue. "Deborah wanted blue," her sister says. "We went with soft blue on the cabinets and a blue that's two shades darker on the ceiling. It really makes the space feel light and airy."

Careful details bring the final, jewelry-like layer to the well-dressed space. X-motifs on the island base and on glass-front cabinets are echoed by the design of custom bar stools. Oversize hardware that balances the size of the space interjects subtle shimmer.

"Kimberly took all my big-picture ideas and figured out the details to give me the kitchen I really wanted," Deborah says. "It was so fun to work with her."

None of which was in evidence the first time Jessica and her husband, Chad, laid eyes upon the place. "We pulled up and debated whether we should even go inside," Jessica recalls. "Chad was shocked at the level of disrepair. It was a wreck."

selling business Stella & Dot—is hardly averse to a challenge. "I fell in love with its property," she says. "Once I convinced Chad it wasn't total madness to take this house on, we dedicated ourselves to making it a comfortable and inviting home for our family."

Indeed. With two young daughters, Charlie and Tatum, Jessica and Chad wanted their new home to cocoon their immediate family as easily as it would welcome large groups of nearby relatives for holiday gatherings. Not to mention daddy-daughter backyard campouts for an entire Brownie troop, end-of-year classroom swim parties, seated dinners for 35, and charity galas for 400. It was a tall order for a 10,000-square-foot house that had once received dignitaries, but since had been neglected. "It was pretty decrepit," says interior designer Kendall Wilkinson, whom the couple tapped to reimagine their home. "We wanted to honor its heritage and keep its old-world charm, yet update it to feel youthful and fresh."

And so the historic house was almost completely gutted, "brick by brick and wall by wall," Jessica says. The painstaking process—regulated by historical protections—took three years, resulting in open spaces more conducive to entertaining and abundant indoor-outdoor access among all first-floor rooms. Still, its architecture was respected, even revered. Moldings and trims were replicated, doorways embellished, and original millwork salvaged whenever possible.

It also evinces Jessica's "profound feminine aesthetic," according to Wilkinson. "This house sparkles," Wilkinson says. "We have mirrors, we have Lucite, we have gold, we have platinum—it's a lot like Jessica's jewelry." In fact, the design process involved excursions to Stella & Dot's headquarters, including a study of Jessica's office, along with examinations of the company's jewelry lines. "They played a big part in how we designed things," Wilkinson says. "A lot of the furnishings feel like jewelry, and much of the color palette came from her jewelry."

That neutral palette is subtly punctuated by all manner of plums. Ranging from aubergine to lavender, orchid, and raspberry, they wash over rooms that, upon close inspection, reveal tonal surprise. "I was attracted to things that felt youthful, as a counterpoint to an otherwise mature home," Jessica says. She also notes the versatility of that approach. "Maybe one day you'll walk in and the family room will be

blue," she laughs. "Our intention was to make the furnishings neutral, and then layer color in minimally on draperies or chair fabrics."

Largely textural, featuring an occasional statement-making print or pattern, upholstered furnishings accommodate Cheetos-eating children and the family's Goldendoodle with nary a shrug. "To me, a home is meant to be lived in," Jessica says. "I care more about people connecting in my home than I care about the carpet." She admits her daughters don't eat pizza in the living room, but points out the family room sofa—a deep, sprawling invitation to nap, snuggle, and yes, eat—is covered in fabric dark enough to secret spills and muddy paw prints. "You want things to be inviting," Wilkinson says, "but you don't want to police people about whether their glass forms a ring on the tabletop. Everything in this house will stand up to wear and tear."

That includes the library—scene of Chad's card games with friends, but also where the girls enjoy playing games of their own. The most well-preserved room in the house, its original casework is painted high-gloss black to confer unabashedly dramatic style. "I love the mix of black and yellow," Wilkinson says. "It elevates the space from feeling Old World to $Mad\ Men$ -ish. That way, it's a little more fun." Just like the house itself. \blacksquare

FHER PERSONALITY was a color,

it certainly wouldn't be beige. Kim Fields goes bold in life, pulling off feats like buying a house, directing it to be gutted to the studs, and field-marshaling its renovation—all in a mere nine months.

Luckily, she found a kindred spirit for the mission in interior designer Katie Rosenfeld. "It felt like some kind of crazy race," Rosenfeld says of the Wellesley, Massachusetts, home project. "But I move at the speed of light anyway, so we're a good match. We both thrive on chaos."

Considering her dynamic persona, it's no surprise that Kim loves vibrant color and pattern. "She knew she wanted color in her house," Rosenfeld says. "She just didn't know in what form."

The answer emerged as the duo discussed plans for the kitchen in the 1990s home that Kim shares with husband Warren, their two teenagers, and four pets. "We were talking about doing the entire kitchen in navy blue," Rosenfeld says. They opted to dial back that idea, coating just the elegantly paneled island base in Benjamin Moore's "Newburyport Blue." The rich navy hue offers beautiful contrast to cabinets painted in Benjamin Moore's "White Dove" and to gleaming expanses of Antarctica quartzite countertops that give the look of classic marble without worries about spills and stains—or any maintenance hassles. "Those moves in the kitchen led us in a classic blue-and-white direction for the whole house," Rosenfeld says.

But not completely classic. Vibrant coral hues and exuberant pattern, especially chinoiserie, also attract Kim's eye. That opened the design door for Rosenfeld to make a few daring moves.

"I pushed her a little," Rosenfeld says. "I had to talk her into things like painting the dining room commode coral and mixing turquoise and light blue shades in with the navy—like the crazy Manuel Canovas fabric on the master bedroom pillows. Kim's inclination was to match perfectly, while mine was the opposite. She let me go with that."

The designer balanced her bold strokes against a calm, neutral backdrop, coating walls throughout the common areas in Farrow & Ball's "Skimming Stone," a clear gray-beige. "It's quiet but not stark," Rosenfeld says. "It complements everything."

The organic vibe of stone-hue walls blends easily with swaths of textural grass cloth and sisal. "I use sisal everywhere," the designer

says. "It instantly brings the formality level down, giving the room a modern, fresh feel."

The earthy canvas lets splashes of color and pattern from fabrics, artwork, and objects sing—downright sassily at times. "Katie did take me out of my comfort zone with some things," Kim says. "But that's OK. I knew she would give me the interiors I wanted—cozy yet sophisticated, layered, and timeless." Much of that layered look comes courtesy of art and objects—none of which made the across-town move with the Fields family.

"Warren and I have been married for 17 years," Kim says. "I came with stuff; he came with stuff. And I didn't want any of that old stuff in the new house. Everything except some family photos and crystal was sold or donated. I wanted to start fresh."

And that's no exaggeration. "She came with nothing but forks, spoons, and a suitcase of clothes," Rosenfeld laughs. "Every piece

of art, every object was purchased for this project." While new to the Fields family, though, many of the items aren't freshly minted—or fresh off an assembly line.

"I don't want to just pick anything up at any store anymore," Kim says. "It has to have meaning and be something that everyone else doesn't have."

That message sent Rosenfeld on the hunt of her life. In addition to furniture, fabrics, rugs, lighting, and hardware, she pursued a staggering array of art and accessories. "I absolutely scoured One Kings Lane, 1stdibs, Etsy, consignment shops, and local art sources," Rosenfeld says. "I'd shoot one image after another to Kim every night while I was watching the news. *Do you like this? Do you like this?* I kept pestering her, and she was up to the task. She didn't hesitate to make decisions."

The mélange of accessories, curated to feel as if they were collected over a lifetime, works with Rosenfeld's color and pattern choices to put a contemporary spin on this classic home. "The house is very traditional," Rosenfeld says, "but we kept it from being frumpy with abstract art, funky vintage pieces, foo dogs, and Buddhas."

"It feels like a conservatory." Four chairs instead of a sofa seem to get the conversation flowing. An antelope-pattern rug matches the modern mood of the youthful chair fabric and abstract art. Master bedroom Rosenfeld cocooned walls in grass cloth for a textural counterpoint to crisp navy and white fabrics. The room's "wonky" shape led the designer to use small bedside tables and wall-mount lamps. Exterior The 1990s Massachusetts home sports classic good looks.

the Arkansas home of Ashley and Michael Mosley and their five children, ages teen to toddler, could breezily outpace the bustle of the reality show *Kate Plus Eight*. It's not unusual for the Mosley family room to teem with the oldest daughter's cheerleading squad practice as Ashley whips up a scrumptious home-cooked meal in the kitchen while father and son rumble away on their fourwheelers across their 1,000-acre property.

"A lot of activity goes on in this house," confirms Little Rock interior designer Tobi Fairley, who worked on this project from the ground up. Fairley, who's made a name for herself as a bold colorist and exponent of youthful traditional design, turned to her favorite decorating element, color, to jump-start the design.

"I found the aqua-and-chocolate color palette we wanted in fabrics, which is where I almost always start a project," she says. "I wanted a palette with a little bit of a vintage feel reminiscent of a Georgian farmhouse—those almost minty colors—but updated."

The home's most color-saturated space, the dining room, began with Fairley's selection of the draperies' rich chocolate-and-aqua floral. Next came the round chairs' chocolate gingham check for a nod to country life, followed by a solid chocolate linen on the two modern wingback end chairs. The sophisticated solid-brown fabric brings the design up a notch to dodge a full-on country immersion. But the most striking color move comes forth on the walls. "We









painted the paneling and all the moldings aqua, as they would've been in an old farmhouse," Fairley explains.

The aqua that's so pronounced in the dining room is actually introduced before even taking a single step indoors. Honoring an old Southern tradition, Fairley painted the front porch's ceiling blue. The same aqua reasserts itself in the entry, on both the front door and furnishings.

"The entry is like the invitation to a good party," she says. "It sets the tone for what's to come." With kids running in and out of the house, Fairley wanted to avoid an area rug for the wide hallway, but she still wanted interest underfoot. Staining the wood flooring two shades of brown in an overscale diamond pattern delivered the desired visual interest while also debuting brown as the second most significant color in the palette.

Other important intros include the entry's gingham stairway runner and oval window, both a wink to farmhouse attitude. Even the staircase is site-appropriate. "I'm a fan of simpler, straight staircases that don't feel too grand, especially for a farmhouse," Fairley says. One of the family's tables was the right scale for the entry, so Fairley painted it a rough-hewn aqua and nestled it against the staircase. "Because it's so leggy, I added some warmth, dimension, and softness by pushing the big ottoman underneath it." The ottoman fabric, she explains, offsets the absence of a textile on the floor.

The living room is the most formal space. Its textures are soft and its textiles rich and lustrous, starting with the aqua silk-and-

wool carpet that's been cut into a luxurious area rug. Fairley chose velvet for several furnishings, including the sofa and two ottomans. "Velvet," she says, "gives a little of a vintage look," as does the wall and ceiling's soft celadon paint color. Every color in the room can be found in the striped silk draperies and in the wing chairs' floral, which was the foundation fabric for the design. "The wingback chairs were existing, and I love their classic form. One of my favorite things to do is to paint these classic pieces so they're not so serious." Pale lavender transforms the chair legs with youthful vitality.

The tall-ceilinged family room with its reclaimed wood beams is spacious enough for a gathering of the extended family. "It's about piling in people and gathering around the fire," says Fairley. Her own chevron fabric energizes—and warms up—the room's many windows. One of her most inventive solutions was cutting a carpet to run not only the length of the room but also to its wings, knitting together areas that could've looked isolated.

Fairley turned to happy, uplifting colors for Ashley's crafts room and for the children's upstairs den and crafts room. In the master suite, she returned to chocolate brown for its quiet sophistication appropriate for an adult retreat, pairing it with a beautiful grass green. "While I like the whole monochromatic look," says Ashley, "it's not me. We are a fun family, and we wanted that to show. Tobi achieved exactly what we wanted our home to say." \overline{m}

NO ONE DOES CLASSIC QUITE LIKE SOUTHERNERS

And it doesn't get any more Southern than St. Charles Avenue in the bustling Uptown District of New Orleans. An 1895 Queen Anne Victorian—complete with stained-glass windows, wroughtiron trim, and an adjacent guest cottage—was the ideal setting for our Southern Style Now Designer Showhouse. In conjunction with the Southern Style Now Festival, 28 designers with strong Southern ties transformed the home of newlyweds James and Brett Lapeyre to benefit the Preservation Center of New Orleans. See why the second stop on our national showhouse tour is a true decorator's delight.

Shaun Smith ensured the living room met New Orleanian expectations. Exterior views, portable furniture, and whimsical accents were all musts. The classic-but-current arrangement features a clean-lined slipper chair and sofa, a round ottoman, and a vintage armchair in geometric Fortuny fabric atop Stanton's seagrass rug. Eighteenth-century Italian bed finials ornament the acrylic drinks table and glass-and-brass coffee table. "I wanted it to feel collected, not decorated," Smith says. Flowing, white-silk draperies adorn the windows. Abstract art incorporates bursts of color. A rococo-style mirror crowns an antique console while a Noguchi lantern hangs overhead.

Melissa Rufty put a modern spin on the ancient craft of marbling in the foyer and stairwell. She collaborated with textile designer Paige Cleveland of Rule of Three to create the marbleized fabric panels with warm pops of terra-cotta. "The colors are reminiscent of sun-kissed buildings seen throughout Charleston, Sa-

vannah, and the Vieux Carré of New Orleans," Rufty says. Lush botanicals, geometric stairwell carpet, and striped Scalamandré draperies complete the welcoming entry.

"I wanted the study to feel authentic to NOLA," says designer **Michel Smith Boyd.** Matelassé draperies dress the bay window, framed in decorative molding, while Thibaut's extra-fine sisal wraps the ceiling and walls. A vintage curved sofa upholstered in rich red velvet provides a perch for sipping cognac and admiring art. The colorful Clintel Steed portrait reminded Boyd of jazz music and was the first piece he selected for the space. Circa Lighting's aged-iron pendant and triple-arm floor lamp illuminate the escape.

William Rankin McLure IV ensured the dining room was multifunctional. The table, skirted in Ralph Lauren Home pinstripe fabric and stacked with books, doubles as a desk. Art pieces—including a black-and-white abstract by the designer—grace the walls, covered in Pratt & Lambert's "Sutter's Gold." "It accents the art while bringing a sense of formality to the room," McLure says. Lacquered chairs with chinoiserie fretwork turn up the formality. Circa Lighting's antique-brass chandelier caps the assembly.

Reagan Hayes gave the parlor graphic punch. She coated the ceiling in a dramatic black design. The sofa's black-and-white geometric upholstery echoes the ceiling. Vintage chairs upholstered in blue velvet offer shapely seats atop a colorful area rug. The aged brass and gunmetal cocktail tables are Hayes's own designs. An antique Steinway by the windows beckons to be played. The custom flower arrangement is from Natural Decorations Inc.







"It's a fresh, traditional take on the typical family room," says **Lance Jackson,** who collaborated with **David Ecton** to design the stylish gathering spot. A collection of silhouettes climbs above the desk and around the entryway to create a gallery wall. CR Laine's blue sofa and green velvet club chairs team with Mr. Brown London's faux-bois coffee table to form a plush conversation area. Blue ceiling paint by Pratt & Lambert draws eyes overhead to a gildediron hanging lantern.

Denise McGaha "infused color and drama in a Southern way" when decorating the powder room. A large-scale floral wallcovering with black background breathes life into the small space while paying homage to the Garden District. A cast of characters, each in a different frame, ornaments the wall above the vanity from DXV by American Standard. An 18th-century architectural fragment wall mirror reflects the chic sanctuary. The shaded sconce is from Currey & Company.

Old-world-style antiques mingle with modern appliances in the kitchen by **James Farmer.** Surrounded by upholstered chairs, the trestle dining table can also be used for food prep. A bamboo-trellis wallcovering offsets the white cabinetry, Wilsonart quartz countertops, and glossy Crossville subway tiles. "The sleek backdrop allows 'crunchier' elements to contrast against it," he explains. Terra-cotta containers, antique sardine pots, and green-glass wine jugs layer in rugged character. Thermador's stainless-steel range and refrigerator columns are accented by antique-brass sconces and framed art. The polished-chrome faucet and "Hillside" farmhouse sink are from DXV by American Standard. Gold-rimmed dinnerware from Vietri lends class. "It's a young kitchen with an old soul," Farmer says.

Lindsey Coral Harper maximized every inch of the 38-squarefoot butler's pantry. Teal shelves with brass brackets accent the walls, clad in a malachite-pattern brick wallcovering. Oil paintings provide an unexpected surprise when pulling glassware, heirlooms, and antique serving pieces. Circa Lighting's gilded-iron chandelier inserts sparkle.

Emerging outdoors, a central water feature adds charm to the courtyard by **Kenneth Rabalais**, **Jennifer Rabalais**, and **Tina Lagasse**. Woodard's aluminum dining table and cushioned side chairs enjoy the shade of a black umbrella. A coordinating lounge chair and ottoman sit pretty atop the standard pavers by AZEK Building Products. Bevolo Gas & Electric Light's copper lantern illuminates the exterior after sundown. The main house siding is by James Hardie.

Paloma Contreras envisioned the upstairs bedroom as belonging to a young debutante. "She has a hint of a rebellious side—a Southern Lady Mary, if you will," the designer says. A custom de Gournay wallcovering with 12-karat white gold sets the stage for a feminine sanctuary. Local artisans created the crystal chandelier, abstract art, and iron canopy bed. Ivory linen draperies and monogrammed bedding add to the lavishness. Federal-style convex mirrors crown the ebony bedside tables while peony arrangements by Natural Decorations Inc. complement the Schumacher Euro shams. A sisal rug grounds the room in nubby texture. The adjoining balcony features a sofa and rectangular table from Woodard. Navy-and-white accoutrements round out the alfresco retreat.

Laura Burleson's bold bathroom design began with the wallcovering. "Its black stroke marks reminded me of Japanese calligraphy







but with a modern twist," says Burleson, who spent part of her child-hood in Asia. Custom flower sconces outline the sink, which features a chrome faucet from DXV by American Standard. The powder-coated steel on the shower door is repeated on the custom mirror. Furry stools nestle between the chrome-and-acrylic vanity base. Black floor tiles from Crossville anchor the sleek oasis.

The sitting room by **Catherine Brooks Giuffre** is pretty in pink. Pratt & Lambert's "Soapstone" paint teams with coordinating draperies to drench the space in blush. Perched atop an antique Persian rug, acrylic swivel chairs urge guests to gab in front of the fireplace. A large gilt mirror and a pair of crystal sconces glisten above the mantel. The antique-brass floor lamp is by Circa Lighting.

The gallery hall curated by **Robert Leleux** overflows with eyecatching works by Southern artists. From large-scale abstracts and etchings to botanicals, portraiture, and landscapes, the colorful configuration captivates guests. "I wanted it to be as distinct and varied as a real-life collection and as New Orleans itself," Leleux says.

"It's informally formal, packed with personality, and all about Louisiana," says **Brian Patrick Flynn** of the art-filled den. The leather English sofa, French armchairs, modern club chairs, and pierced tables are all by Ballard Designs. Classic blue-and-white upholstery keeps the lively space cohesive. Assorted art, including photography, sketches, abstracts, and oil portraits, embellish the raffia-wrapped walls. A black-and-white hide overlaps the neutral woven rug while a bronze-and-crystal chandelier glistens above.

The spacious hall bath by **Catherine Olasky** and **Maximilian Sinsteden** features twin console sinks with polished-nickel faucets from DXV by American Standard. Crossville's brick mosaic



















wall tiles and floor tiles laid in a herringbone pattern set a soothing tone. Simple framed mirrors and shaded sconces keep the bath from becoming cluttered. "Graphic monogrammed towels are a nod to the Southern tradition of monogramming anything that doesn't move," Olasky says.

Clary Bosbyshell didn't skimp on style when it came to the laundry room. Jim Thompson's updated "tree of life" pattern wraps the walls—its soft-blue hue referencing Southern porch ceilings. Open shelves topped with Circa Lighting's polished-nickel library lights utilize space above the existing washer and dryer. Abstract art and a braided-jute basket inject color and texture.

New Orleans natives—and siblings—**Chad Graci** and **Christina Graci Javanmardi** took charge of designing an updated turn-of-the-century master bath. Sheer fabric trimmed in silk fringe garnishes the Palladian window, forming an idyllic setting for DXV by American Standard's soaking tub. A 19th-century plant stand plays host to soaps while an antique whippet statue stands guard. The floor tile is from Crossville.

Thanks to California Closets, the master closet designed by **Regan Zibilich** is expertly organized. Linen-hued cabinets pair with high-gloss gray countertops for posh presentation. An agediron lantern pendant and Stanton's leopard-print carpet finish the fashionable hideaway.

"I tried to stay away from anything overwhelmingly serious," **Ware M. Porter** says of the master bedroom. Tonal striped walls and a bevy of custom lampshades set the tailored tenor. The stately bed corona and curtains were achieved using textiles from Quadrille. Its bluestriped interior fabric repeats on the skirted ottoman and armchair.



Patterned wool carpet, monogrammed bed linens, and a glitzy chandelier amplify the opulence. A leather-topped writing table, a cane-back chair, and 18th-century paintings form a sophisticated workstation.

A tented ceiling treatment, à la Dorothy Draper, captivates in the cottage living room by **Lisa Mende.** "Guests enter and instantly feel happy and energized," she says. The designer hung the valance and draperies to hide an unattractive air vent. A portrait of Frida Kahlo by local artist Ashley Longshore commands the back wall. Ballard Designs' pink sofa and club chairs upholstered in vintage ticking stripe join antique tête-à-tête chairs with gilt frames to encircle an acrylic coffee table by Century. Mende cleverly continued one of the ceiling's canopy rays into the kitchenette. Crossville's hexagonal wall tiles incorporate subtle texture. Appliances are from Thermador.

Jonathan Savage's guest cottage bedroom is masculine but refined. Twin awning-striped daybeds by Ballard Designs nestle in the corners while woven trunks afford extra storage for guests. The painted brick walls boast art by Kayce Hughes. Warm bursts of orange reference the Bayou sunsets. A gray metallic wallcovering in a shattered motif injects pattern overhead.

The guest cottage bathroom by **Betsey Nixon Hazard** is beautiful in blue and ivory. Stark's lush foliage wallcovering climbs up the walls and along the ceiling. Pratt & Lambert's "Russian Blue" lacquer paint continues the color story on the wall trim. A plaster wall sconce keeps to the botanical theme. All plumbing fixtures are from DXV by American Standard. \overline{m}


